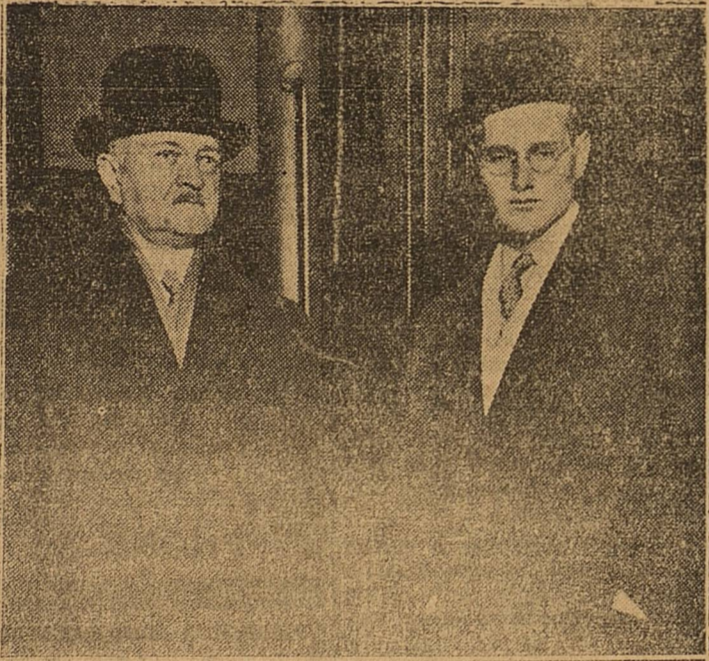

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

Many housekeepers overlook the possibilities in vegetable juice cocktails.

As in any appetizer careful seasoning is essential. Lemon juice or vinegar, sugar, salt, sometimes a mere suspicion of spice.

Thorough chilling and attractive serving are also imperative. While the cocktail must be perfectly smooth and "drinkable," it need not be of a watery consistency.

Many Vegetables Usable

Tomato juice and sauerkraut juice are rather commonly used, but other vegetables can be successfully manipulated.

Vegetables which are wanted quite dry for dressing for the table offer less difficulty for the cook if she need not cook away every drop of liquid.

The water in which celery is cooked, cauliflower, brussels sprouts, broccolini, carrots, mushrooms or the juice from canned vegetables is made piquant and stimulating by proper seasoning.

Of course, the same vegetable should not appear twice in a meal. Some morning, when stewed fruit or baked apples have been the breakfast fruit, try serving a tomato juice cocktail for the luncheon or dinner first course.

A PLAY TO JAKE

Brown's Return To Strengthen Aggies in SMU Cage Tilt

GAME MAY HAVE A BEARING ON RACE

COLLEGE STATION, Tex.—The return of Joe Brown, veteran center and letterman with the Aggies last season, to the fold after an enforced absence of nearly a month has considerably enhanced the prospects of Coach John Reid's Texas Aggie cagers for their 1930 Southwest Conference basketball race, which they will open Friday night when the S. M. U. Mustang charges of Coach Jimmy St. Clair invaded Aggieland for a set-to on the A. & M. Memorial Gymnasium court.

Brown was kept out of pre-season practice with an attack of appendicitis, for which it was first thought an operation would be necessary, but the condition of the veteran Aggie athlete was so greatly improved during the week preceding New Year's Day that he was able to participate in the all-star gridiron clash between the Midwest and Southwest elevens at Dallas. Since his return to school he has attended cage practice regularly, making rapid strides toward regaining the form with which he won recognition as a center and guard last season.

May Prescribe Squad
Friday's game with the Ponies is expected to go a long way toward determining the calibre of the quintet with which Coach Reid will make his fight for conference laurels although the record his charges have hung up in the non-conference meets with the Sam Houston Bear-kats, Houston Triangles and Centenary Gentlemen has already won them serious consideration as strong contenders in the title race this year.

Against the Gents Monday and Tuesday, Coach Reid used a lineup slightly different to that used in the pre-Christmas games, placing Captain Harry Keeton, diminutive all-Southwest guard last year, on a forward during part of the game. Johnny Konecny, whose crack basket-tossing has been a strong point in the Aggies' offense this season, manned the other forward. Konecny is also a converted guard.

Francis Broiles, freshman numeral man from Fort Worth, appeared in the starting lineup against the Gents at a guard with Beau Bell, whose long shots proved the undoing of the Houston Triangles in the first game at Houston, on the other guard. Broiles earned his numeral at A. & M. two years ago but was not in school last year and has been slow in hitting his former stride. His work of the past week, however, indicates that Coach Reid will likely find him one of his strongest assets during the remainder of the season.

Pivot Man Matched
The work of Cecil Hoke at center has continued to be one of the features of the Aggies' play since the outset of the season and Aggie sup-

porters are predicting that the swift Aggie pivot-man will be among the top-notchers when the final ratings are made at the close of the season. Hoke is an excellent shot and thus far in the season has consistently succeeded in gaining the tip-off advantage for his team.

Although the Mustangs got off to a poor start in their 1929-30 schedule by dropping a pair of games each to the crack Oklahoma University cagers and the North Texas Teachers, Coach St. Clair is expected to bring a revamped team with him when he invades Aggieland Friday. The return of Bill Skeeters and Raymond Johnson, veterans who were not with the quintet early in the season, has greatly strengthened the team.

CONRAD NAGEL GETS KICK OUT OF MYSTERY

Mystery drama has an odd fascination for Conrad Nagel, who plays the role of "Richard Crosby" in "The Thirteenth Chair," Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's talking picture, adapted from the celebrated stage play, which comes today to the Yuca Theatre.

"There is something," says Nagel, "about a role in a mystery play that seems to put the actor on his toes—perhaps the continual thought that to sustain a mystery one must literally live the role, no matter what it is, in the story. The whole secret of the mystery play is in the genuineness of portrayals, for, as a rule, a fantastic plot will not be convincing unless every bit of action is so accurate that the audience literally lives within the play itself."

"When I played in 'London After Midnight,' which Tod Browning, who directed 'The Thirteenth Chair,' also directed, this was the first impression I had of mystery roles, and since then I have found that this impression was heightened by experience.

"'The Thirteenth Chair,' I think, is an ideal example of the mystery drama, for speech adds to the tenseness of the thrills, and the story itself handles a most weird situation so logically that there is no sense of disbelief. Of course we had Margaret Wycherly, who played the role on the stage, and made the play what it was, playing her old role of 'Madame La Grange' and one of the cleverest exponents of mystery among actors, Bela Lugosi, of 'Dracula,' as the sinister inspector. Miss Hyams, Hary Forbes, and the rest of the cast also give fine characterizations. I think that playing in this picture was one of the most interesting experiences of my career."

FIRE INSURANCE RATING OF SAN ANTONIO DONE

AUSTIN.—(AP)—The state fire insurance department has completed a task which required six months and cost about \$20,000—the rating of San Antonio.

Three hundred and fifty sets of rate books, each containing 12 volumes and each volume containing about 500 pages, were compiled. There books rate every building in San Antonio except dwellings. Sixty thousand buildings and occupants are rated.

Each town in Texas is rated every five years. The rating crew now in Waco and will go from there to Dallas. Copies of the rate books are sent to insurance companies.

CARNERA HOOKS HIS MAN WITH HIS 14-LB. CANE. CARNERA'S GARGANTUAN PEDAL EXTREMITIES CARNERA LIFTS HIS MAN

INTRODUCING the skyscraper of the ring—Primo Carnera, alias the Genoa Giant, who measures his punches by horsepower. Fisticiana's newest sensation has come to town and has more than lived up to all the fabulous stories that Tunney and other visitors to Europe have told of him. The Italian boxer, who until two years ago was a circus performer with his enormous "tootsies" wrapped in burlaps, is regarded by experts as exceptionally promising material. A far better prospect, in fact, than was Jess Willard at the corresponding stage of his career.

Carnera is six feet ten inches tall, weighs nearly 300 pounds, and carries a 14-pound cane to support his hefty frame. He wears size 17 shoes and encases his neck in a size 20 collar. When he was an itinerant circus performer his best meal consisted of seven pounds of bread, but now his breakfast includes such trifles as six eggs, 20 slices of toast, two quarts of milk, an enormous slice of ham, and maybe, a pint of orange juice. And after this modest repast he is ready for a limbering up at the gymnasium.

It is hoped late this month to stage Carnera a first bout in this country. Just now they are paging all the great fighters to find one to challenge conclusions with the Italian's fourteen-ounce boxing gloves, which measure sixteen and one-half inches, against the average ten and one-half "mitt."

Up to now there has been no great rush of giant boxers to offer themselves as a sacrifice to Primo Carnera. George Godfrey, the human ton of coal, would be a logical opponent after the Italian has had some experience of American ring methods.

Carnera is having his work-outs at Stillman's Gymnasium and proving that he is not just another ring freak. He displays considerable agility and is remarkably limber. He does not rest heavily on his enormous "dogs" nor does he lumber around. He knows how to use his left and carefully pulls his punches against lighter opponents. At all events, he is a life-saver just when the ring was devoid of colorful personalities and thrills.
