Jury Deliberates On Case Only An Hour Saturday

WASHINGTON, March 22 (UP)-Edward L. Doheny, oil multimillionaire from California, today was acquitted by a jury of bribing a cabinet officer. The verdict frees him of the last charge of an indictment that as been pending for five years. He was charged with giving Albert Fall, former secretary of the interior, \$100,000 to aid him in obtaining a valuable Elk Hills oil lease. Only one ballot was taken, the vote eing unanimous for acquittal.

THE FAILURE OF MARCH

The month of March must be marked down as a failure. It never quite gives satisfaction. Year after year it makes gaudy promises and always it follows them up with perfectly atrocious performances. Something, obviously, will have to be done about it.

In other months you know what to expect. In January, for instance, you look for mean weather, and when it comes you are ready for it. And in June the promise of a bright dawn is generally fulfilled. But March— March gives you a day that begins well and ends badly. It follows a spring morning with a winter afternoon. It is always raising your expectations and then letting you

It is, in short, a month that contents itself with giving hints. Every now and then it produces a day that shows what spring, when it comes, is going to be like. The householder, astir after his winter's hibernation, sets out gaily, and mutters in his beard about garden seeds, lawn fertilizer and such; but he does not get his soliloquy finished before the sun vanishes and a cold blast from the vicinity of Greenland turns his back yard into an Artic

All of this is hardly fair. Surely we have a right to know what to expect. March is neither one thing nor the other. If this new 13-month calendar can abolish March, by all means let's have it.

However, it is probable that March was devised for our education. For it is more or less our fate to be buffeted about, March-fashion, all our lives. We get great hints, every now and then, but they seldom bear fruit. If life is always to promise things and then withhold them, perhaps it is a good thing that we should have one month in the year to remind us of it. It keeps us from getting vainglorious and cocky.

Of course, it won't do to get too profound about it. As a general rule it is safe to beware of any writer when he starts tossing "life," "man" and "fate" into his sentences. That indicates, generally, a disordered liver or a disappointment in love. Still, there is no law against drawing deductions; and it really is possible to make something out of March.

For if March gives us a distant glimpse of earthly wonders without ever really letting us taste them, that is also the way of the world generally. It is prodigal of dazzling surmises. There are many mountain peaks from which the promised land can be seen. Reaching it is another matter, possible only to the supremely lucky. Disappointment is all most of us can expect.

Still, we know it is there. We have our glimpses, and they are something. For the bright mornings of March let us know that the earth is capable of better things, even if a raw, rain-laden wind does follow after. And that, in the month of March and in the rest of life generally, is what keeps us going.



Expressing his conviction that American consular officials were better qualified to effect a rescue than any other agencies on the west coast of Mexico, young Bristow said pefore leaving that he had placed his rescue program entirely under their direction.

American Consul William Blocker at Juarez had received no communications Friday from Vice-Consul Eaton, assigned from the Mazatlan consulate to investigate the kidnaping and holding of J. W Bristow for ransom.

It was believed that contact with the emissaries of the bandlt gang had not been made by Mexican of ficials. The ransom sum remained undetermined, being variously an nounced at 30,000 or 10,000 and 3,000

Acting on the advice of Consul Blocker, Gordon Bristow was to proceed to Mazatlan and leave the details of his father's release in the hands of Vice-Consul Eaton.


