HOUSE PASSES THE BONUS BILL

Prohibition and Choice of Vice President Worry G. O. P.

DAWES IS BOOMED BY DELEGATES Hoover Gets Ovation For 30 Minutes At Chicago

CONVENTION STADIUM, CHICAGO, June 15. (UP)—The republican national convention opened the second day session at noon today with two chief subjects, decision on prohibition and the nominee for vice-president still awaiting action.

Followers of Chas. G. Dawes, especially from Texas, were keenly disappointed by his refusal to accept the nomination even if it is offered.

A large number of other proposed candidates were offered, among them Theodore Roosevelt, governor of the Philippines, Walter E. Edge of New Jersey and Senator James E. Watson of Indiana.

A 30-minute demonstration followed the mention of Hoover's name in a speech by Snell.

Recess was taken until 8 o'clock tonight.

Dawes Refuses to Allow Nomination

WASHINGTON, June 15. (UP)—Chas. G. Dawes said today that he will not accept the nomination for the vice presidency, being boomed by Creager and his Texas delegates, even if it is offered.

Midlander's Father Is State Candidate

L. A. Seymour, for seven years chief of the main division of the state department of agriculture and the father of M. M. Seymour of Midland, Monday announced his candidacy for the office of commissioner of agriculture.

Seymour's statement read: "Right at the eleventh hour, and after serious consideration, I decided to enter the political arena as a candidate for the important office of state commissioner of agriculture."

"I was born and reared on a farm educated in the rural schools, and between the plow handles, married a farmer's daughter, reared four sons and two daughters on the farm. I taught school several years in connection with my farming, mostly in the rural schools. Having had 10 years experience in the state department of agriculture, serving as chief of the marketing division for seven years, I am amply qualified to fill the office to which I am aspiring with credit both to myself and the great state of Texas."

"I have always favored the teaching of industrial and agricultural subjects in all public schools and shall, if elected, endeavor to cooperate with all instructors of these subjects."

"I shall advocate rigid economy but not at the expense of efficiency. No unnecessary out-of-state trip at the expense of the taxpayers would be made. I favor a well-balanced agricultural back-up upon the initiative and intelligence of the people. I will not, therefore, advocate any special session of the legislature to enact legislation that is repulsive and inimical to a free government and destructive of the God given right to own property and exercise one's constitutional prerogative secure the blessings of liberty unto himself and his posterity. I would not attempt to force farmers to cease their established lines of production, in fields already full. And I would not attempt to destroy industries based upon a normal production of certain agricultural products. All division heads would be required to reside in Austin and devote their full time to their work."

Women Snap up Canning Bargain

Seven Midland women have applied to the chamber of commerce to answer an offer made by Mrs. Jeff King, county canner, who said she would sell the can halves with anyone who would furnish the cans.

Other Midland women would be glad to avail themselves of similar offers and county women have an abundance of garden products but no cans can make the same arrangement with Midland women by registering at the chamber of commerce office.

No. 2 1-2 cans cost \$3.10 per hundred. Vegetables so canned on the halves cost the can buyer 7 cents a container. No. 3 cans may be furnished if the buyer wishes.

UNCLE SAM'S DIRIGIBLE AKRON IS MOST PERFECT BAG OF AIR HISTORY

WASHINGTON, June 15. (UP)—The Akron radiated the navy department that it left Paris Island this morning, continuing toward Lakehurst.

Due to numerous requests of the Midland public that saw the Akron, the greatest airliner of history, pass over this city Sunday, the following information on the physical makeup of the huge bag has been prepared.

Most of the information was secured through the courtesy of Sgt. Brock of the U. S. army radio and meteorological station at Sloan field. Lashed to its giant mooring dock, it extends 785 feet in length overall. In length alone it does not eclipse so much the Graf Zeppelin, which with the destruction of the ill-fated R-101 again became the largest dirigible, nor even its smaller sister ship, the Los Angeles. But in other departments the Akron is obviously superlative.

In length, the Akron is 785 feet, the Graf 776 feet, and the Los Angeles, 658.3 feet. Its nominal gas volume is 6,500,000 cubic feet, nearly twice that of the Graf and three times that of the Los Angeles. The diameter through its thickest section is 132.9 feet, the Graf is 100 feet and the Los Angeles 90.7 feet. Should the three ships be moored side by side, this diameter would perhaps more than any other demonstrate the Akron's massiveness. In height, its 146.5 feet is 33.5 feet greater than the Graf and 42.1 feet greater than the Los Angeles. Its power rooms contain eight engines, capable of developing 4,480 horse-

power, as against five engines with 2,750 horsepower and five with 2,000 horsepower of the Graf and Los Angeles respectively. Its maximum speed per hour is 83.8 miles, the Graf is 80 and the Los Angeles is 73.1. Its gas supply can carry 10,880 miles without refueling, based on an average cruising speed of 50 knots. At the same speed the Graf can cover 6,125 miles and the Los Angeles but 4,000.

One Stop Around Globe

On this basis of speed the Akron could circumnavigate the globe via the Post-Gatty route with a single stop.

The Graf Zeppelin established a number of records. Its flight around the world in 22 days is one which was surpassed only by Wiley Post and Harold Gatty. Its ability to fly under the most adverse weather conditions constituted a great step forward for aeronautics. Its size, supported by its quality of safety, drove home the possibilities of trans-oceanic air transportation.

WASHINGTON, June 15. (UP)—Gaston B. Means, convicted early this week on a charge of swindling Mrs. Evalyn Walsh McLean of \$104,000 in the Lindbergh ransom plan, was today sentenced to fifteen years. His release on bond pending an appeal was denied.

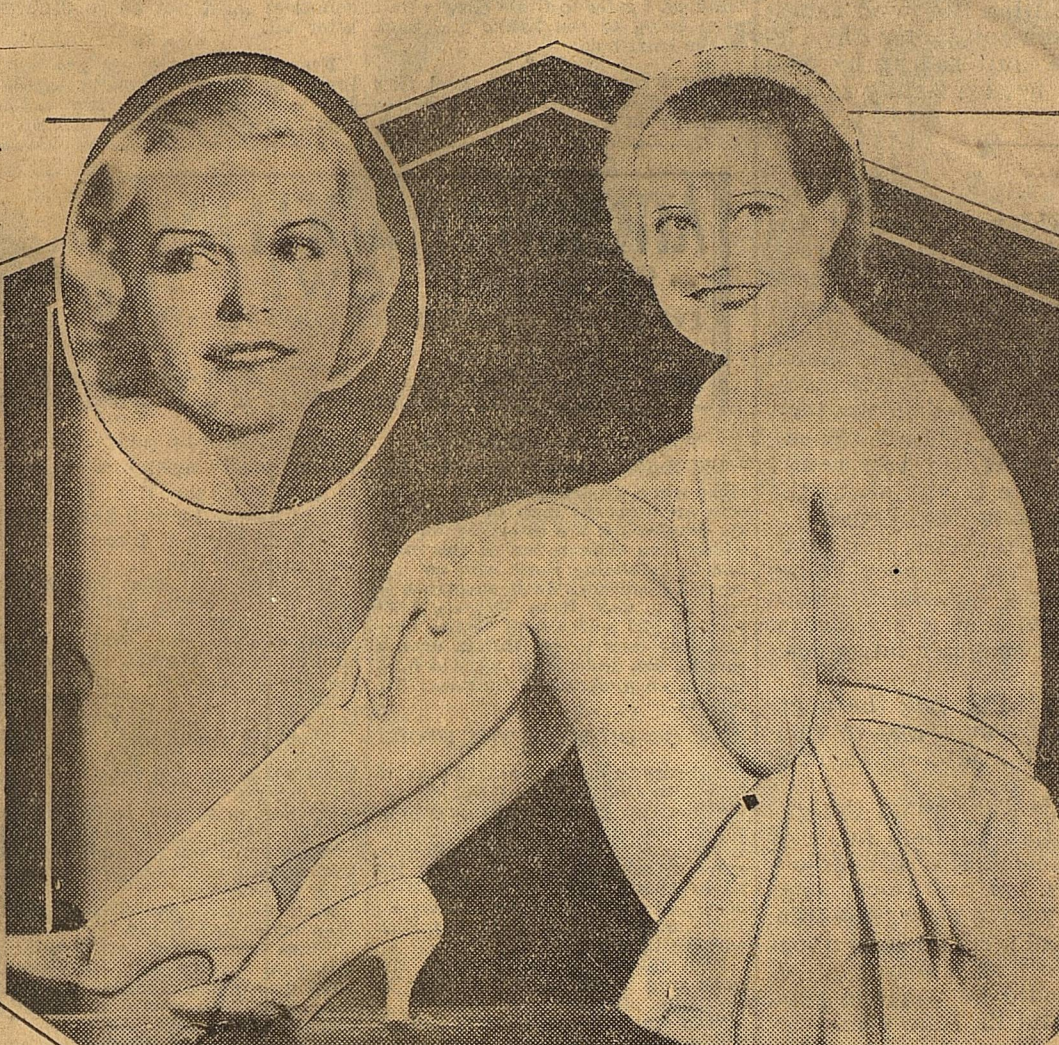

WOMEN CROUCH FOR FIGHT AT JULY PRIMARY

AUSTIN, June 15.—Mrs. Claude De Van Watts, president of the Texas Women's Christian Temperance Union, in a statement labeled "a declaration of war," said the state democratic executive committee used "high-handed methods" in voting to refer the question of re-submission of the eighteenth amendment in the July primary.

She said its decision of Monday to obtain an expression of democrats as to whether they favored the constitution of the United States to the various states "is nothing more or less than a method adopted for the specific purpose of attracting the opponents of prohibition to the polls."

Mrs. Watts declared the committee "by high-handed methods has resorted to an unjustifiable political expediency."

"The Woman's Christian Temperance Union is against the submission, repeal, modification and nullification," she said. "We believe in the constitution of the United States in its entirety (this of course includes the eighteenth) we deplore the persistent attacks on the constitution by a fanatical minority group of wets. We know their methods are responsible for the breaking down of respect for the constitution."

ARGUMENTS WERE BRIEF IN DAYS OF GUN TOTING, UNCLE BROOKS INFORMS

In the days when "Uncle Brooks" Lee and William "Six Shooter" Dean came to West Texas, men argued so briefly that onlookers didn't have time to pick out affirmative or negative sides to the debate.

The general procedure of an argument went something like this: "A walks into a saloon. B is downing a stiff hooker of raw whiskey and straightens up to tell about a puncher who lived in the forks of this or that creek. A corrects him, saying the man's name was Digger, not Drigger. B says A is a liar and the both draw. A punches over the place dive under tables, behind counters or else crowd near the walls of the place just as two guns spit. A pitches over, and the man's name was Drigger."

"We all carried six shooters and knew how to handle 'em," Dean told a reporter. "We all figured the other man might kill us, but knew he couldn't eat us." That seems to have been the philosophy of the entire hardware-loving population. It is astounding to the average youth to hear these old-timers get together and tell of the past, to notice how many names they remember and their propensity for recalling dates. One will tell of seeing so-and-so shot across the breakfast table and the other will relate how the breakfast's assassin was cornered in an El Paso saloon and his lights doused. Both have seen the lead fly on numerous occasions, Lee while fighting Indians in the main and Dean while pursuing rustlers or, later on, in pursuit of his duties as a peace officer and express guard.

"I could tell a lot on some of the old-timers around here if was a mind to," Uncle Brooks laughed. "But some of them knows every bit as much on me so I won't tell. Why, son, some of the fellows around this town that are old-timers themselves used to ride on my knee when they were babies. Take Lum Dugher, for instance, I had to keep the little shaver from drowning in a wash tub on one. He was crawling around like he used to do and got over near the place where my nose now is. He saw the wash tub full of water and couldn't be satisfied till he fell in on his head. Joe Knowles helped me pull him out. While we were on the subject, there is some doubt as to whether Lum didn't have a hand years later in fixing the "Six Shooter" handle onto William Dean, although it is well understood that Dean could stand off at a distance and throw lead with either hand just as straight as walking up to the mark and touching it with his finger."

Uncle Brooks raised 12 children, gets a terrific wallop out of living in the present, but laughs till his sides are sore at some of the times he's had in the exciting past. Incidentally, he says the past offered more in a day than the present does in several days.

"Why, the boys and girls don't know the beginning to the art of courtship now," he confided. "They drive around in an automobile for a while, go to a show, sit down in (See UNCLE BROOKS page 4)

Oklahoma Crude Raises U. S. Average

NEW YORK, June 15. (UP)—An increase in Oklahoma raised the daily average crude production over the nation for the week ending June 11 to 2,183,450 barrels, compared with 2,191,250 the preceding week, the report of the American Petroleum institute today showed.

The total of motor fuel stocks June 11 reached 67,514,000, compared with 64,196,000 on June 1, 1931. Refinery gas stocks stood at 95.1 per cent of the nation's refining capacity and amounted to 43,911,000 barrels, compared with 44,247,000 on June 4. Crude and refined imports amounted to 2,410,000 the week ending June 1, compared with 2,334,000 the preceding week.

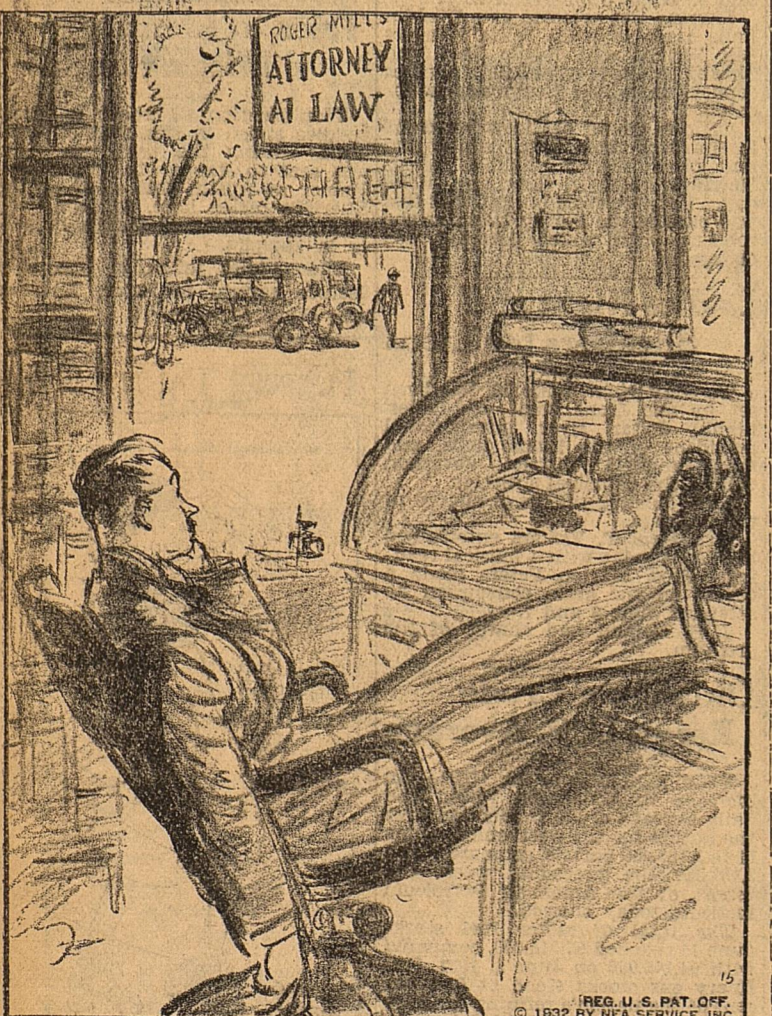
WAR SONGS

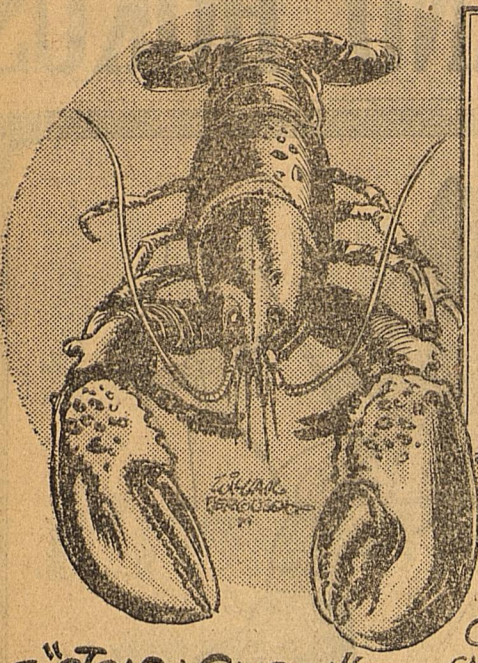

Cost Over \$5,000,000 The Akron cost more than \$5,000,000 to build. Externally, its length appears abbreviated by its extreme width, which was designed to furnish compactness and facilities for greater helium storage.

The rigidity of the hull will enable one portion of the gas cells to become inflated without impairing the appearance of the ship, this in contrast with the non-rigid dirigibles which sag when the helium is unevenly distributed.

Safety Features Every known safety feature has been designed in the Akron's plans. Safety valves have been installed to dispose of any surplus expansion of helium which would react to changes in altitude, temperature, and barometric pressure.

Immune to Lightning Designers say the Akron is immune to lightning bolts. A bolt of lightning, they point out, would be dissipated because every metal part is bonded to another to act as a Faraday cage.
