OTHER DRIES GET TOGETHER FOR MOVE

INDIANAPOLIS, July 6.—Indications the big national temperance organizations are interested in sponsoring Senator Borah as a third party candidate for the presidency were in evidence as the prohibition party opened its quadrennial convention.

Leaders of the party said representatives of the national groups were urging it to postpone naming a candidate until after the national conference of organizations supporting the prohibition party.

Might Make Race Meanwhile, those familiar with negotiations to obtain Borah's acceptance of the prohibition party's nomination, said they were definitely of the opinion if a number of the big temperance groups would give him their active support he would make the race.

This, however, conflicted with views of the Idaho senator's Washington friends. Borah is on record as believing economic issues are predominant and that the prohibition question is not the basis for a successful third party campaign.

Two men who sit on the national prohibition board attended Tuesday's meeting, saying they were solely as observers. They were Bishop James Cannon Jr. of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, and Canon William Cheate Chase of the Council of Churches of Christ in America.

May Place Name If the move to adjourn the convention before nominations are reached is unsuccessful, Cannon is considering placing Borah's name before the group himself.

Smith, Delegate, Points Out Democratic Harmony

College Not Necessary



Janette MacDonald didn't go to college, but she seems to be doing very well in the movies.

District Attorney W. R. Smith, who has returned from the democratic national convention at Chicago, where he went as a Texas delegate, believes there has never been achieved in the democratic party more harmony than that which resulted from the party choice for leaders and general, the framing of its platform.

It was on the shoulders of the greatest state, Texas, that party harmony rested, and the delegation fully realized this. From early indications it became apparent that the nomination of Roosevelt would be the inevitable result of the convention, and it was apparent also that the strictly "stop Roosevelt" people, of which there were said to be a number in the Texas delegation, were composed mostly of persons favorable to reactionary rather than progressive and liberal policies in the federal government.

Realizing these things a comparatively small group in the Texas delegation, who had theretofore joined the stop Roosevelt movement, insofar as Roosevelt was in the way of Garner's nomination, commenced working toward the end of swinging Texas to Roosevelt just as soon as Garner should send word that he had released the delegation. They realized that Texas could thereby break the deadlock, start the Roosevelt landslide and insure Garner's selection for the vice presidency.

Garner's release was construed by them as a request that Texas go to the Roosevelt camp, since if Garner had desired to stop Roosevelt he could have done so for a while at least by the simple expedient of withholding his vote. The same group of Texans believed also that if they had not started the landslide, Ohio or some other state would, and Garner's chances at the second place in the nomination of vice president would be a head start.

The matter came to a head at the Texas caucus held at the Sherman hotel immediately before the convention met on Friday night for the calling of the roll for the historic fourth ballot. The fruits of 36 hours' work on the parts of the small Texas group was a roll call in the caucus held after Garner's release of the delegation had been announced by Representative Sam Grayson. The delegation went to Roosevelt by a majority of only four votes, which insured, under the unit rule, the entire 46 Texas votes for Roosevelt.

Such seems to be the consensus of opinion around Hollywood among those who are supposed to know all there is to know about making film stars—the executives and directors. They are the men who do a large extent guide the destinies of that large body of actors and actresses now inhabiting movie-land.

A few years ago before the film industry found its vocal organs education didn't mean a great deal as far as success on the screen was concerned. But today all that has changed. The girl or boy with a college education stands a much better chance of making the grade in pictures than one without it.

That was what a prominent executive told me a short time ago. This seemed to be some merit to what he said. So I talked with other executives and directors on the same subject. Their opinions all coincided.

Well, that just about cinched matters. I was willing to admit that a college course did mean quite a lot in the life of a film player. Then I started thinking about how many of our Hollywood girls ever trod a college campus—except as visitors. That ruined a beautiful theory. Facts are facts, and the contrary. Selecting two dozen of our most successful actresses, I discovered that only one-third of them ever attended college—two-thirds didn't.

As far as the men are concerned, the ratio is a little different. But we will have to take that up at a later date. Dealing with 25 girls in one story is in itself quite enough. Among those who decided to seek their careers without waiting to see that higher education, are Mary Pickford, Joan Crawford, Norma Shearer, Ann Harding, Greta Garbo, Janet Gaynor, Miriam Hopkins, Claudette Colbert, Dolores del Rio, Ruth Chatterton, Tallulah Bankhead, Jeanette MacDonald, Sylvia Sydney, Lorelei Young, Sally Eilers and Mary Brian.

Needless to say, these young ladies (and some are not so young) are doing quite well for themselves, thank you. Not a one regrets the step she took. However, neither do those on the other side of the fence. Among them we find Constance and Joan Bennett, Marlene Dietrich, Kay Francis, Helen Twelvetrees, Irene Dunne and Dorothy Jordan.

It doesn't seem quite right to argue against institutions of higher learning. But facts are facts. Hence the only conclusion one can draw is that while a university education always is desirable—those sheepskins are nice to show the grand children—it is difficult to regard it as any kind of an aid to a girl with aspirations to become a screen star. Well, she might lose her ambition while in college, which would make those years very much worth while—it's a tough climb to screen stardom.

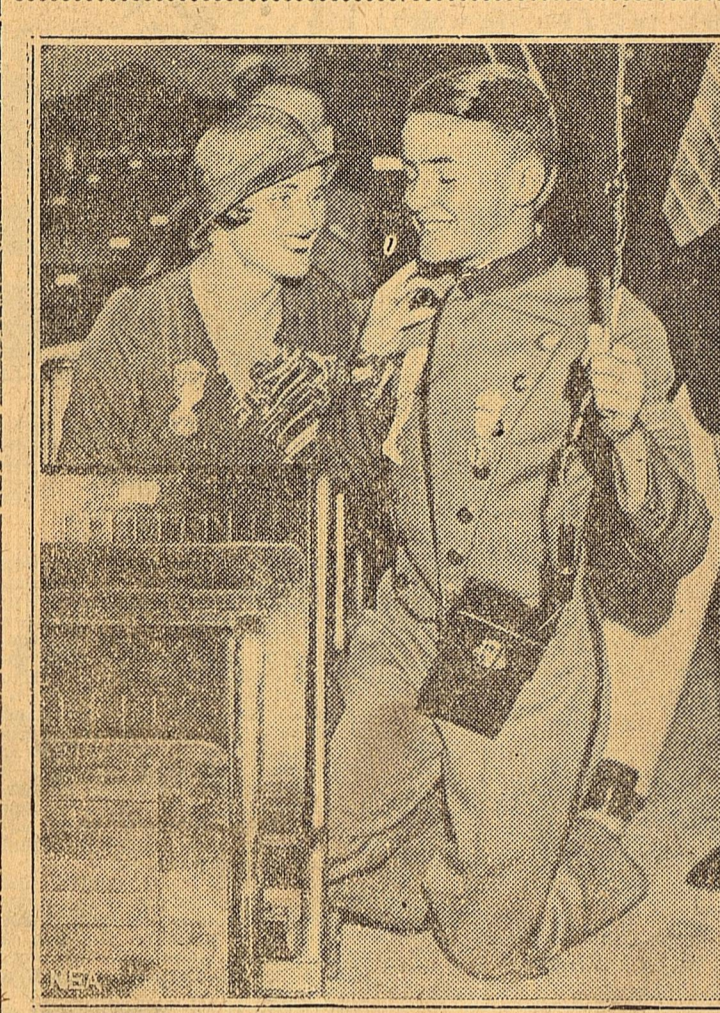
WILL H. HAYS, BEHIND SCENES, TO RUN HOOVER CAMPAIGN, WRITER SAYS

WASHINGTON—Upon Will H. Hays, who helped to make up the republican national committee's deficit from the 1920 campaign with Sinclair oil bonds, will be given the task of conducting the campaign of Herbert Hoover this year, according to Clinton Gilbert, the eminent Washington correspondent and the Philadelphia Public Ledger (Rep.).

Everett Sanders, former Indiana congressman and one-time secretary to President Coolidge, recently chosen chairman of the republican national committee, will officiate in the last named capacity, but only as a mask for Hays, who will be the real power behind the throne, according to this veteran correspondent and political analyst. The return of Hays to party leadership "is what is back of the selection of Sanders as chairman of the republican national committee," Gilbert writes. "Sanders is a Hays man, brought out in Indiana politics by Hays and made a congressman by him."

The correspondent then says that President Hoover, looking for some one to turn his present campaign, considered former Senator Butler of Massachusetts and Will Hays, and then continued: "Hays ran the Harding campaign and Butler the Coolidge campaign. Hays probably would have been made chairman of the republican national committee except for the fact that he had been involved in the oil scandals to the extent that he had got several hundred thousand dollars in bonds from Harry Sinclair toward paying the deficit in the republican campaign fund incurred in the Harding campaign."

GARNER AND HOOVER CLASH TODAY ON UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF MEASURE AND CONFERENCE IS TO NO AVAIL

WASHINGTON, July 6, (UP)—President Hoover and the democratic house leadership clashed today in the Garner-Wagner unemployment relief bill struggle. Adjournment appeared to be delayed indefinitely. A two-hour conference at the White House failed to break the deadlock.

Garner took the house floor after the conference to "explain events" which occurred at the White House yesterday and today, and said he didn't believe the present form of the bill was acceptable to Hoover.

ARE AHEAD OF RECORD OF RECORD TWO HOURS

Mattern and Griffin Make up Valuable Time Lost

BERLIN, July 6, (UP)—Mattern and Griffin landed at Tempelhof airfield at 5:22 this afternoon, or at 11:42 this morning eastern standard time, 31 hours and 41 minutes from New York and 18 hours and 40 minutes from Harbor Grace.

This was two hours and 53 minutes better than the Post-Gatty record. Mattern and Griffin had flown approximately 4,200 miles. Of this, 2,550 was a non-stop from Harbor Grace to Berlin.

The plane was sighted this morning over Ireland, England and then Germany.

PILOTS OFF IN HAZE WITHOUT PARACHUTES

HARBOR GRACE, N. F., July 6, (UP)—Captain Bennett Griffin and James Mattern were over the broad Atlantic headed for Europe on the second leg of their projected round-the-world flight against time and the record of Wiley Post and Harold Gatty.

The two American flyers who left New York early yesterday and reached Harbor Grace after being lost in fog banks that left them three hours marooned in the Bermuda Islands at this point, had refreshments, refueled and within approximately two hours more were headed east with one thought predominant: "We want to get there, that's all."

At their departure from New York, the flyers said, the weather was perfect. As they neared Nova Scotia they encountered the fog. They had been aloft for 12 hours when they were forced to drop a note near Cape Frels to ascertain the direction to Harbor Grace and then overflew their destination by more than 100 miles, while the time of Griffin and Mattern was increased around and finally landed here.

After taking on refreshments for their long ocean hop, the flyers got away at 4:59 p. m., eastern standard time. They said they hoped to make the week's work \$470, bringing the total revenues since the installation of the banks to \$32,500.

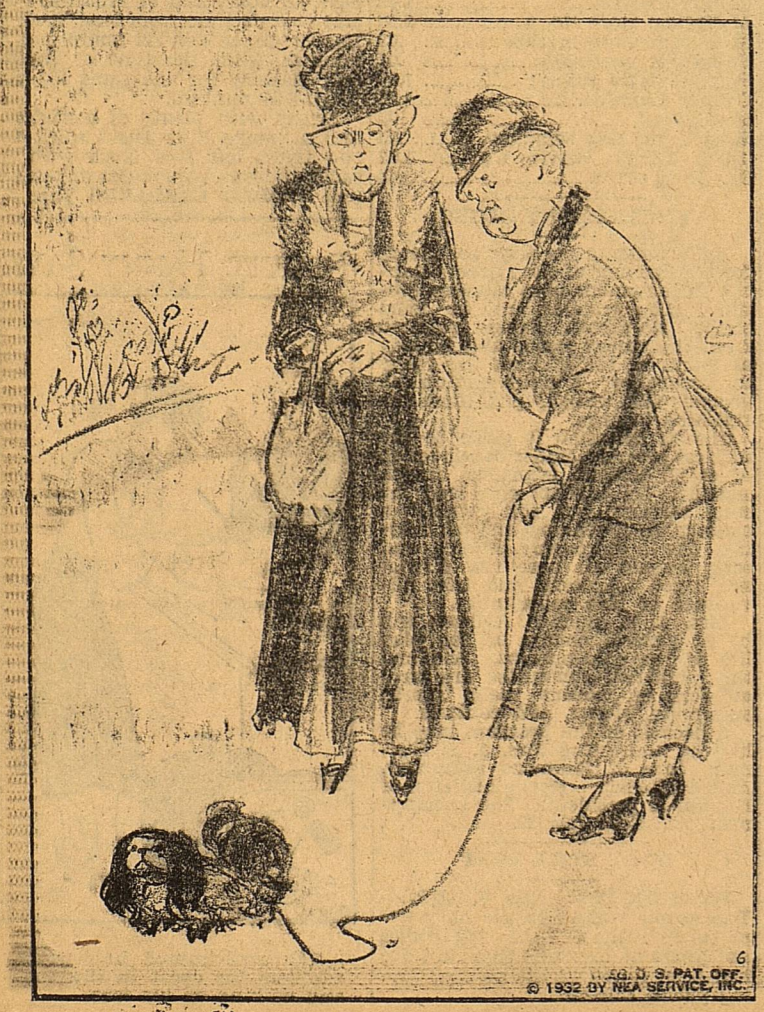
300,000 ROVING BOYS

BAVARIA THREATENS TO DISRUPT GERMANY IF CROWN PRINCE OF THE PAST IS GIVEN THRONE OF PRUSSIA



Here is the way the map of western Germany will look if Bavaria, Wurtemberg and Baden carry out their threat to withdraw when...

By MILTON BRONNER NEA European Manager BERLIN—If the Von Papen-Von Schleicher government of Germany succeeds in its reputed plan to restore the throne and place ex-Crown Prince Frederick Wilhelm thereon, that action may be the rock on which a united Germany will crash.

The second factor is the personal popularity of Prince Rupprecht and the Wittelsbach line, of which he is the heir. A Wittelsbach ruled over Bavaria for more than seven centuries before the fortunes of the World War sent King Ludwig, father of Prince Rupprecht, scurrying into Austria to escape possible harm at the hands of the men who had overthrown the German empire in November, 1918.

Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria, who is considered the logical president regent of the proposed new nation.

Hitler-controlled government under "Crown Prince Willie's" prospective regime. They see in the proposed new government a combination which would give them no voice in federal matters. Another Big Stage Coming to Yucca

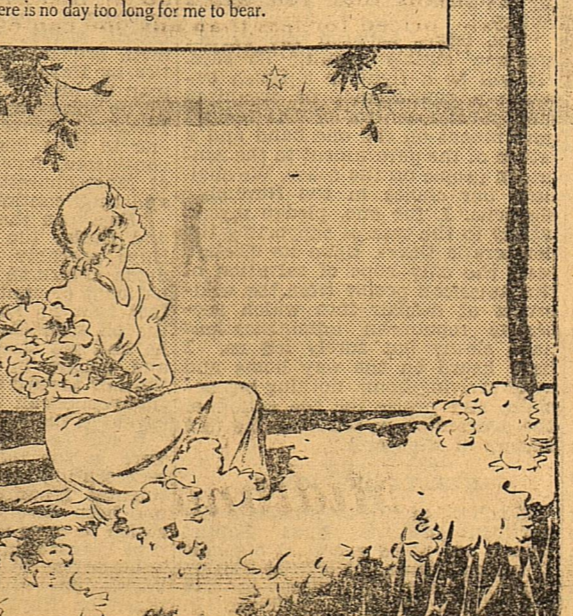
