Undoubtedly, the momentary weakening of public confidence in the soundness of the economic structure following the drastic stock market break might have assumed serious proportions, had President Hoover not promptly and wisely set about instituting voluntary as operation between industry and government to protect wages and co-operation between industry and government to protect wages and purchasing power of the public.

The public became reassured when Mr. Hoover's program called attention to the large scale expenditures under way for 1930 by industries, railroads, utilities and various governmental agencies. As the president pointed out, these expenditures will go a long way in

During 1929 the majority of the country's industries made new alltime records for sales and earnings. The peaks were reached during the first half of the year. A great wave of over-optimism ensued and security prices discounted progress too far in advance. The drainage of capital into speculative fields caused high money rates and credit strain. These conditions, together with other aggravating factors, combined to precipitate the stock market crash which proved to be the severest in history

Present indications are that the general business decline which has been under way since last summer and which was accelerated by the stock market break, struck bottom a few weeks ago and that gradual recovery will be apparent in the first quarter of 1930, gathering impetus as the year progresses
