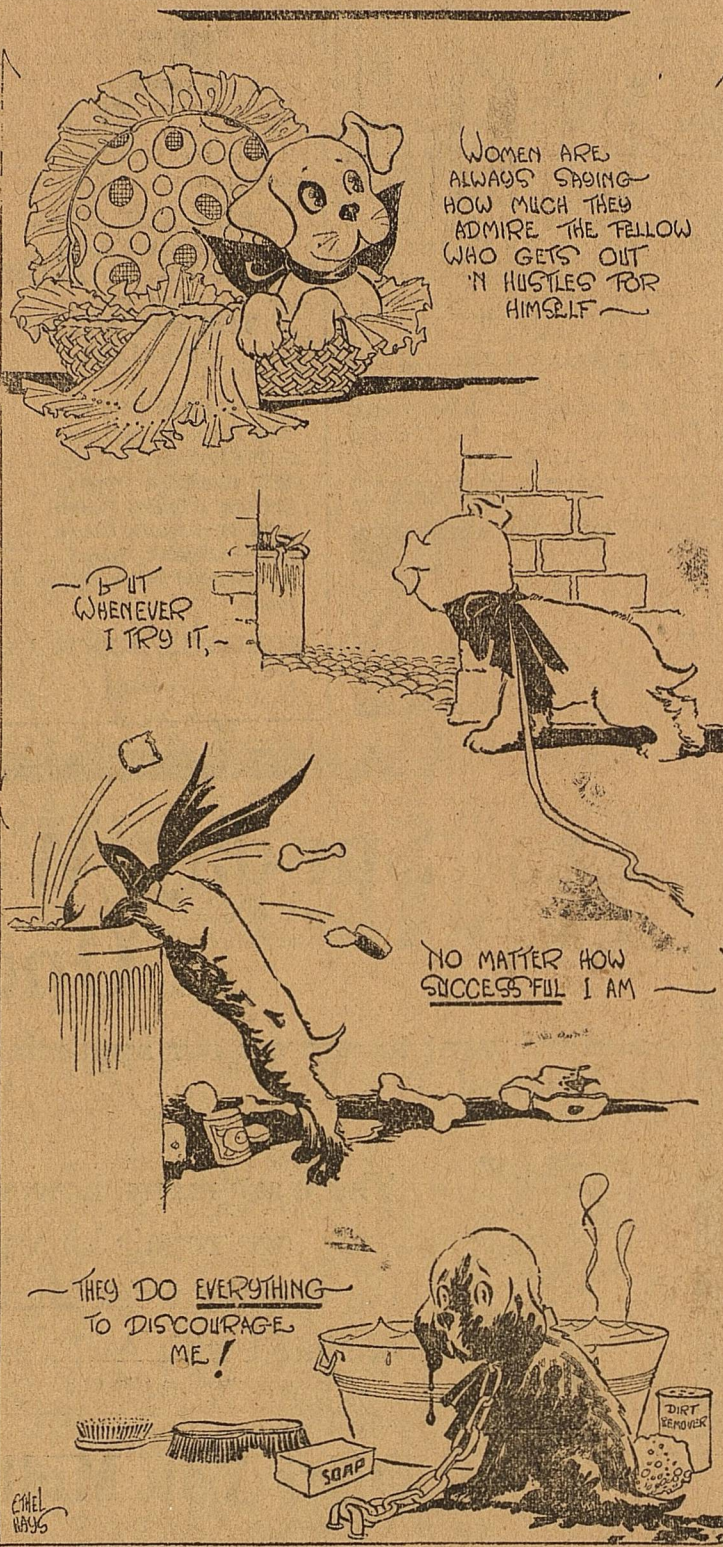

BROWNS MIGHT GET SOME PLACE THIS YEAR --- WITH HITTERS

MR. BALL, CAN'T YOU DO SOMETHING FOR BILL KILLEFER?

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., March 26.—There is gray in the head of Bill Killefer—and before he is through with this season of managing the ball team known as the St. Louis Browns there will be a lot more of it.

I had just come from Orlando, where Bill's buddy, Dan Howley, finally has fallen heir to a team that can clout the ball. After an exuberant session with Howley, sitting out a game with good old Bill Killefer strangely reminded me of an evening on the mourners' bench. For good old Bill Killefer needs more than anything else in the world a few people who, to use Dan Howley's eloquent expression, can "tato that old onion."

Without a great deal of hitting power, Dan Howley had the boys up there fighting last year until a capitalist named Phil Ball began reversing a few of Dan's commands. Dan Howley had brought the team up to contending positions in 1928 and 1929 when dissension split up the baseball house-hold—and the team started to play who-has-the-button.

Anyhow, They Can't Finish Ninth
Bill Killefer is not spilling enthusiasm about the baseball team he is managing. After a talk with good old Bill Killefer, you get the idea that he deserves on the strength of his own baseball prowess, a fate better than this. Beyond believing that the Browns will not finish ninth, it is a team upon which I do not care to commit myself. In this era, ball players are supposed to use bats, and the Browns and Philip DeCatesby Ball do not seem to realize that this has become the custom.

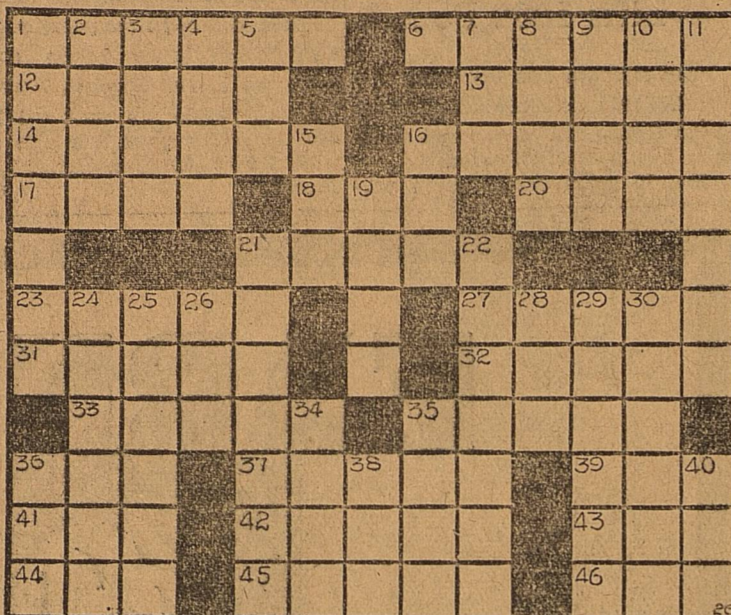
The St. Louis Browns of 1930 are going to be very good at stopping grounders and catching flies. The infield, composed of Lubezbe Blue at first, Oscar Melillo at second, Ralph Kress at short and either Frank O'Rourke or Sammy Hale at third base, is a good defensive infield—in fact, one of the best. But O'Rourke batted 251 last year, Melillo batted 236, Blue batted 293 and Kress, the only infielder above .300, batted for .305. Frank O'Rourke is 36 years old and cannot be expected to perk up to hit .600 this year, while Sammy Hale, alternate, hit 277 last season and can be counted on for just about that and nothing more.

No One to Help Manush
The club finished sixth in batting last year. The average was .276, and that was made with Heinie Manush,

he alert outfielder, kissing that apple for 355. Fred Shulte hit for 307. Morris Badgro, playing in 51 games, hit 284, and while Morris's s improving at the plate and is a well fielding outfielder, there are no indications he will lead the American League in hitting during this year of our Lord and George Earhshaw.

Fred Bennett, outfielder, batted 336 last year, but mind you, that was with Wichita Falls, Texas, and lots of people who hit in Texas cannot get themselves accustomed to the St. Louis climate. The reverse outfielders probably will be Bennett or Ted Gulle. Gulle hit 316 at Tulsa last year, including 32 home runs, which makes the young man very popular with good old Bill Killefer. The other outfielder is Earl McNeely, who batted all of 243 last season in 69 ball games.

With regard to catchers, good old Bill Killefer has Rick Ferrell, a very fair catcher and an ambitious boy, but Mr. Ferrell batted a mere .229 last year, which is not so very thrilling. Clyde Manion, another receiver, batted 243, an uninspiring figure. This year, Bernard Hungling of Dayton and Newark has been added to the roster, but Bernie batted but 250 last year, and that with Newark, the statistics are hardly worth mentioning.

Pitchers! Ah, Those Pitchers!
It is only when good old Bill Killefer looks at his pitchers that he smiles a little, reminiscently. The Browns really have a few lads who know what to do with that ball when a batter is up there. This little coterie of gentlemen has been saving the Browns and wasting themselves for years. I am referring to Alvin Crowder, Sam Gray, Walter Stewart, Rip Collins and George Blechholder. Among the other people who throw are Messrs. Kimsey, Coffman and Ogden. These three finished in the red last year, large-

ly because their side could not find a way to make runs without hitting the ball.

Most likely among the pitching rookies are Holzhauser, brought from Baltimore; Earl Caldwell from Waco, Texas; and Rolland Stiles from Tulsa. Good old Bill Killefer likes these three lads pretty well. Besides there is a southpaw named Fred Stiley, who knows very well how hot it is in Beaumont, Texas, on July 4. The Browns need left handers, too, and Fred batted .268 down there last year and that ought to help.

"I need some hitters," was what Bill Killefer told me.

When Bill takes to you he is so personable and friendly that you almost wish you could reach into your pocket and hand him a couple of 250 batters with your compliments.

I don't see why Phil Ball doesn't do a little something for such a lovely gentleman.

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A Lay Critic's Conception

One thing that we particularly like about Harley Sadler is that he keeps his acting within the confines of the stage. He does not permit his gaze to wander from the straight line of its duty. He never makes a wise crack and then steal a side glance at the audience to see if it has met with proper approval. If the characters in his plays have to speak their lines directly at him his whole attention is given to receiving what they are saying and his attitude indicates that he is interested in nothing else.

Sadler possesses an artistry that enables him to get over the footlights the proper interpretation of every line he utters. He has a delicacy of emphasis that is never stogy. He never resorts to anything vulgar and his plays are clean, wholesome and very entertaining. We do not know the names of the members of his company but in the Watts Family Monday night the landlady part was as fine bit of character work as can be seen on any stage. The mother part was also cleverly portrayed. The rest of the cast, apart from Sadler, had small parts which however they handled in a manner that kept the theme of the play in its proper groove.

It is no part of this writer's inclination to be pedantic in criticism nor is it any part of his desire to show off what he knows about things but it is suggested, and this is largely for Sadler to digest, that he should be a bit careful about turning loose, for rendition, the Prison Song from Il Travatore to be sung through megaphone from the orchestra pit. There are too many radios and phonographs that shoot it out as it should be shot that comparison becomes a matter of habit and that is bad for anything but the best.

However, Sadler's shows should be patronized every night they are here. He has competent artists fully able to produce the professional touch that is so enjoyable in a performance.

There is nothing amateurish about their work. His orchestra is competent and he has a Xylophonist that is a wonder. His conductor can get more split notes out of a trumpet than any man on earth and after he has split them a few times he finally gets them down to atoms which as the Greeks say is an ultimate indivisible impossibility. He alone is worth the price of admission.

This city is the better for Sadler's shows and as our old friend Flannagin says, "May his shadow never grow less."
