BERLIN, July 6, (UP)-Mattern and Griffin landed at Tempelhof airdrome at 5:22 this afternoon, or at 11:42 this morning eastern standard time, 31 hours and 41 minutes from New York and 18 hours and 40 minutes from Harbor Grace.

This was two hours and 53 minutes better than the Post-Gatty record. Mattern and Griffin had flown approximately 4,200 miles. Of this, 2,950 was a non-stop from Harbor Grace to Berlin.

### A REVIVAL OF NATIONAL SPIRIT

One of the most interesting things about the current demand for economy in government is the way in which numerous small cities reacted to the recent congressional proposal for an extensive postoffice building campaign.

In the old days the "pork barrel" bill was always a sure-fire hit. It got through Congress over and over again because each congressman wanted to make the folks back home think that he was a big shot, and the easiest way to do it was by getting an elaborate postoffice building put up in some town in his district.

In the aggregate, this was always horribly expensive; but such bills almost always got through because the separate districts always thought more of their own bit of pork than they did of the federal budget.

This year, however, things are different. There is,

for example, the state of Missouri.

The proposal in the House of Representatives would have given new postoffices to 17 northwestern Missouri towns. But it wasn't long before the people in these towns began to object violently. They would like new buildings very much, but they would prefer to see Uncle Sam practice a little rigid economy. So most of them let their representatives know in unmistakable terms that the pork barrel would make no friends back home this year.

Nor was this phenomenon peculiar to Missouri. It hap-

All of this, when you stop to think about it, is very encouraging to a believer in democracy.

Too many congressmen have tackled all problems from the local angle and have let the national angle go hang. What we are witnessing now is a revival of the national spirit. It restores one's faith in the republic's integrity.

### U. S. S. R. Acts to Protect Horses

MOSCOW-For the protection both of the horses and their owners the central authorities have pub-lished a decree forbidding officials to commandeer horses whether for their personal or for government

their personal of the use.

The decree is in line with the new policy of safeguarding the peasantry in their private property rights. It applies to private farmers and to farm collectives alike.

The commandeering of horses by local officials has been cause of complaints for generations, before and after the revolution. Soviet

complaints for generations, Soviet and after the revolution. Soviet functionaries inherited the Czzarist habit of ordering the peasants to provide horses for official journeys, road-building, grain transport and other purposes, without payment, of

other purposes, without payment, of course.

The decree gives individual owners and collectives the full right to discover such orders. Even when the horses are needed in connection with legitimate public works, their use must be sanctioned by no less a body than the Council of People's Commissars and full payment must be made.

must be made.

In general, the Kremlin is announcing many measures intended to halt the destruction of horses through undernourishment and overwork. It is emphasizing the im-portance of horse-breeding and ra-

portance of horse-breeding and rational care of horses.

The tendency in some places to regard horses as obsolete with the advent of tractors and automobiles is denounced by the Moscow government as a "left deviation."

It underlines the importance of the horse not only in agriculture. the horse not only in agriculture but in national defense.

The famous cavalry leader, Gen-

eral Semion Budenny, is taking a leading part in the national cam-paign for the protection of horses.

### Dead Man's Body Causes Law Suit



No sooner had the man died, it is stated, than a dozen highpowered burial salesmen, using corporation methods, descended upon the dwelling and fought among themselves for the corpse. ### Hoover Wrong Again Says Senator Wagner

WASHINGTON—Senator Robert F. Wagner of New York, in reply to President Hoover's criticism of some features of the emergency relief bili passed by the senate, took occasion on the floor of the senate to declare that the executive's record for being wrong on legislation did not justify him in criticizing this measure. Senator Wagner said:

"Mr. Hoover was wrong on the agricultural problem when he contrived the federal farm board and the stabilization corporations which today have, as far as I know, no defender inside or outside of the senate.

"Mr. Hoover was wrong on the tariff when he signed the Smoot-Hawley bill over the protest of the informed and expert opinion of the ountry.
"Mr. Hoover has been continuously

"Mr. Hoover has been continuously and invariably wrong on unemployment. He was wrong when he resisted the effort during times of prosperity to prepare for the possible day of depression. He was wrong when he announced on March 7, 1930, that within 60 days the depression would be over. He was wrong more recently when he declared that the reconstruction finance corporation would contribute to the resumption of employment and the stabilization of prices, and that no more direct methods were necessary.

"In view of this record I declare that the public will do well to reject the criticism of one who has throughout the dtpression been wrong, late, and futile, and to rely upon the good judgment and sincerity of purpose of those who have been right."


