Hoover Gets Ovation For 30 Minutes At Chicago

CONVENTION STADIUM, CHI-CAGO, June 15. (UP).—The republican national convention opened the second day session at noon today with two chief subjects, decision on prohibition and the nominee for vice-president still awaiting action. Followers of Chas. G. Dawes, especially from Texas, were keenly disappointed by his refusal to accept the nomination even if it is offered.

A large number of other proposed candidates were offered, among them Theodore Roosevelt, governor of the Philippines, Walter E. Edge of New Jersey and Senator James E. Watson of Indiana.

A 30-minute demonstration followed the mention of Hoover's name in a speech by Snell.

I favor a well balanced agriculture based upon the initiative and intelligence of the people. I will not, therefore, advocate any speciay session of the legislature to enact legislation that is repulsive and inimical to a free islature to enact legislation that is repulsive and inimical to a free government and destructive of the God given right to own property and exercise ones constitutional prerogative to secure the blessings of liberty unto himself and his posterity. I would not attempt to force farmers to cease their established lines of production and enter other fields already full. And I would not attempt to destroy industries based upon a normal production of certain agricultural products. All division heads would be required to reside in Austin and devote their full time to their work."



CHOOSE CAREFULLY

Just because this is a depression year, it behooves the voter to use more than ordinary care in selecting candidates for minor offices.

Work is hard to find, and-odd as it may seem-a great many men are running for various public jobs simply because they are having a hard time making a living any other way. A recent dispatch from Bay City, Mich., for instance, reported/that there are already more than 50 candidates for sheriff there; and similar conditions can be found in practically every other part of the country.

That being the case, the voter will need to do his picking more carefully than ever. Sifting the good candidates from the bad is a tough enough job under any circumstances; this year, with the lists cluttered up by men whose one qualification is that they need a steady salary, it will be harder than ever.

WAR SONGS


Right at this moment, the principal moral of the whole business seems to be the way in which it all stems off from the treaty of Versailles.
