NAVY PACT MATTER IS CONTENTION

Immediate Vote Or a Senate Recess Is Being Sought

WASHINGTON, June 5. (AP)-Two rumors of efforts to upset plans of the senate leaders for debating the London naval treaty at special session were circulated today

The first was a move to bring the pact to a vote before adjournment of the present

The second was to endeavor to have the senate recess instead of adjourn, a technical distinction would prevent President Hoover from calling an extraordinary ses-

Opinions Are Locked

In an effort to get relief from the presidentially threatened extraordinary session for consideration of the naval pact, leaders of the Senate have gone repeatedly into conference with President Hoover on the matter, two of them appearing at the White House for breakfast one day this week.

The naval affairs committee of the senate has conducted its own investigation into charges American envoys failed to secure for the United States commensurate parity with other nations in the recent London conference.

Senate factions are strictly at sword-point on the issue, high commanders of the U.S. fleet are at variance with others of equal rank on the matter, and President Hoover has intimated he will see the problem decided before the extraordinary session shall have been
