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STRANGE ASPECT OF THE TAX BILL

The new tax bill is going to make things tough for gangsters. It gives the government the right to slap a 100 per cent tax on any profits that come from illegal activity, and hereafter the bootlegger or racketeer who marches in to pay his income tax is going to get an unpleasant surprise.

All of this, probably, comes under the heading of good news. We haven't had such distinguished success in our war on gangsters that we can afford to overlook any new law that will enable us to clamp down on them a little more effectively.

And yet, when you stop to think about it, the whole business is a little bit funny. It constitutes, probably, the most roundabout way yet devised for sneaking up on criminals.

Here, in effect, is what we tell the gangster: "Go ahead and put on your rackets if you like. Bootlegging, gambling, murder—try anything you please, for the chances are about 50 to 1 that we won't be able to catch you, or to punish you if we do catch you."

"But watch out for the money you make. If you come in to pay a tax on it, as the law provides, we'll take it all away from you. And if you don't come in at all, and we find out about it, we're apt to send you to prison for a few years."

To be sure, this roundabout method finally landed no less a man than Al Capone in the jug; and half a loaf, in an affair of this kind, can be a whole lot better than no bread at all. But it's a funny system, and if our famous American sense of humor were working properly we'd be laughing at ourselves night and day.

What it means is that the income tax law is about the only one we can hope to enforce.

Which, in turn, may mean that we are a lot more in earnest about punishing crimes against money than we are about punishing crimes against life or public decency.

VON PAPEN: 1918 AND 1932

Nothing shows more clearly how the passions of war-time have died down than the way in which the American public has received the news that Colonel Franz Von Papen has been called to the helm of the German republic.

In 1917 and 1918 this Von Papen was one of the nation's favorite hates. As military attache at the German embassy in Washington, prior to America's entrance into the war, he had been a little bit more active for the Fatherland than a diplomat in a neutral land is supposed to be, and President Wilson demanded, and got, his recall. And for a long time after that no good American could speak of him without denouncing him.

But things have changed, somehow. Called to help save Germany from Hitlerism, he enjoys the good will of all Americans. Which indicates, perhaps, that war-time hatreds are artificial things which die rapidly as soon as their artificial stimulus is removed.

MINIMIZING THE CHANCES

It is permissible to wonder just how far an international conference on world economic conditions is likely to get if all discussion of reparations and war debts is omitted, as this government has stipulated.

To be sure, there are several hundred answers to the great question, "What is wrong with the world?" And nobody seems quite wise enough to tell us just which one of them may be most nearly correct. Yet it seems fairly obvious that the reparations-war debts tangle is inextricably tied up with the general economic collapse.

Can the job of setting world business right be tackled properly if it be assumed from the start that reparations and war debts are strictly secondary matters? Maybe so; but it does seem as if such an attitude distinctly minimizes the chances for success.

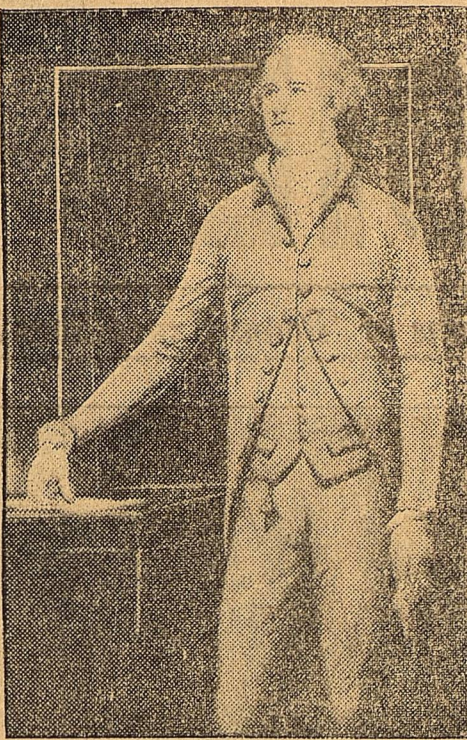
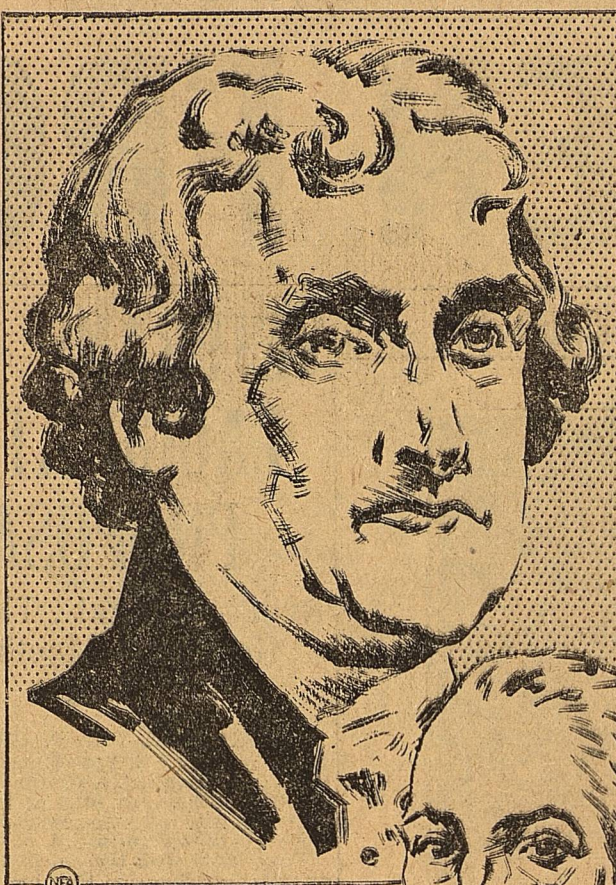

Jefferson Supreme As Party Boss; Hamilton, Burr Fought for Power



First "boss" in American politics, Thomas Jefferson, extreme left, held tremendous power for a quarter of a century. He founded the Democratic party, "elected" three presidents and enjoyed a reign never equaled in political history. Alexander Hamilton, the power behind George Washington and himself an astute party leader opposed to Jefferson, is shown at right. He died following a duel with Aaron Burr, lower left, after engineering Burr's defeat for the governorship of New York state.

WASHINGTON—The first important political bosses in this republic, who gave us a system that still endures in 1932, were Thomas Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton. Mighty men they were and their names still echo through convention halls from the throats of modern party leaders who claim to be political descendants.

Intrigue and double-dealing marked American politics almost from the beginning. But the leaders who organized and guided parties and made presidents in the first three or four decades of presidential elections were men who themselves were either holding the highest federal offices or seeking them.

Politics began to develop as a profession when the people began to vote in large numbers. Then arose the system of nominating presidential candidates at national conventions which at present is the result of manipulation at the expense of popular control. In almost no time convention delegates became accustomed to twiddling their thumbs while bosses sat in hotel rooms picking dark horses.

Aaron Burr—getting back to the initial period—was the first prominent political boss whose name came down to us unsavory. He was the boss of New York state in the late seventeenth-nineties and that was why Jefferson chose him as his running mate for vice president in the 1800 campaign. Then Burr tried to steal the presidency from Jefferson by chicanery and was balked only by Hamilton, whom he later killed in a duel.

Jefferson's career as a power in party politics has never been equalled. He founded what is now the Democratic party and obliterated what was then the Federalist party of Hamilton. He began organizing a political group as far back as 1791, lining up leaders by correspondence among them the leaders of the Tammany Society in New York.

Elected to the vice presidency in 1796, he was chosen president in 1800 and absolutely dominated national politics for a quarter of a century.

He engineered the election of James Madison as his successor by a series of deals in the less important states which thwarted the Federalists and later dictated the selection of James Monroe for another eight years. Just before his death in 1826 he is said to have been instrumental in the 1824 election of John Quincy Adams.

He was a realist and recognized the political value of patronage. He also foresaw first that democratic principles of government would prove more popular than autocratic heritages from Europe.

George Washington's power over the new nation went unquestioned as long as he was president, but Hamilton was the dominating influence behind the presidency. Hamilton was content with his power as a cabinet officer and undisputed leader of the Federalist party. He pulled many wires in his time. He was a very practical political boss and his theory, as opposed to Jefferson's, was that the government should always be operated for the people by the aristocracy.

In the very first election, when each presidential elector cast two votes so that the second highest man might be chosen vice president, Hamilton was found instructing certain electors to be sure and vote against John Adams, who was to be vice president, lest his vote equal Washington's.

In 1796, when it was still possible by manipulation of electors to swing an alleged vice presidential candidate into the presidency, he was trying to defeat Adams for the highest office by persuading electors to split their tickets for Pinckney. Later, after Adams had been president awhile, he found that Hamilton had been secretly in control of his cabinet all the time.

But although he was the great rival and bitter enemy of Jefferson, this handsome, brilliant and youthful boss saved the presidency for Jefferson in 1800. He could not stomach Burr or the plot joined in by some Federalists who sought to abandon their own hopelessly defeated candidate and toss electoral votes to Burr, who had the same number of votes as Jefferson.

Burr was both an adroit and unscrupulous politician—there were many such even in those days. He had displaced George Clinton as

party boss in New York and is credited with invention of one of the first tricks used to evade the election laws.

The ballot was originally restricted to men of property and that was often circumvented when young propertyless men were organized into a group which would buy itself a house. Thereupon each member of the group would be recognized as a property owner. Votes were so few that this method was used to win ward after ward in New York City.

It is also recorded that Burr established the Bank of Manhattan simply by a joker in a water supply bill.

After the Jeffersonians tossed him overboard in 1804, refusing to let him be vice president again, Burr ran for governor of New York and his ambition was again thwarted by Hamilton. His famous duel with Hamilton followed and his power diminished rapidly.

Dewitt Clinton, his political enemy, succeeded Burr as boss of New York.

Although the presidency was at first occupied almost exclusively by Virginians, New York was a center of great political power from the beginning and it will be observed in subsequent articles that after the "Virginia dynasty" the bosses of New York and Pennsylvania usually have been vitally important.

their daily work, should supplement this with artificial exercise in order to keep muscles and organs from becoming weak and flabby.

Exercise benefits the body by increasing the circulation. Every movement which we make causes the destruction of certain body cells. Nature replaces all such normal waste of tissue and this process of replacement is speeded up by exercise. However, if too much exercise is taken, there results a greater destruction of tissue than the body can replace and in such case the body is harmed instead of benefited.

Ordinarily exercise should not be taken less than three hours after a meal, nor should a meal usually be taken less than one hour after exercise.

Exercises are most beneficial when taken in the open air because the open air contains a larger percentage of oxygen than does the air indoors. But if exercises cannot be taken outdoors, then they should be taken indoors in well-ventilated gymnasiums or rooms.

Dunn Report for May Bankruptcies

AUSTIN, Tex., June 6.—Eighty Texas business houses went into bankruptcy during May, according to weekly reports submitted to the University of Texas bureau of business research by E. G. Dunn and company. Since there were five weeks in May, the total number of failures for the month was substantially higher than the 69 reported for April; the average weekly number of failures, on the other

hand, was only 16 in May as compared with 17 in April. The total number of failures in May a year ago was only 65, or about 13 a week.

In terms of liabilities of the bankrupt concerns, however, May showed a decline of about 7 per cent when compared with both April and with May a year ago; the bureau report said. "Total liabilities for May amounted to \$1,551,600, so that average liabilities per failure dropped to \$18,950. This average is one-fifth smaller than that for April and is one-fourth smaller than the average for May, 1931. Four of the concerns had liabilities amounting to more than \$1550,000 each.

"Although the assets on the books of the failing concerns cannot be regarded as an altogether measure of the resources available to the creditors of the bankrupt firms because the full value at which they are carried may not be realized, it should be noted that in April only about 45 per cent of the total liabilities of the failing concerns were offset by assets and only about 56 per cent in May a year ago, whereas in the month just past about 61 per cent of the total liabilities were covered by assets on the books of the failing concerns.

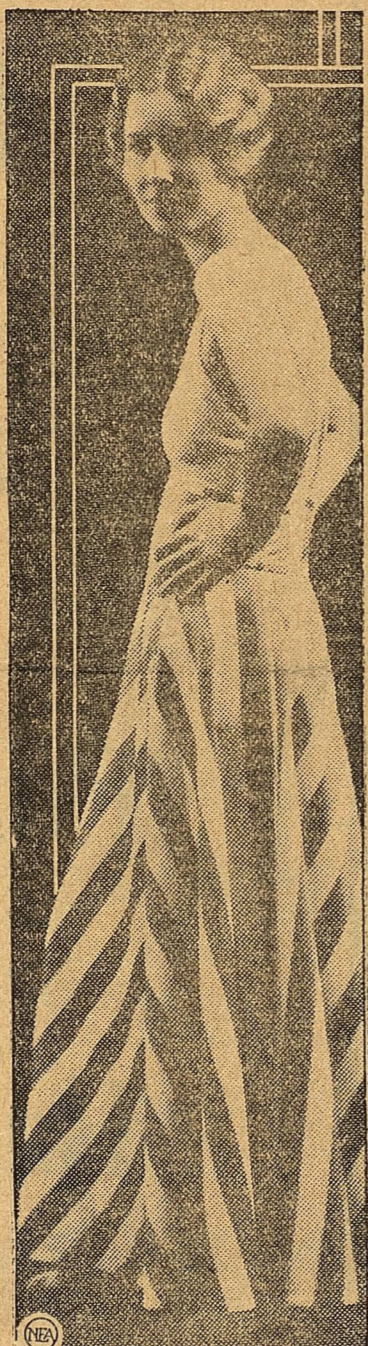

Helpful Health Suggestions

SPORTS

On the principle that sugar-coated pills taste better, most people prefer to take the exercise they need in the form of various sports.

Some go in for golf or tennis or swimming or other games, while a few prefer the formal exercises of the "daily dozen".

If one is about to undertake a systematic course of exercises or engage in any sport, it is best, before doing so, to have a physical examination made by a competent physician in order to know whether the body is in condition for it. It is a good thing to have such an examination made at least once a year.

Walking is the simplest of outdoor exercises and can be taken by practically everybody. When going out

for a walk, one should wear appropriate clothing—in warm weather, light loosely fitting clothes, and in cold weather, warmer woolen clothing. Shoes and stockings should be well-fitted so as not to cramp the feet. The heels of the shoes should be low. For the average person in good health, a walk of from three to five miles at a rate of amount three miles per hour is sufficient for a day's exercise.

In walking one should try to keep the body erect, with the head up, the abdomen in, the shoulders back, and the chest fairly high. In striding, the feet should be kept parallel with the toes pointing straight forward. The arms should swing freely from the shoulders.

After completing the walk, it is best to take a hot shower bath followed by a brief cold one lasting about thirty seconds. Rub the skin vigorously until dry, and change to fresh clothing.

Horseback riding is another good form of exercise, and is especially beneficial for gastro-intestinal disorders. The rhythmic vibration which the gait of the horse im-

parts to the rider's body seems to be of benefit to some of the internal organs.

Whatever sport is chosen, it should take into consideration both one's personal preference and one's physical condition.

Exercise With the warm, bright days of spring come thoughts of exercise and sports and plans for vacations. The next few health talks will give a brief discussion of the need of exercise or sports and some first-aid suggestions to campers or other vacationists.

It is generally known that a certain amount of physical exercise is advisable if one wishes to enjoy good health. 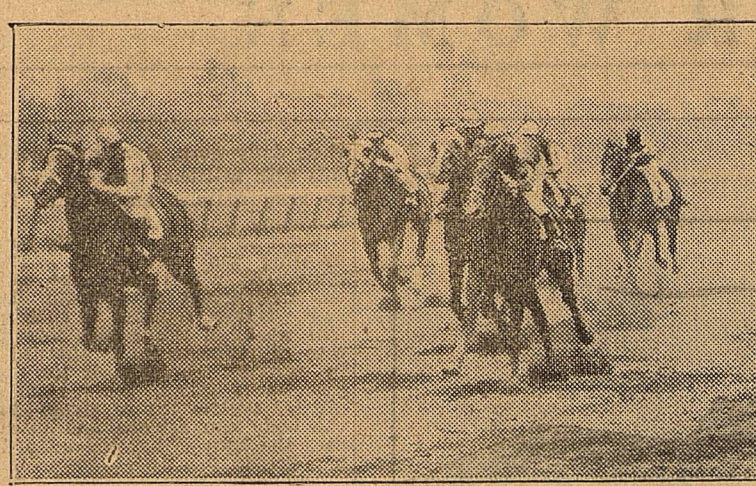

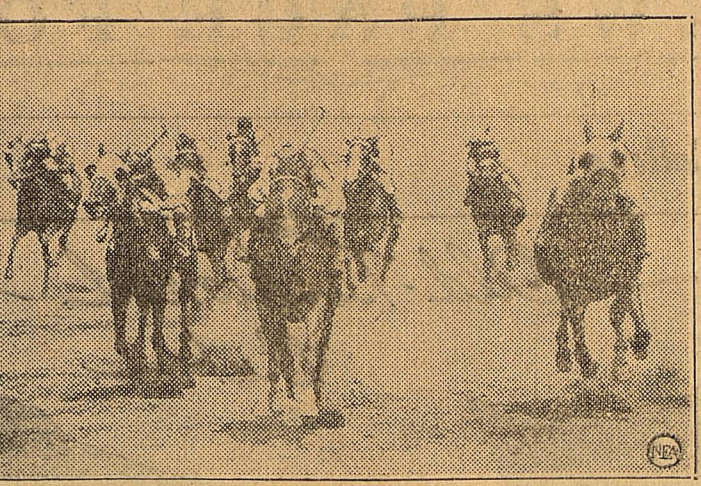

itude 30 and 32 south from Washington, is bounded on the northwest by El Paso county, on the northeast by Tom Green and Crockett counties, on the west by Presidio county and on the south by Mexico.

It has an area of about 12,000 square miles, or 7,680,000 acres, with a surface of beautiful valleys and a few mountain spurs in the northwestern portion of the county.

The Pecos river is the boundary line between Tom Green and Crockett counties, giving the county an eastern river front of over 300 miles, tributary to which is a beautiful prairie valley from 15 to 25 miles wide, giving thousands and thousands of acres of land that is excellent for agriculture when irrigated from the Pecos river.

Comanche creek, rising at Fort Stockton, near the center of the county, is fed by seven fine clear bold springs within the first half mile, and running by hundreds of small ones along its course. It has an average width of about 50 feet, and a depth of from 3 to 10 feet, and runs a bold stream for some 5 miles, then sinking to form a small swamp. It formerly ran about 15 miles, but has been checked by the construction of several irrigation ditches.

Leon creek, in the Leon valley, lying 10 miles west of Stockton, runs 15 miles, then sinks, and again appears every few miles. The springs forming this creek are very

bold, 30 to 40 feet in diameter and 10 to 20 feet deep. The water is mostly consumed by irrigation ditches.

Fort Stockton, the only town in the county, is situated on Comanche creek, in the center of the county, and is the county seat. It is 400 miles from San Antonio, the nearest railroad terminus. Located on a table land about 25 feet above the creek, with an elevation of 4,920 feet above sea level, with a pure dry atmosphere, it is certainly a pretty location for a prosperous beautiful city.

Fort Stockton has a population of about 1000, mostly Mexicans, with 12 American families, forming a society circle far superior to most frontier towns. The people are hospitable and generous to a fault.

The town consists of four general stores, one hotel, one boarding house, one Catholic church, court house and jail, telegraph office, five saloons, one billiard saloon, one tailor or shop, one boot and shoe shop, postoffice and daily mail to and from Austin, San Antonio, and Mesilla, New Mexico, by C. Bam & Co.'s stage line, and weekly mail to and from Ft. Clark by hack line, and the government post consisting of four companies.

In the county there are 89 persons owning cattle as follows: 52 with 3 to 10 head, 26 with from 10 to 100 head, 11 with 100 to 300 head. Only one man in the county owns sheep—Mr. M. F. Corbett, with 480 head. One hundred and four stock brands have been registered in the county.

Farming lands with irrigation may be had for \$3 to \$5 an acre; good grazing lands for 50¢ to \$1.00 according to water privileges, and uplands from 25¢ to 50¢ per acre. Vacant lands can be secured by location at about 25¢ per acre, with solid or alternate certificates, by addressing the county surveyor or the commissioners' court.

CROCKETT DEEP TEST

Location for the deep unit test to be drilled in north central Crockett county by Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. and others has been staked in the center of the northeast quarter of section 67, block UV, G.C.&S.F. Ry. Co. survey.

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CHALK ADDS PRODUCER

The north end of the Chalk field in Howard county has added a producer, Merrick & Lamb's No. 3 Chalk, apparently has another well in the making in Pure Oil Co.'s No. 12 Chalk and has gained a location early in the week.

Merrick & Lamb No. 3 Chalk topped the pay at 1,692 feet, after drilling plug at 1,668 feet, where a 6 5/8-inch casing was cemented, and drilled to 1,770 feet. On a protraction test Tuesday it pumped a total of 18 barrels of oil the first three hours and a total of 22 barrels the next three hours, a rate during the last three hours of 176 barrels daily. Location is 990 feet from the north and east lines of the northwest quarter of section 125, block 29, Waco & Northwestern Ry. Co. survey.

Pure Oil Co.'s No. 12 Chalk, 1,980 feet east of the Merrick & Lamb well and 990 feet from the north and west lines of the northeast quarter of section 125, block 26, showed a baller of oil on four hours from 1,651.80 feet and topped the well at 1,726 feet. When drilled to 1,780 feet it was making three barrels (a little over one barrel) of oil hourly.

The machine at Merrick & Lamb No. 3 Chalk is being dismantled to be moved to a location just staked by the same operators for No. 4 Chalk, 1,650 feet from the north line and 990 feet from the west line of section 125, block 26. This test and Merrick & Lamb Nos. 1, 2 and 3 Chalk, producers, form a square around the center of the northwest quarter of section 125.

YATES VALUES UNCHANGED

Values in the Yates oil field in Pecos county on which 1932 taxes will be assessed will remain practically the same as last year, around \$38,000,000, according to oil men who attended the hearing of the board of equalization on Monday and Tuesday. The board believed that a reduction of \$2,000,000 might result.

The oil companies and other owners of royalties and leases in the field asked a substantial reduction but this was not granted. Valuations in 1931 were reduced 5 per cent from 1930. Wildcat leases again will be assessed at 25c an acre. A representative of Thomas & Pickett & Co., tax experts of Dallas, advised with the board of equalization in the hearing.

Glasscock county commissioners will sit at Garden City as a board of equalization on Friday, June 10. Dion county's board will meet on Monday, June 13, and Gaines county's tax equalization session will be held the following Monday.

BIG LAKE 3C DRILLING 8,600

Big Lake Oil Co.'s No. 3-C University in Reagan county, smallest of the world's deepest oil wells, had drilled Tuesday to 8,600 feet in sand and shale. It has been drilled now since it went out of the top of a cave at 8,515 feet. The hole was standing up well.

Cement was run twice last week, from 8,715 to around 8,385 feet, to stop caving after the well had been deepened from 8,223 to 8,955 feet. It is believed to have been crooked and not down to the deepest part that has been found in the field.

Big Lake No. 6-C University was milling pipe 7,979 feet. Drill pipe struck where a baller was cemented off sometime ago. Total depth is 8,357 feet with 8,231 feet to the top of the first deep pay. Big Lake No. 7-C University had drilled to 4,235 feet in shale.

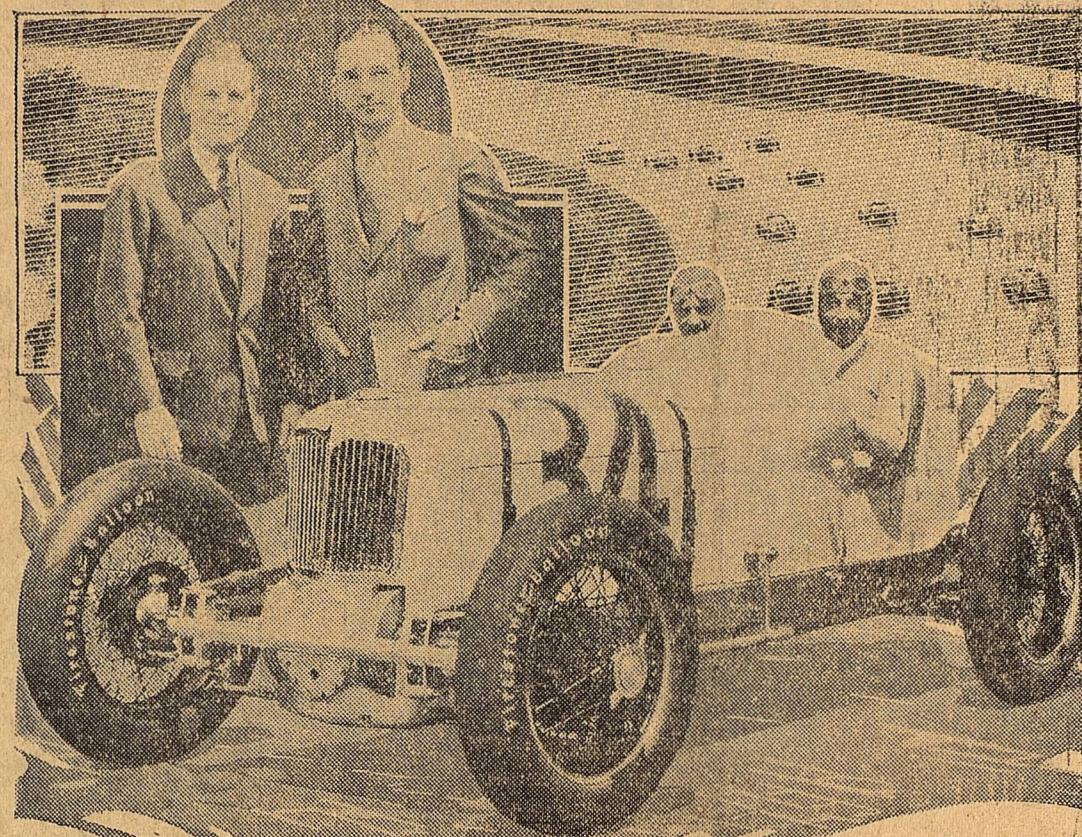
Texon No. 4-B University was milling at 8,547 feet, 3 inches. In drilling out cement that was run to sidetrack a baller, it found the top of the 5 1/2-inch casing at 8,525 1/2 feet and began milling there. Total depth is 1,547 feet. Texon No. 5-B University had drilled to 2,644 feet in sand.

Ely, testifying in a suit for injunction to restrain the commission from building the so-called Weatherford cut-off of the Bankhead highway, referring to the attitude of Governor Sterling opposing the project at this time, said he would not permit a governor to dictate to him. "Judge Ely had done too much hard work for Texas for me to criticize him and I know he did not mean any reflection on me," Governor Sterling said. "Having been chairman of the highway commission once myself I know just how difficult Ely's job is. He has done fine work on the highway commission. There are absolutely no differences between us. I merely do not approve of building the cut-off at this time because I am not in favor of expending any public funds whatsoever unless it is absolutely necessary."

Governor Sterling said he believed there were more people who favored construction of the cut-off than there were opposing it.

Seek to Modify Insurance Law

Charter for the Association for the Modification of the Robertson Insurance Law was filed at Austin yesterday. Objectives of the association are to promote the modification of the Robertson insurance law so as to open the door to outside capital, develop Texas resources, furnish adequate mortgage money, lower the interest rate on mortgages and municipal bonds and stabilize real estate investments.

The association's statement, in part, was as follows: "In 1907 a member of the house of representatives introduced a bill which became known as the Robertson insurance law. This law provides that foreign insurance companies doing business in Texas must invest 75 per cent of their premium reserve in a certain class of Texas securities.

"Upon its passage 22 of the large life insurance companies withdrew from the state. The companies objected to the law because it would take away from them the control of the investment of their funds. "A compulsory investment law in every state in the union would greatly impair, if not destroy, the nationwide efficiency of life companies. It would prevent them from going into the open market and buying the best securities on the best terms wherever such securities might be found, and place the investments

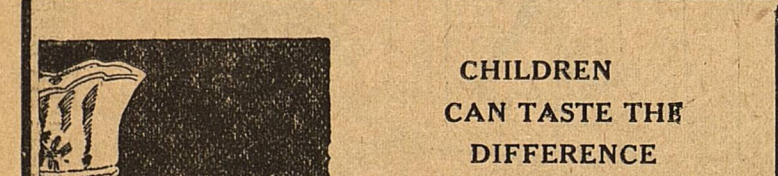
