





LESSONS FROM THE BUS TRIP

A lot of things were brought out yesterday by the good will trip to Rankin, Iraan, McCamey, Rankin and home by way of Odessa. One thing was that when a comparatively small party contemplates such a trip, the charfered bus is the ideal means of conveyance. Operated at a low rate per passenger, the large vehicle was comfortable, had a minimum of dust, kept the crowd intact at all times, maintained a schedule without the necessity of waiting for individual cars to get together at each town, and kept the parts organized.

Another discovery was that the citizens of the towns visited were eager to hear more about Midland. Not only did they announce proudly that many of them are coming here already, but those who were not familiar with this city and its advantages proved to be good listeners when the story of Midland was told by local speakers. It was easily seen that friendly visits should be made by Midland people more often.

One of the advantages of such a trip is the publicity that results. The local chamber of commerce had sent out stories in advance to papers in those towns and it was discovered that front page position had been given. Publicity had appeared on two occasions in several of the state daily papers. When the visit was made, newspaper men eagerly "covered" the visit for their local papers. The local cham-her of commerce left a paid advertisement about Midland with each paper.

Publicity in the Midland paper today will be sent each of those towns and, according to custom, will be clipped and reprinted in papers there. In other words, publicity about Midland and the trade trip gets about three weeks of play, which is valuable advertising for this city.

And, one of the chief advantages of the trip, was to throw Midland business men closer together, making possible greater local cooperation on community problems.
