Midland Officials Deny Road Report

Rumors to the effect that Midland has been working toward the end of rnishing bread with its complinesday until Saturday, inclusive, by obtaining state designation of a road to run from Midland through Faskin, to Florey, and thence to Seminole, such road to be substituted for the proposed route running from Odessa through Andrews and thence to Seminole, was denied last week by officials of the Midland Chamber of Commerce in a statement to the Andrews Driller, that newspaper says. Data was given regarding the amount spent of road improvement in Andrews county by Midland, and hope was expressed that Andrews and Midland could soon come to an understanding with regard to the fulfillment of their

agreements. The account continues: Checks for the last work done by the Midland Chamber of Commerce on the Andrews-Midland road were paid by that organization Wednesday. These checks amounted to \$1.-The Midland Chamber paid \$111 to hire men to throw rocks out of the road. The sum of \$488 was paid for grubbing. In other words, Midland spent \$1,699 on the road. All of this was in Andrews county Prior to this work, Midland spent

over \$600 grubbing a road from South Camp to the Odessa-Andrews road at Clabber Hill. In other words Midland has spent in the past four months over \$2,300 on roads in Andrews county.

For Tirpitz was the man who showed the world how horrible and unscrupulous a naval blockade could really be by finleashing Germany's submarines in the "unrestricted" warfare that eventually brought the United States into the conflict.

According to this view, the German fleet-rigorously trained, under Von Tirpitz's directions, for years—was actually more ready for war in 1914 than the British fleet was outweighed and outnumbered, but ship for ship and man for man it was the better fighting unit.





WASHINGTON, March 17. (A)-Texas gained approximately 28.500 acres, or 44.6 square miles of land from Oklahoma, when the supreme court today approved the boundary between the states, running north from the Red River as surveyed and marked by Samuel Gannett.

The eastern boundary of the Texas Panhandle, which the supreme court decided should be along the hundredth meridian, was found by Commissioner Gannett to be erroneously located, 4,043 feet on Texas territory at its southern end on the Red River; 880 feet at the northern end, at the northeast corner of the Panhandle.


