GOP in Texas Is Not Expected to Be Very Strong

DALLAS, Nov. 3. (AP) .-Apathetically, Texas awaited tomorrow's election, most observers predicting a vote of a half million or less. Democrats predicted an easy victory for their gubernatorial candidate, Ross S Sterling of Houston, and also that the vote for the republican candidate, William E. Talbot, would not reach 100,000, the number necessary for a republican primary two years

Democrats centered a campaign against Texs' only republican congressman, Harry M. Wurzbach of Seguin, with Henry B. Diehlmann of San Antonio as democratic can-

Five constitutional amendments also faced the voters.

Business Is Issue

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3. (AP) .-Every state but Maine which voted in September, tomorrow elects federal congressmen. Voters also elect one third of the membership of the senate, governors of 32 states and hundreds of lesser officials.

Republicans and democrats both made issues of President Hoover, the tariff, business decline and farm relief; and prohibition is a big factor in some places.

Democrats claimed they would control the new house and would reduce the republican senate majority to the vanishing point. Republicans declared that their final field reports showed a trend in their favor, claiming control in both houses but by reduced majorities which often fall to the lot of the presidential elections.

He declared that "good advertising is best accomplished in the daily newspapers, for here you receive the greatest return at the least cost," explaining the value of reader interest as found in the daily newspapers.

'Good advertising is news and as such means the promotion of timely wanted merchandise at regular, fair

The speaker declared that when the year 1930 came in with signals that business was not to be what it had been for a few previous months, his firm cast about for methods of combatting the predicted depression. It was decided that every effort would be bent not only to curtailment of all possible expenses, but also to increasing, rather than decreasing, business volume.

To do this, it was necessary to increase the advertising appropriation, rather than to cut it with other expense items, and at the same time to make closer study of the needs of the buying public, to have at all times advertising of seasonable and desirable items carried in the firm's advertising. The result was that business actually increased at this big store. Price lines were readjusted to conform with the new demands, stocks were watched closely, breaks in market prices of commodities were taken advantage of, advertising was increased to appeal to a greater mass of people, and business grew.

The advertising was watched more carefully than ever. Time was taken in its preparation, and every inch was designed to sell. Advertising is the very expense item which should not be cut in times of depression, this modern business genius insisted.

A SCHEME FOR RELIEF



By way of illustration: Ogden, a city of slightly better than 50,000, would get \$425,000 of public funds. By adding a similar sum, and getting busy on needed public jobs, gden would provide work for some 800 men at \$125 a month.

In the nation as a whole, according to the Standard-Examiner's estimate, fully 2,000,000 men would be given work during the next eight months. With 2,000,000 men restored to purchasing power, demand for all sorts of commodities would rise, factory production— and, consequently, factory employment—would go up, and the ball would start rolling once more.

Doubtless this plan is not letter-perfect. But it is a good thing to study for the simple reason that it dissects a large-scale relief program and shows just what it could be interpreted into in terms of dollars and cents for each


The above sketch shows how Willie drew three lines and isolated the seven frogs, one from another.




