While Mrs. Gerwick made her home in Midland, she was connected with several beauty parlors. Recently she has been living in Odessa.

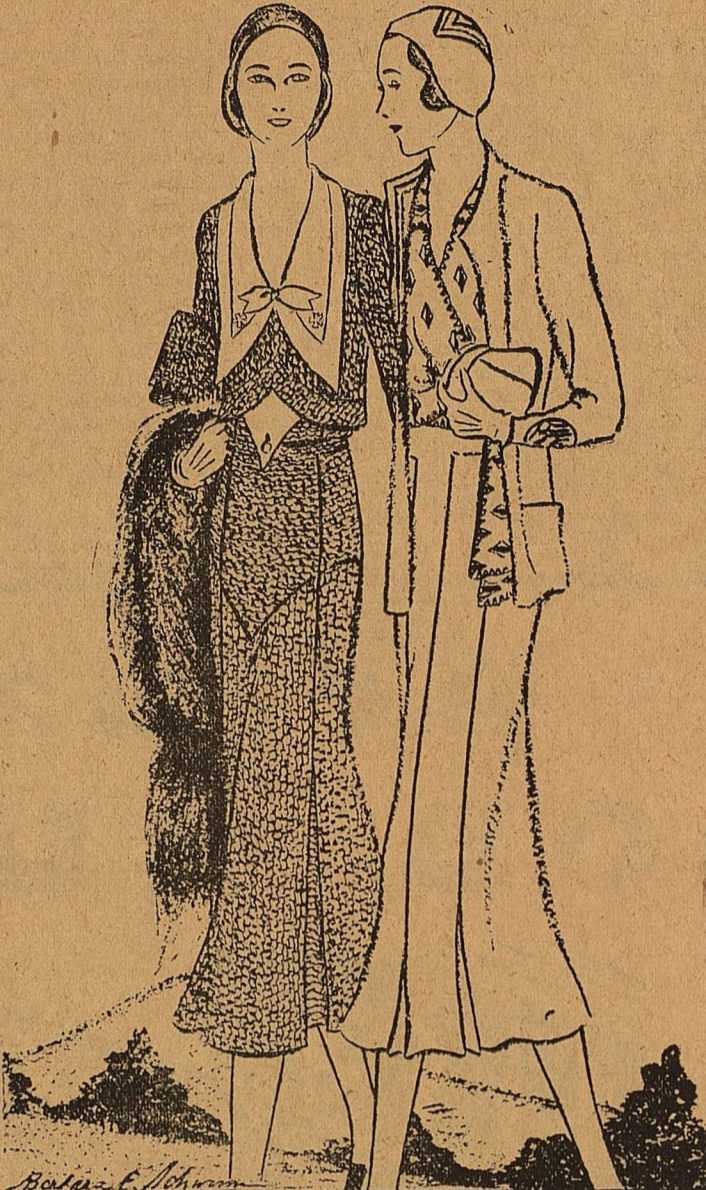
Mr. Gerwick is an employe of the Magnolia Petroleum corporation with headquarters in Odessa.

New woolen frocks and suits adorn themselves admirably this fall. "Little frocks" show ingenious lingerie touches, bolero, yoke and gored yoke treatments. Many of them affect surplice blouses, in hand-embroidered or lacy wool patterns.

It is quite the thing to have your beret made of your suit or frock's material. Many of them have the same touches of embroidery or color that the frock or suit has.

Admirable for autumn wear for a cross-country walk, a day's work or a shopping spree is a black and white semi-sheer tweed frock made with a bolero, hip yoke and gored skirt which has box pleats in the front, on both sides and in the back.

There is a tricky little collar and bow touch of white pique which shows under the bolero where it buttons down over the belt of the skirt. Soft as down is a little blue jersey suit with jacket that has monogrammed sleeves and a little surplice overblouse of matching blue embroidered in diamond motifs of black and gold yellow. This overblouse ties at the side, with ends hanging.

Study Quality, Style and Color in Buying a Hat

The most expensive hats are, of course, the Paris originals. But few of these are purchased by shoppers here. The great American stores will buy from 50 to 100 of these originals, and then duplicate them in their own shops. These manufacturers' copies will sell for from \$15.00 to \$25 less than the original.

Style, color and quality are the determining factors in the selection of a hat. For Fall wear, among the materials that are being featured are soleil (shiny on both sides, resembling pressed velour in appearance) and a vis-a-vis (shiny on one side, dull on the other).

A two-piece hat generally is considered better than a one-piece, because it usually is better blocked and better fitting. A good hat will be stitched with fine, almost invisible stitching.

RETURNS CATHEDRAL

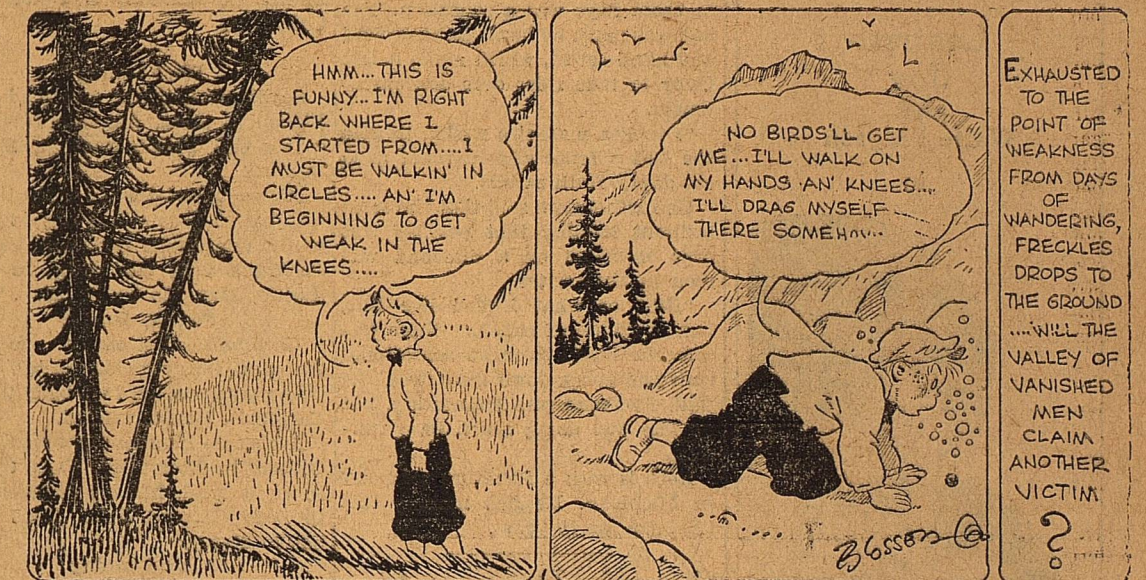
