

## ARC LIGHTS THROW BEAM ON STRONGEST MIDLAND IN HISTORY OF SCHOOL

Austin High No Match for Combination of Powerful Charging of Forward Wall and Speedy Backs

Slashing through the "Pride of El Paso," Austin high school's grid machine, the Purple and Gold Bulldogs of Midland took the intersectional "after supper" game in El Paso Saturday night, 52-18.

Midland backs, slitting the El Paso forward wall to shreds with the fury of their straight driving game and sweeping the ends with a dazzling running attack, came back in the second half, when the score stood 32-18 in

their own goal inviolate. The game goes down as a saga of long Midland runs, crushing Midland line play, of frequent fumbles and loose play by both elevens, of

#### THE AIR MAIL DECISION

Midland, Sweetwater and Abilene may well congratulate Big Spring upon her good fortune in being designated as the air mail stop and junction of the southern line. Incidentally, this is the second occasion upon which Big Spring has been smiled on by good fortune within recent weeks, the announcement that the Texas and Pacific Northern would build a rail line from that city coming like a thunderbolt from the sky a few weeks ago.

However, Midland and the other cities contending for the mail stop need suffer no remorse. It has been predicted time and again by aviation enthusiasts that air mail will be serving practically all important stops within the

Records show that Midland has approximately three times the air passenger traffic of any of the intermediate stops between El Paso and Fort Worth. Mail planes will carry passengers and will make all of the stops. Eventually, the decision of the post office department to pick up mail at the local port will be voluntary, it is believed.

Local aeronautics committees, the chamber of commerce, the airport owners and operators, civic leaders and others left no stones unturned in the fight to have Midland made the airmail stop and junction.





ate at home, anyway. Leadbeater's was opened in 1792 by Edward Stabler, who borrowed 500 pounds for the purpose, and is still in possession of his descendants and those of John Leadbeater, who married one of his daughters in 1835. Stabler was an accomplished pillroller and mixer of liquid concoctions. Having no chain store competition, he made plenty of money at his cornor on King and Fairfax

Included in the files of the old drug store is a note from Martha Washington, dated from Mount Vernon in 1802, as follows:

"Mrs. Washington desires Mr Stabler to send by bearer a quart bottle of the best castor oil and the

Apparently Leadbeater's considered the Washington family's credit to be good. George Washington Parke Custis, one of Martha's grandchildren who had been adopted by George, explained as follows in a note dated 1818:

"My Dear Sir: Not being able to command cash at this time from the heavy expense of my building, enclose my note agreeable to promise. I am duly sensible of the politeness and liberality I have alvays received from you and I have to express my acknowledgement, also for the very excelent articles always received from your house and with perfect esteem for your personal character. I am, Your humble serv-
