AMARILLO, Aug. 29. (UP) -A. D. Payne, confessed inventer of a bomb which killed his wife, was formally indicted for murder by the Potier county grand jury which ended its long session at 12:30

o'clock today.
A true bill was returned in open court before Judge Henry Bishop. The grand jury had been in session since Monday. District Atterney E. W. Thomerson indicated that he would ask that the trial date be

set for late in September. With Payne's 20,000 word confes sion in their hands since Monday afternoon with instructions from Judge Bishop to investigate the bombing case first, the indictment had been expected at each hour of adjournment.



#### What to Expect From Hose!

By WILLIAM H. BALDWIN Author of "The Shopping Book" Written for NEA Service

Silk hose are sometimes made of a fabric which has been woven, cut and seamed up. They do not "run" as knitted hose will but, on the other hand, they do not give; and they will get holes easily as a result. There is also a glove silk fabric which is knitted in the piece and cut and seamed.

Rayon is less elastic than silk and therefore does not conform as well to the shape of the foot. It should never be rubbed in washing as it loses its strength when wet. When these defects are overcome, a very important future may await rayon in this field.

Of cotton hose, lisle is the best quality. It is made of a fine, hard-twisted yarn. A mixture of cotton and wool may be more satisfactory than pure wool because it shrinks less. It also reduces the cost of the fabric, enabling the curtomer of limited means to obtain a warm stocking at a low price. Pure wool is widely used for outdoor wear and is, of course, the warmest stock-


