

That statement sounds reasonable, considering the precautions both the industry and the government are taking toward assurance of safety in flying. Already, there is a uniform code of regulations for the guidance of traffic in the skies. Already the federal government has taken a hand in this business of transportation by air, set up strict rules for pilots to follow, demanded licenses after thorough tests for every flyer, and led the industry in the development of scientific means for the assurance of safety in the air.







that of regular education. Opportunities for employment for students of public school music may be classified under two large heads those of teaching opportunities and of social welfare occupations. Some of the branches coming under the teaching positions open to college or university graduates include platcon work in a large school system, special music teaching or supervision in a large or small school glee club and choral direction in high schools, orchestra and band direction in high schools, class room piano or violin instruction, music theory teaching in high schools and colleges, and choral glee club or methods teaching in college and university

Those occupations outside of teaching consist primarily of community song leaders, editorial work in a music publishing house, traveling representative for music text book concerns, and radio director of children's music hour. One might include literary work for musical magazines. This list by no means includes the total opportunities but it gives some idea of the variety of work that may be secured. 

Nevada's New 'Gas Death House' Ready to Claim Life of First Victim

Slayer Is First To Die In New Execution Chamber

By PHIL J. SINNOTT

NEA Service Writer CARSON CITY, Nev., April

4.—Nevada's brand new "gas house"—the only execution chamber of its kind in the world-has been completed at the state penitentiary here and is ready for its first victim.

The victim will be "Bob" White gambler, murderer and all-around bad man-unless his attorneys succeed in a new line of defense. But this appears improbable, as the state supreme court recently upheld the sentence that White must die.

Since 1921 gas poisoning has been the legal method of execution in Nevada, but in the two previous cases only a make-shift arrangement was used. Now the completely equipped "gas house," erected by cenvict labor, is ready.

Law Requires Witnesses In one corner of the little stone building is the death chamber itself. Extra thick insulation covers the white walls. Large single-pane windows - of unsual thickness look in from three sides. For it is through these windows that the witnesses, required by law, must watch the prisoners' last moments.

Instead of the ghastly gloom of death room is bright-cheerful almost-with more the appearance of a finely built little surgery.





Eclipse of Sun Visible in California







In order to maintain unbroken the historical record of solar eclipses, it has been arranged to send Mrs. Isabel M. Lewis, the observatory woman astronomer, to Honey Lake, Calif., to observe the total eclipse there at 11:05 a. m. on April 28. A specially built camera with a 46-inch focal length and a powerful lens will be used by Mrs. Lewis to observe the sun's corona—a beautiful gaseous glow that is visible only when it projects beyond the sun's disc during the eclipse. The chart shows that the total eclipse will be visible only in California. The eclipse will last a second and a half and the moon's shadow will be only a half mile wide.
