Many Midland county farmers do not know how badly their places need the poison, Wendt said in pointing out the great damage done

each year by prairie dogs.

The agent has 1,700 pounds of the dog poison and wll let farmers have it for cost, seven cents a pound.

This story, after reviewing the now-familiar story of overcrowding and antiquated equipment, added that conditions are best in the women's wing of thee prison, which houses 115 inmates—and three babies."

You can chew over that last little stinger in that sentence for quite a while; but no matter how long you chew over it, you'll never be able to get anything but an almighty bad taste out of it.



In buying Christmas books for children, it is difficult for most people to differentiate between ages. In the old days publishers and booksellers turned cut books indis-'criminately. A child's book was a child's book and that was the end of it. It didn't matter much whether he was ten or two.

Right on top of this rather chaotic state of affairs there emerged a flare for classics. And there we had it again—as long as they were classics the children should be taught to like them or not, classics they should have, and if they wouldn't read them themselves they had to sit and listen.

They were passed out in much the same spirit as castor oil and received about as welcomely.

But suddenly about ten years ago a really intelligent effort began to evolve on the part of the bookmakers to turn out books for children with definite purpose—the greatest purpose of all being suitability to age. And at the same time writers, realizing the need of more and better children's books and the children's right to have them, began to give us classics in an entirely different sense of the word. Today there are hundreds of germs of literature on the bookstands for children of all ages.

Books For All Ages For the first baby books there are the indestructible ones with very large pictures. A very little child reads by pictures. He will love pictures of animals and children particularly. "Mother Goose" is the earliest classic as we speak of classics now. There is something about "Mother Goose" that lives on

Books up until four should contain simple stories, easily understood and remembered. Stories of animals, that make them act like people, and tales of toys, and of children have the most appeal. They should be illustrated. Children of this age love little books, too, that they can carry around.

After this, the field broadens and diversifies. Boys and girls begin to develop individual tastes. Fairy tales: short adventures, real animal stories, as well as the Peter Rabbit kind short verse illustrated more stories of children, and the purely imaginative story that lies between the realm of fairyland and reality.

Next come the thrilling tales of Knights, and Indians, historical tales of adventure, interesting biography, and more adventure. There are innumerable and fascinating books of fact, things about the world and people. The children adore them.




