

AUSTIN, Nov. 24. (UP) .- Maps of the Texas congressional districts, as shown in the Congressional Directories of 1910 and 1930 graphically depict the task that will confront the Texas Legislature next January when it takes up redistricting to fit in the three new Texas Congressmen allowed by the new census.

Jig-saw puzzles must have originated from congressional district

In 1911 an unsuccessful attempt was made to redistrict Texas. Later this was done to make places for two additional Congressmen allowed. This year's task will be more difficult. Three must be accommodated. On the theory that a division of population entitles each section of 280,000 population to a Congressman, Dallas, Bexar and Harris counties each might claim a Congressman with a one-county district. Representative Ray Holder of Lancaster insists that Dallas County is really entitled to a Congressman for itself alone.



The football fan no longer needs to be a hardy individual. He no longer needs to shiver in rain-swept bleachers or crouch in up-turned coat collar while an inhos- who is the Senate's most vigorous pitable gale drives across the stadium. "McFinnigle gets the ball. . . . He goes around right end. ... O'Nutty is making interference for him. ... Now Purdy . . . no . . . (an unusually long pause) . . . no, it's Perhaps that had something to do Whortle ... Whortle makes the tackle.... Whortle gets with the coincidental production of him....

And then, as an afterthought, he remarks that the ball carrier gained five yards on the play. Now all of this was happening with the attacking team needing one yard with two minutes left to play; but the important news comes in last, and a bad last at that, while the anxious fan writhes and twists and nearly has apoplexy waiting for the leisurely announcer to get to the point.

But the excitable announcer is little better. He goes here to make statements for government ownership before the Newlands like this:




Under the heading, "downright dizzy" come the most obnoxious of all. This classification includes, first of all, men, who know nothing whatever about football but who valiantly describe the game anyway. It includes announcers who are smitten with their own alleged capacity for humor, and give the fan his football through a ponderous web of fourth-rate wisecracks and smug guffaws. It includes the men who describe the scenery, and the "colorful spectacle" ad nauseam. It includes men who seem to think that the best broadcast is the wordiest.

Most of them fall into one of these three classifications. There are exceptions, of course; but they are few. It is a tough break for the fan.
