





Some degree of skill is required to handle this equipment to best advantage, but the average mechanic can, with careful attention to speed regulation and rate of feed, become proficient in its use.


The rotary should run from ten to twenty revolutions per minute when making the initial hole, the feed being not to exceed two feet per minute, and in any event not so great as to make the bit run rough and jump Coke deposits are ordinarily rather full of cavities, and any attempt to drill too fast is apt to result in bending the drill stem.

The final cleaning operation with the chain cleaner requires a rotary speed of 60 to 65 revolutions pe minute to swing the chains out to the side wall of the drum. The feed may be as much as three feet per minute provided everything works smoothly. In no case should the apparatus be forced as it will run smoothly and easily when properly

In no case should bit head arms be allowed to strike the drum repeatedly. If this tendency is noticed, i s probably due to a bent stem, and hould be immediately corrected.

The best service in furniture covering may be expected from upholstery with tight; close weaves. The upholstery should have no loose threads which can be picked off. It is well to remember that any satin-faced fabric will give less satisfactory wear-though they may be desired nevertheless because of their appearance—than

Selection of the proper upholstery usually looms as a major shopping problem, yet if sales clerks for interior decorators were given pertinent information regarding the prospective use of the upholstery they would be able to guide the shopper in making her choice. In this connection, it is advisable to come to the store with an open mind, instead of asking for a definite fabric or seeking a particular decorative effect.
