







### LITTLE "LEFTY" MOORE PROVING A SENSATION WITH STEERS IN DALLAS

From a southpaw pitcher of doubtful ability to one of the brightest outfield prospects in the Texas league in the short space of a month is the story of "Little Gene" Moore, son of a great Texas league pitcher of other days, and formerly with Midland.

Brought in from the West Texas league last season, "Little Gene" won three games for the Steers and looked good doing it. They figured he would be ready to make a regular turn this year. But for some reason the youngster couldn't get started this spring. He was given several chances but couldn't get anybody out. The few times he was in there, however, he impressed Col. Jake Atz with the cut he took at the ball, and for about a month he was as a pinch hitter. He lammed the cover off the pill, did this 19-year-old, and Col. Atz got to thinking.

Came a day, after the Herd had experimented with a half-dozen center fielders, that the boss decided to give Gene a chance. He couldn't do much worse than the others, reasoned Atz. He turned the kid loose out in center and told him to see what he could do with the job.

What he has done scarcely needs the telling. He has been a sensation, nothing less. At last accounts he was hitting a little better than .400, second only to Oscar Eckhardt, and was fielding like a second Tris Speaker. The speedy youngster not only covers a vast amount of territory, but is blessed with a bullet throw that has gained the respect of the league's base runners. A covey of scouts have looked him over and placed their stamp of approval. If he keeps up his present lick he will bring a fancy price at the season's end.

The other day against Waco he performed a feat that had not been seen in the Texas league for five years. He drove in eight runs with a brace of homers and three singles off Keychum and Pratt. The last to equal the mark was Stump Edgington, who did it in 1925 for the Fort Worth Cats. Ziggy Sears, another old Cat star, set an all-time mark the same year when he drove in eleven runs in a game against San Antonio. We remember that affair. The right field barrier in the Alamo City that year was just a hop, step belted balls over it all afternoon.

#### TARIFF AND NEW PIPELINE LAW TO BE DISCUSSED

SAN ANGELO, June 26.—A meeting of independent oil operators, producers, refiners, royalty and lease owners and others in any manner influenced by development of the oil industry in West Texas has been called to convene in San Angelo, June 27, at 8 p. m. by Tom Cranfill, president of the Independent Petroleum Association of Texas.

Preparations for the meeting are being made here by a committee representing the oil fraternity of San Angelo and which is being assisted by Frank Killough of Fort Worth, assistant to the executive vice-president of the oil men's organization.

Business and professional men not directly connected with the oil business, but whose interests are in any manner linked with those of the fraternity are urged to attend the San Angelo meeting, it was pointed out by Rupert Ricker of San Angelo, independent operator and a member of the executive board of the Independent Petroleum association.

The question of tariff on oil, effect of the new pipe line law on the independents, and many other matters of vital importance to the industry and to those in any manner effected by these developments, will be discussed at the San Angelo meeting by Mr. Cranfill, Claude C. Wild, executive vice-president of the association and former manager of the San Angelo board of city development; Senator Farnell of Wichita Falls, Judge Hawkins of Breckenridge and other leaders of thoroughness in the industry, the local committee has been informed by Mr. Killough. District directors of the association living in West Texas will take an active part in the meeting here Friday, Mr. Killough said.

Meetings similar to that which will be held here Friday have been held in oil centers throughout the state, where expected progress has been made in unifying and solidifying public sentiment for the deserving independent, Mr. Ricker said. "The Independent Petroleum Association of Texas is endeavoring to give the independent a protected place in the industry. Landowners, business men, professional men and members of the fraternity who attend the meeting in San Angelo will be given a keener conception of the program the association is working on," Mr. Ricker said.
