

Midland has long been recognized as a typically western town. In former years, Midland was the seat of annual or seasonal frolics wherein western sports attracted the best of talent, and records as good as or better than the so-called world champion rodeos were often made.

Western sports, more or less, had their fling in some localities, and even in Midland they have not been as popular for years.

The old practice of breaking the legs of good cattle, busting up a few contestants and causing injuries to man and beast, coupled with the staging of shows not quite as good as formerly, wore down the enthusiasm.

However, an effort is being made now to keep alive sports here in which fine blooded horses are required, sports which will attract thousands of pople here several times a year when the events become better recognized over the country.

Cowboy Park, operated by Midland cattlemen who know the horse business, polo and race affairs, has been converted into an amusement center which merits the support of all lovers of good sporting events.

Next Sunday and Monday will see polo on the park field, and on Monday, Labor Day, horse races are scheduled. Midland people are fortunate in having in the home town better amusements for the Labor Day holidays than will be found in many cities where excursions will be run and where it is custom for people to assemble in great





West Virginia Magistrate Builds Own Jail and Makes Prohibition Pay Profit

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Aug. 25. -The prohibition law and a homemade jail have combined to bring a neat gross income of around \$1000 a month to Justice of the Peace Harry Johnson, who presides over the populous Cabin Creek district 30 miles from Charleston

Justice Johnson, elected a year ago for a four-year term, took the guest a jail fee of one dollar and ssessing his lodgers 35 cents apiece for each meal. This, added to the court costs that are his legal perquisite in all liquor cases makes

his job one that pays extremely well. There are a good many liquor law violations in Justice Johnson's disrict, which is a coal mining section with some 25,000 inhabitants. On some days, he says, he is kept such cases. Until recently there was no jail available-and if the arrestting officers shipped an offender off to Charleston to be locked up y be tried the next morning by a Charleston judge, who would get

Builds Own Jail

So the justice built his own jail. It is made of concrete, ribbed with from the justice's home. It is a low, one-story affair with one railed window in each side.

The door is of steel and pears two padlocks, one of them a huge affair eight inches long. One enters nto a small corridor which runs across the front of the building. There are two cells: one, for women orisoners, has two bunks, while the other, for men, has four. Each cell contains a lavatory and a fresh-air ent in the roof. At one end of the corridor is a desk bearing the jail

There are eight state troopers n the district, one prohibition officer and one constable attached to the justice's office. When any of these officials brings in a prisoner he lodges him in the jail, writes his name, the charge and the hour of arrest in the book.



Henry L. Bryan, Now III at the Age of 78, Twice Was Fired as Editor of Statutes at Large, But They Always Had to Hire Him Again Because No One Else Could Do the Work

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.-Henry Bryan, the editor of Statutes at Large, is ill at the age of 78. The State Department, repository of all ederal laws, may have to get a new editor, and that will not be easy at

Bryan comes nearer to being indispensable in the government service than almost any more highly placed and widely known official. He survived the old spoils system days because every time he was fired out as editor of Statutes at Large he had to be brought back sooner or later because it was so hard to replace him.

He stepped into the editorship in 1886, after being confidential secretary to Secretary of State Thomas F. Bayard and, before that, a clerk on the Hayes-Tilden electoral commission. One thing for which the shopper should be watchful is the embossing of cloth to make it appear what it is not. Recently a shopper bought a coat at a smart shop. She was delighted with her purchase because she thought she had a moire coat of excellent cut at a "bargain" price.

In due course she had it pressed and it came back to her as a coat of no particular weave or texture. What she really had bought was a common cloth which had been run through a machine that so stamped it as to give it the appearance of a true moire weave. Instead of getting a distinguished looking coat at a bargain, she had a rather commonplace one for which she paid a stiff price, and which, furthermore, had been weakened by the attempt to "doctor" it into a moire finish.

Similarly cotton fabrics are sometimes calendered and sold as satin tablecloths.
