AUSTIN, March 14. (AP) -The penitentiary reformation conference committee was plainly at the end of the rope today, after rejecting the plan of Representative Dewey Young of the house conferees to spend \$600,000 supplying emergency needs of the system.

Better Roads Chief Plank In His Platform

WACO, March 14. (AP) Fred B. Robinson, veteran newspaper publisher and advocate of more and better State highways without extravagance, threw his "coat in the middle of the road" in Texas' gubernatorial race

Announcing his candidacy for governor on the Democratic ticket, Robinson reiterated his well-known stand for good roads and lower taxes, opposed the proposed state highway bond issue and favored reduction of motor vehicle license fees and cutting of the gasoline tax from four to two cents per gallon He would advocate rebuilding of



WASHINGTON, March 13.—(UP) have been the main support of the plantins of truck crops for spring S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics. Hog prices have advanced steadily since last November and hog producers have fared better than they did last winter.

'The hog situation and in lesser degree the beef cattle situation seem to be the bright spots at present as far as the livestock industries are concerned." the Bureau said. "The world-wide slump in grain prices and the weakness in cotton, however, have not tended to encourage producers of those crops. Lower prices for dairy products and for lambs likewise have raised discouraging signals within those two important livestock in-

"Continuance of the weakness in the wheat market and the recent sharp decline in domestic wheat prices are attributed by the bureau principally to the relatively slow movement of the season's comparatively small supplies into consuming channels. World shipments of wheat and flour in the first half of the current crop year were only
