Boy Here Battles a Fish in Cold Water Of the Rio Grande

Days and nights on the Rio Grande offer many degrees difference in temperature, especially when one bakes in the open oven during the day as he trudges around with a camera in the rough country of the Big Bend, and swims in the river at night, baiting trout lines and taking off fish.

Chester Harris found that this night swimming was made all the more exciting when he tried to take a 30-pound cat fish off a hook. He was 200 feet from the American side, and in water eight feet deep. The big fish, when freed, dragged the Midland boy under twice, and battled him all the way to the bank, where it required combined work of W. L. Brasher and W. A. Silk, his kinsmen of Mangum, Okla., to land him.

(A) - Former Prince Carol, who has returned dramatically to Rumania to seek the throne he once renounced for the love of a European beauty, will be chosen king by the chamber of deputies and senate in session at 11 o'clock (4 o'clock Eastern Standard time) Sunday morning.

One of the most surprising coups known to the history of dynasties will be enacted when the prince. who under the dethronement law,

QUEEN TO RETURN MUNICH, Bavaria, The dowager Queen Marie of Rumania arrived here tonight and the press was told that she would return to Bucharest June 14 instead of remaining in Germany four weeks as planned.

This statement followed upon earlier information that her plans would be unaltered by the return of her son, Carol, to bid for the Rumanian throne he renounced in 1925.

still has five years to serve in exile for what amounted to a ten-year expatriation following the famous affair which set the political tongues of the world wagging five years ago when he went to Paris and married a famous beauty in preference to awaiting his succession to the throne, is named king. Carol flew in the night to his



Book War Looms as Publishers Pro and Con on Dollar Copies

By GENE COHN. NEA Service Writer.

NEW YORK, June 7.-What price

Is the current dollar book controversy just half-kid, as they say in the trade, or is it the real Mocorro? Now that the excitement has subsided following the announcement on the part of several important publishing houses that they were lowering the prices of certain book lists, a consensus of impersonal opinion seems to be that they may or may not know where they're go ing but they're on their way.

But where personal opinions get more personal there's an open and shut battle pending.

And to date, the one person certain to profit is a "public relations counsel," retained to put up an intensive prapaganda fight for the \$2.00 and \$2.50 fiction products. Such phrases as "cultural catastrophe" have begun to appear and it's possible to hear cries of "author, author . . . where will the poor author get off?'

Affects Limited Class A survey of the entire situation indicates that, following the first fireworks, a confusion of words slightly beclouded the exact situa tion. Lest the buying public grow too enthusiastic over the bargain possibilities, it must be explained that-during the experimental period, at least—there will be no general avalanche of new book titles a one dollar per each.

Stanley Rinehart, of Farrar and Rinehart, one of the pioneers in the price slashing move, states that the one buck bargains will cover only about 25 per cent of the list These will be made up of "popular fiction" titles.



Combine one-half cup minced parsley with four tablespoons creamed butter. Add a few grains of salt and a little lemon juice if extra piquancy is needed. Spread on this slices of whole wheat or white bread. Garnish each sandwich with a tiny sprig of crisped parsley.

Veal and fish are both improved if served with a parsley sauce. A plain white sauce made with milk or made with half milk and half veal or fish stock becomes parsley sauce when two or more tablespoons of minced parsley are added just before serving. If the parsley is allowed to stand or boil in the sauce, it loses its bright green color.

There is a straight parsley that s used as greens. The branches should be stripped from the main stalk for this is tough and requires longer cooking. Wash thoroughly and add a few tablespoons water to the kettle in which they are cooked. Cook uncovered and serve with butter and lemon juice.
