

DISCRIMNATIONS AGAINST INDUSTRY

Tax authorities in Brazoria county last week placed a valuation upon industrial properties which exceeded by \$4,000,000 the valuation placed on similar properties in Wharton county by officials of the latter county. Oddly enough, the Wharton county properties are generally conceded to be much more valuable than those in Brazoria

Without any reference to the controversies which have been waged in each of the counties mentioned, and without regard to the merit or lack of merit in contentions of the interested parties, there is evidenced here a weakness in the state's system of taxation which is certain to militate against that industrial growth and development so necessary to the state's best interests.

Where there is no uniform system of taxation, and where no protection against spending orgies of local tax bodies is afforded industry, it is only reasonable to assume that industrialists will exercise utmost caution in entering the State of Texas.







France May Build a Giant Canal Linking Two Oceans

PARIS, July 9.—Recent international conferences for security and economic expansion have been so discouraging for the French people that lively agitation has developed for the construction of the Two-Seas Canal, a waterway linking the Atlantic, from Bordeaux, with the Mediterranean.

Demands are being made to the government to do something about this great work, and the press, particularly in the southern provinces, is colorfully picturing the enormous advantage to France, in security and economic prosperity if it could be achieved.

The latest discouragement to French enterprise came with the refusal of the British Labor Government to recommend the scheme of a channel tunnel linking France and England. France is practically undivided in favor of a channel tunnel, but can do nothing about it as long as England, for financial and startegical reasons, refuses to

Washable Gloves' Wearing Quality Depends on Correct Laundering

By WILLIAM H. BALDWIN Author of "The Shopping Book" Written for NEA Service

Washable gloves give extremely satisfactory wear if they are laundered correctly.

Gloves should be washed on the hand in lukewarm water and soap, and rinsed in lukewarm water with just a very little soap in the water. They should then be dried on the hand with a bath towel. Then they should be taken off and immediately stretched back to their original shape and hung up to dry. The gloves should be softened before they become thoroughly dry by rubbing gently.

All leather gloves stamped "washable" can be depended on to wash. The treatment of leather gloves to make them washable is being constantly improved, as they fulfill the needs of the shopper much more satisfactorily than gloves which have to be sent to the cleaner's. Doeskin and chamois are washable, whether stamped so or not.

A resume of the case, which has been an issue in California for 13 years, follows:

Led by a blue-clad corps of G. A. R. veterans, a mass meeting of San Francisco manhood marched through Market street on the sultry afternoon of July 22, 1916, amid wild acclaim from the throngs on the sidewalks. It was the Preparedness

Patriotism was at fever heat among spectators, many of whom had been won to the cause of American intercession overseas. Enthusiasm was fanned, this summer afternoon, by maritial airs from a dozen bands, the sight of blue uniforms passing under waving flags and the stirring throb of marching feet. It was a scene of color and splendor, and spectators cheered

enthusiastically. A moment later, as the fifes squealed a grimly prophetic marching song—"There'll Be a Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight—" death burst upon the scene with a mighty roar that could be heard for miles. Ripping a chasm from the pavement beneath their feet, a homemade bomb raked the massed marchers and bystanders with point-blank barrage of iron slubs and bolts. Six were killed outright,
