

NEWSPAPERS AND SOLEMNITY

The people are not prone to believe what they read in the newspapers.

And it is the fault of the newspapers.

We newspaper men, in an effort to be humorous at times, write in terms of absurdity, and as a result the reading public becomes suspicious of all it sees in print. For example:

Arthur Brisbane, usually dignified as a scribe, wrote that in Los Angeles prohibition officers noticed that incoming bees seemed intoxicated. So the officers trailed the line of drunken bees, and the line led to a still, and the operators of the still were arrested then and there.

- Then the Wichita Beacon, the smart aleck paper of Kansas, followed up Brisbane's facetiousness, and print-ed a story to the effect that Wichita bees also became drank, and caused the seizure of a big still.

Now nobody believes the events Mr. Brisbane and the Wichita Beacon described. And those journalistic stunts may be harmless in themselves. And yet the fact that such humor is not taken seriously by the people causes the people to regard all they read as "padded stuff" or sensationalism or comedy in ink.

So we urge newspapers to be less "funny," else the people will assume a very cynical attitude toward all they read. Newspapers should so conduct themselves that the reading public will take newspapers seriously. Unless the newspapers are serious, they lose influence; and eventually will be unable to point with alarm in an effective manner.

^{ran}On such premises as stated above, The Atchison Globe urges American journalism to become more sedate and less playful.

If the people will not believe the story about drunken bees, eventually they will refuse to believe the serious efforts of writers to reform unsavory conditions, and to make this world a clean and delightful place in which to liţe.

Gentlemen of the press, please become more dignified; and when you write in humorous vein label those hymorous quips in a manner to show the public that it should take salt with such quips.

Meanwhile, The Globe will continue to be the most solemn newspaper published in this great country of our'n. Let freedom and propriety reign!-Atchison (Kansa's) Globe.



Next morning, however, they finally were made to understand that an emergency required them to sail the third race also. So the


