### **POTASH FINDINGS** TO BE PUBLISHED WOULD HELP HERE

Midland county and select other areas of West Texas may benefit in publicity from the decision of the government to publish results of study on potash mining and refining

The greatest beds on this continent are found in Midland county where the sea dropped its final sus pension of the valuable salt.

An extensive research on the ex traction of potash from several minerals has been organized during the past two years by the United States Bureau of Mines. Special attention has been given to Texas polyhalite Wyoming leucite and New Jersey green sands as raw sources of potash. This work, which is being conducted at the bureau's nonmetallic minerals experiment station in cooperation with Rutgers University. New Brunswick, N. J., has indicated three economically feasible processpolyhalite

Details of the polyhalite work will be published in the near future. With regard to green sands and leucite, detailed economic surveys and did not appear. #### PROTECTING RETAIL CREDIT

Midland is fortunate in having a well organized system of credit rating, or credit association. Most of the business institutions of the city subscribe to this service and are active in keeping its records up to date; all of which makes the system more effective and beneficial.

The association is beginning a plan to hold regular meetings, so that business leaders of the city can sit together and discuss plans for improvement of credit conditions.

Merchants and business men who attend the meetings will be helping their own credit conditions and will be rendering a service to the business life of Midland.

#### THE OLD ROLL-TOP DESK

It had never been a very big business, but it had been moderately prosperous, and it has lasted for 50 years and now it was closing its doors.

Its main office was on a side street a little way removed from the main business district. The glass windows displayed the stock in trade-leather goods, harness of various kinds, queer-looking appliances to puzzle the eas-"ual onlooker, brief cases and straps and so on.

The fittings were not remarkable. Rather old-fashgioned, they were; especially the old roll-top desk at the rear, where the owner, and his father before him, had sat to direct the business. The desk probably had been installed when the place was first opened, half a century ago. Now the business was being closed out. Bidders for the desk probably would be few. Roll-top desks of that type aren't in much demand now.

Indeed, speculating on the melancholy downfall of an honorable old firm, one is tempted to wonder whether that roll-top desk, preserved unchanged throughout all the Eyears of change, might not be rather symbolic.

To hang on to a roll-top desk through 50 years indi--cates a sort of conservation, a clinging to old customs and gold ways. But the last couple of decades, in the business world, have not been good years for the conservative They have put the business man under the iron necessity of keeping abreast of the times mentally. Those who failed to do so have gone under.

This is not the same sort of world it was a generation nounce disaster on any business executive who could not divorce himself from the old ways.

The old pace was leisurely and dignified. But now? Speed is the great word. The airplane, the radio, the telephoto system, the long-distance telephone network, the telegraphic night letter—these are the insignia of the new

order. They are the emblems of a multitude of changes. As a result of all of this, incalculable changes are taking place in the business world. Old firms are vanishing, porations. Business of a small scale has to step fast and keep all of its wits about if it is to survive.

And here we come back to the roll-top desk. Isn't it at suprise swimming party; Captain After coroner removes body from possible that this old desk was a symbol of an inability to change, and inability to adapt an old-fashioned organization and old-fashioned business practices to a new era?

The old ways may have been more pleasant, more gracious, more human—but they are gone, and weeping won't bring them back. The rule that the fittest shall survive was never as inexhorable as it is in American business today. And the roll-top desk, with all that it symbolizes, belongs to a by-gone era.





Labor Department statisticians express doubt whether the February figure will show much change, but the American Federation of Labor's report showing an increase of from 20 per cent of union members idle in 24 cities for January to 22 per cent in February does not indicate the likelihood of any substantial improvement. One way to guess at the number

of unemployed is to fix the number of wage earners in 1926 at 40,-000,000-the 1922 census showed an additional million or so-and apply the 10 per cent decrease in manufacturing employment shown by the oureau's index figures. The result s about 4,000,000. But that method is much too simple. Some lines of work have been harder hit than manufacturing, others considerably less. There is also a theory that about 1.000,000 persons are ou of work at all times and these aren't covered by the index figures. The factor of seasonal unemployment should also be kept in mind.

Sees Census as Help The Bureau of Labor Statistics apparently has no great hope that Congress will give it the few millions it needs to establish an accurate system of counting unemployed, but it believes the unts work. This census itself will involve a special schedule.
