One of the best bits of news we have had in a long William B. Shearer when he sought to unburden his soul in a public lecture in New York.





The league covenant recognizes the desirability of lowering armaments to the lowest possible point consistent with national safety and of the enforcement by common action of international obligations. Under Article X members are guar anteed against aggression and undertake to protect against external aggression the territorial integrity and existing political independence of all members. The league council is to decide what contributions of force should be made by other members against one

considered to have committed an act of war. The World Court, whose protocols were recenty signed by this country and probably will be ratified by the Senates, sits as a judicial body in purely international disputes. Its strongest feature is an optional clause through which nations agree to accept its decisions as compulsory once they have submitted disputes to it. Forty-two nations have accepted that clause, including England, France, Germany

Despite the creation of the World Court, the international Court of Arbitration is still doing business at the Hague. It failed to prevent the World War because Austria-Hungary refused to let her case against Serbia go there. It arbitrates in cases involving such problems as boundaries, fisheries and debts. It is overshadowed, of

course, by the new World Court. One method of preserving peace is in the use of international commissions between countries with unguarded boundaries. Our treaty with Canada, the star example, created a commission which has settled innumerable boundary discperating here, is strongly advocating a similar treaty between the





FOREHEADS TO BE VISIBLE ONCE MORE

Foreheads have been out of style so long that many women hardly know what theirs look like; and now that foreheads, to be chic, must be visible, a lot of women are discovering that theirs are not what they used to be. What to do about the things that spoil classic brows is told by Hildegarde Fillmore, beauty editor of McCall's Magazine, in the February issue:

"It's an accepted fact now that if you have an interesting forehead you must show it. With the new importance of foreheads we're discovering new potentialities for beauty

"To change that sculptured hair line above the eyes means changing your style of hairdressing. Though it may be hard to shift the parting and the wave, or alter the cut of the hair about the face, scalp experts tell us it's a good thing to do occasionally. When we keep a part in one place too long the hair there has a tendency to get thin and poor. Perhaps the best way to cultivate an open brow is to dress your hair a little higher on the fore head each day, watching the hair line carefully so that it never gets that strained look.

"Perhaps you'll find that your forehead isn't quite the smooth classic brow you thought it was. Tiny up-and-down lines will form between the eyes, and horizontal traceries above them. Just treating the texture of the skin with creams and gentle massage isn't enough though it does help to eradicate these lines.

"Usually there's a more deeplyseated cause for them. Here are some common ones: wearing too-tight garments or poorly fitted shoes that pinch; maintaining bad posture neglecting inner bodily disturbances especially around the digestive regions-that cause headaches (from little headaches great wrinkles grow!); wearing eyeglasses too tight on the nose; improperly fitted lenses or lenses not adjusted to changes of vision. All these things may make furrows in brows that were once smooth and unlined. .
"Sometimes face powder, instead

of making the forehead look smoother and less wrinkled, only seems to deepen the effect of the party in the home of Charlie Neal lines. If this happens, try using a liquid powder for a change. 

Panhandle Feeding One Million Head

AMARILLO.—(AP)—Cattlemen in the Texas Panhandle are feeding a million head this winter, most of the animals being on both pasture and feed, Grover C. Butler, secretary of the Panhandle livestock association, estimates.

We have about a million cattle feeding in the Panhandle this winter," he said. "It is not as many as we usually have. There are not many cattle being fed on full feed. Most of them are on both feed and

"The pastures this winter have been in good shape. I do not think the cold weather has hurt cattle as much as people think. We know better how to take care of them." Mr. Butler estimated the normal movement out of the Panhandle in year is between 500,000 and 600,-000 head. "Most of the young stuff goes to Kansas, Nebraska, and Illinois," he added.
