IN PECOS CRACK-UP

Here This Week Crashes

PECOS, 'April 12. (A)-Miss Letha Prewit of Pecos was killed and Mrs. William Turner of Pecos was probably fatally injured today when a barnstorming plane crashed from a height of a hundred feet over Pecos airport. William Turner suffered internal injuries and his legs were broken. Two Turner children were badly shaken up, one suffering a broken leg; but Pilot Jack Echols suffered only cuts and a broken nose.

Jack Echols was seen in Midland Tuesday and Wednesday of this week, performing dizzy aerobatics over Midland and carrying passengers with the Flying Fleet. Probably 300 men, women and children of Midland rede with the pilot considered one of the most experienced to fly here. He was flying a Standard J-5, new production job, open biplane capable of carrying four passengers.

Dead Workman Saw Two Others Die In The Same Machine

George Elmer Kapernack, 32, who died in a local hospital Friday from angling in the maw of a machine Wednesday when he tried to slip a belt over a fast revolving pulley, had seen two other men go to their deaths while engaged in trying to do the same thing on the same machine, workmen at the West Texas Construction company rock crusher said.

The other two deaths were in different towns, workmen said. Kapernack, a foreman, had probably slipped the belt into place 50 times after viewing the death of his fellow workmen, but he wanted to save time and risked being caught.

The machine will never kill another man, officials of the West Texas Construction company are reported to have announced. They will enforce their demand that workmen stop all machinery before putting on a slipped belt, or else will buy a

fool-proof machine. Kapernack demonstrated his iron nerve when on the operating table at the hospital. Despite his body being broken and mangled, he talked as though nothing had happened. He told one of his men that "I won't die; this isn't so bad." He appeared perfectly conscious all the time.

His weakened condition, however could not brook the handicap of injuries.

The body was shipped by the Barrow funeral parlor this morning for Sterling, Colo., the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Kapernack. The parents and the dead man's widow left by train with the body. A brother drove the automobile in which he had brought the parents to Midland back to Colo-
