Eight Killed, Many Injured, in Fireworks Plant Blast

More Bodies Thought To Be in Debris, Say Workmen

PHILADELPHIA, April 3. (P)-Fight persons were killed and scores injured in an explosion today at a plant of the Pennsylvania Fireworks Display company, incorporated, 16 miles west of here.

Thirty-five injured were taken to a hospital.

A number of bodies of plant employes was found in the debris, while search continued for others. The explosion was so terrific it was felt and heard for many miles. An automobile passing by the plant was reported blown from the

Potash Official Says Midland To Have Recognition

Midland county is destined to become the seat of one of the greatest mining and refining industries in the world.

Experimentation on dissociation of the elements in its former useless salts in order that reducing chemical compounds in solution with these by-product salts might result in useful elements and compounds in commercial quantity was pointed out Wednesday as one of two reasons why potassium mining has not been carried out steadily in Mid-

land county. The speaker was Homer R. Mitchell, former president of the Texas Potash Corp. Mitchell was in Midland with Dallas executives who visited here with

their special train. Homer Mitchell Speaker The other reason for failure to tangibly proceed with exploitation of the hidden strata is bound up in the continued move to capitalize the

enterprise, he showed: "There are 50 square miles of potash layers under one corner of your county," Mitchell told Midland men. "and the Texas Potash corporation which holds leases on this will begin at an early time to take this

wealth from the ground." . "The mining of this salt is a mere incident," he said later to The Reporter-Telegram, "comparable to copper mining in relation to the whole industry of mining the metal

smelting, shipping and marketing. Potash Refinery Here "Not only will potash be mined in Midland county, but it will be refined at our own refinery here, tested in our own local laboratories and shipped. The world's greatest beds are in Midland county: why not make the greatest mine here and the largest refinery?"

The problem of what to do with by-products of potassium, as well as for finding additional uses for the pure element has constituted the main bloc in development of the Midland beds, Mitchell said. The government has been cognizant of this need for information and appropriated a huge sum for research At the University of Texas Prof. Schoch has decided the matter, or a greater part of it, by his tests in affinity and interchangeability of molecular composition in three byproducts of the potash salt polyhalite's refining.

New Method Discovered Formerly, the sulphates of calcium,

magnesium and potassium were thrown off as by-products. These, particularly the sulphate of magnesium, are difficult to change chemically so that they would have a market value commensurate with the cost of handling them. Mitchell said recent laboratory tests have convinced chemical engineers of the ease in reducing these compounds by heating in solution with (See POTASH page 6)


"In our opinion we are not right in saying they (the dents. An accident story is news, just as is the story of some outstanding feat. The newspapers have always printed the facts as they found them. And if inaccuracies have crept into some of the stories it is the fault of those of us in the industry. . .

"We have had dealings with many newspaper men and reporters. Not one that we have ever known has been malicious or would write an intentionally derogatory statement about anyone without it being absolutely warranted. There are few professions with a stricter code of ethics. . . . Hence, if one makes it a point to treat the reporter fairly, he is bound to do the same to you.'

The same goes for newspaper cameramen, he add. Mr. Rheinstrom closes with this bit of advice:

"An operator is hurting rather than helping himself and the aviation industry when he makes a deliberate attempt to hide the facts and to prevent publication of the account of a crack-up. To keep an airplane accident out of the papers is impossible.
