THE GLAMOUR OF A SHIP

The job of reconditioning the old frigate Constitution is almost complete. Photographs showing the ship's hull afloat, with the lower masts all stepped, have been printed in the newspapers; before long she will be ready to go to sea, and that triumphal tour of inland and coastal waters will probably get under way.

The Constitution will be worth looking at. No American naval vessel holds anything like her place in public esteem. But her tour will bring some of us, at least, up against a peculiar little problem in comparative values.

During the last few years most people have made a genuine effort to get away from the old attitude toward war. Dozens of books have been printed to prove that war is not glamorous and romantic, as we used to suppose, but filthy and cruel and senseless. We have told ourselves that only by adopting this attitude can we ensure the continuance of world peace.

But here we have the Constitution—glamorous and romantic, if any ship ever was. The mere sight of this old square-rigger, with her white gun ports, her distended sails and her long, graceful hull cutting through the blue water is enough to stir warlike emotions in the heart of the most confirmed war-hater on earth.

Furthermore, the Constitution has a past that is worth remembering. The men who sailed on her, upwards of a century ago, did some fine and gallant things. The ship was not unimportant in the development of this country. She deserves the homage we give her.

What is the answer then? On the one hand we have this new-born determination not to wrap her in a false glamour; on the other, we have war's glamour incarnate. The Constitution's cruise will bring the old attitude and the new face to face. Which way shall we jump?

Probably the answer is that we don't need to jump either way. The conditions that attended the building of the Constitution, for one thing, are gone forever. World civilization has changed. Actions that were necessary then are not necessary now.

In addition, we might remind ourselves that the Constitution is not a modern warship. She may be romantic and picturesque-but wars aren't fought that way now. The modern sailor, instead of standing by the breech of a carronade and cheering as the enemy comes alongside, is more apt to be crouched in the bowels of a submarine, working at a mechanic's trade to deal out death to a ship that he can never see. Whatever war may have been in 1812, it is something else again in 1930.

We can honor the Constitution as a relic, but that does not commit us to the belief that war is either as necessary or as colorful now as it used to be.



We May Be a Smart People, but We Mail 25,000,000 Letters Every Year That Lack the Correct Addressand a Whole Lot of Them Contain Money, Too.

WASHINGTON, July 28. - The American level of intelligence and efficiency has doubtless risen to a high point, but 200 employes of the postal service are still kept working all year around because the American public annually sends nearly 25,000,000 pieces of undeliverable

At the Washington office where dead letters and parcel post are sent, one of five sectional receiving offices, they get about 200 envelopes a day which are absolutely blank, with no address and no identification of the sender. This is the most valuable class of dead mail and contains a high proportion of checks, drafts, money orders and other valuable paper. A few months ago one such envelope was found to contain a check for \$165,000 which a Canadian railroad was trying to send to a lumber company in Mississippi. Base Metals With Trick Names Often Used for Mounting Novelty Silver

By WILLIAM H. BALDWIN

Inexpensive materials, such as rhinestones, imitation pearls, semi-precious stones, enamel, and tortoise are used in novelty

Rhinestones are a fine, hard glass mirrored on the back with a substance that looks like tinfoil to reflect the light, Good rhinestone jewelry is always set in sterling silver. The lower-priced settings are made of tin or zinc, with a little silver in them, and bear such misleading names as "platinoid" and "platinon."

Imitation pearl bears are roughly divided into the wax-filled and the so-called indestructable pearls. The latter will break, but not easily; for they are made of solid glass with a silver coating. Many of the fine-grade pearls of this kind may be washed, and can be used for years.

Semi-precious stones used for novelty jewelry are real gems, but the quantities in which they are found lessen their value. The most popular are jade, lapis lazuli, crystal, amber, onyx, garnet, amethyst, topaz, turquoise, carnelian, chrysoprase and marcasite.

Tortoise is used particularly in hair ornaments and cigaret cases. The test for distinguishing real from imitation tortoise shell is to rub the article with a piece of cloth until it becomes warm; if the warmth brings out an odor of camphor or celluloid it is imitation shell.

> S. J. R. No. 19 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTION-AL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 4, 1930.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

The Legislature shall meet every two years at such time as may be provided by law and at other times when convened by the Governor When convened in regular Session the first thirty days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emer gency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of the regular session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resclutions and other matters then pending and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its member-



PROPOSING A CONSTITUTION-AL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 4, 1930.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Article VII of the

Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 16, which shall read as follows: "Section 16, All land mentioned in Sections 11, 12 and 15 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas now belonging to the University of Texas shall be subject to taxation for county purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned; provided they shall be rendered for taxation upon values fixed by the State Tax Board; and providing that the State shall remit annually to each of the counties in which said lands are located an amount equal to the tax imposed up-

on said land for county purposes." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election to be held throughout the State on the


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
