Rural education in Midland county will not be seriously affected by the injunction granted in San Antonio last week restraining state school officials from distributing \$5,000,000 state aid money, as this county's quota of the fund has been received and partially distributed, according to County Superintendent M. R. Hill.

Five dollars of the \$17.50 state apportionment money for each scholastic in the county has been received; \$2.50 of the amount was paid in September, \$1.50 in October, and \$1 in January.

The state aid fund received recently is based on recommendations of the rural school inspectors who have a code of requirements which must be met before reports are sub-



The company was capitalized at \$50,000. Through rediscount privileges of the Federal Reserve banks, a half million dollars will be available for Midland cattlemen at from 7 to 8 per cent, depending on the

SEVERITY OR KINDNESS?

Apparently there are still people in this country who are afraid that we are treating our criminals too gently.

Judge Edwin O. Lewis of Philadelphia, delivering his charge to the January grand jury, warned the jurors not to be too sentimental when they paid their regular visits to the county's penal institutions. A prison, he said, must be strict and hard in order to cure robbers and murderers of their criminal leanings.

"A prison sentence of even 30 days is intended to teach a man a lesson so that he will not commit crime again," said the judge.

"We do not send men to prison to have a happy holiday. So many of those who have been recently released have been committing crimes of violence that we are more Peace Can Be Worse Than War, for than ever disposed not to relax in our duty or to show sentimental tolerance and sympathy for criminals."

This is all very well, and certainly no one will deny that we want to protect ourselves against robbers and murderers in any way we can. The only trouble is that our present regime, which is at least fairly harsh, isn't doing it very well.

Sheldon and Eleanor Glueck of Harvard recently studied the careers of 500 criminals in Massachusetts penal institutions. They made some interesting discoveries; among them, the discovery that 80 per cent of 510 men discharged from the Massachusetts, reformatory went right on committing crimes after their release. And Dr. Richard C. Cabot of Harvard comments on that fact as follows
