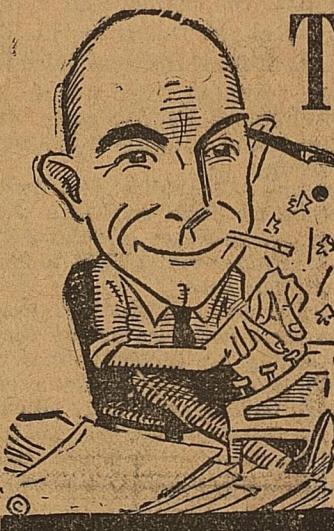

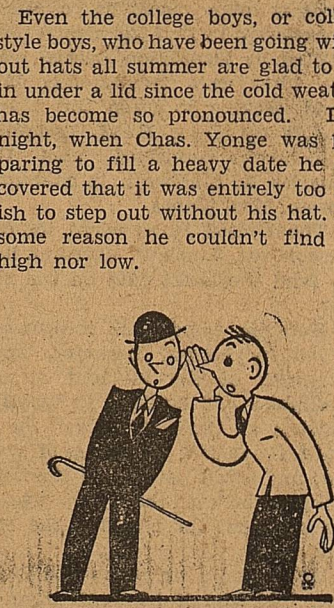

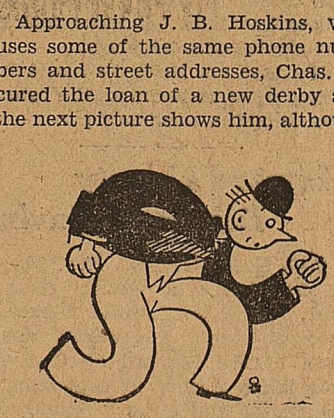

Archduke Otto and the Hapsburg Curse



THIS HAS ALREADY BEEN TOLD: Archduke Otto of Hungary, attaining the age of 18 on Nov. 20, therefore becomes eligible under the ancient laws of the Hapsburgs for the throne which his father, the late Emperor Karl, lost when he was overthrown and exiled in the closing days of the World War.

thus left his country isolated in Europe. At one stroke he alienated France, England, Turkey and Piedmont, which fought on one side, and Russia on the other. And the czar, as a fellow dynast, had been his very good friend.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—When Archduke Otto dreams of making himself a real king of Hungary, his thoughts must often turn to his great uncle, the Emperor Franz Joseph and he must wonder whether the ancient "Hapsburg curse" is destined to cloud his own path in life.

As if he did not have enough enemies, he crossed the path of Prussia, which was growing as a military power. He insisted it was his inalienable right to be the supreme figure in the German confederation of kingdoms, duchies and principalities. He scorned Prussian pretensions. He totally underestimated the crafty brains and the dauntless courage of a young Prussian statesman named Bismarck.

For a fatality attached to Franz Joseph. Everything he undertook went wrong. He always brought the curse of failure or defeat or death or tragedy.

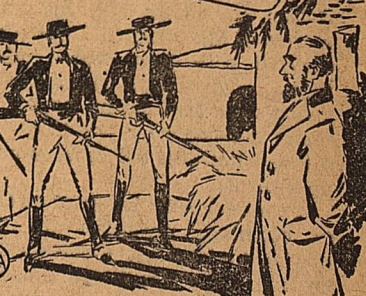
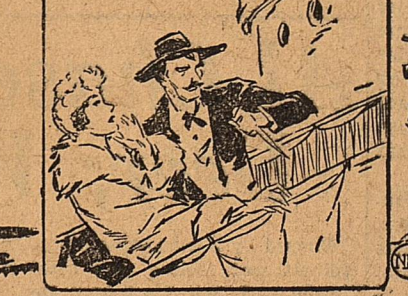
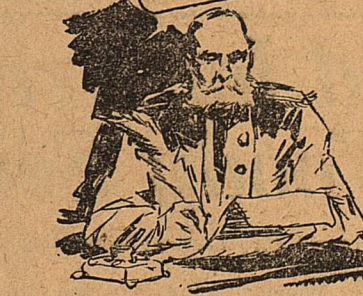
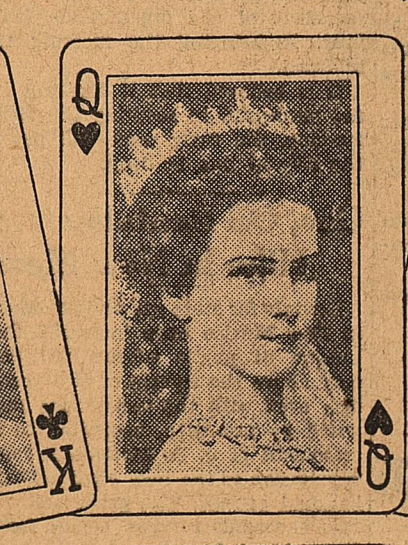
He was cold and callous. His Empress Elizabeth was warm and human. Outside of military maneuvers and the hunt, he had no pleasures. She loved travel, art, music, literature, poetry. He could not understand her. The stiff formality of the Vienna court weighed upon her. She was a Wittelsbach and those Bavarian rulers had always lived very close to their people.

In all the realms of history there is no star-crossed figure like his. He began his long reign at 18, when the echoes of the revolutionary days of 1848 were still rumbling. He ended it 68 years later when the World War, for which he was largely responsible, was shaking his once mighty empire into tiny pieces.

When she was away she wrote him lively, charming letters. She smiled bitterly when she was answered by telegram: "We are glad to hear of your arrival and are looking forward to tomorrow morning. I have just got here. Cloudless sky and 5 degrees of frost."

What he was at 18, he remained at 86. Every reform wrought in the structure of the national life was secured, as it were, over his dead body. A Life-Long Tyrant For 19 years, with bloodshed, with grim repression, he fought the Magyar nobles, who were backed by the mass of their people and, finally, grudgingly had to yield to Hungarian aspirations. The Austrian empire became the Austro-Hungarian empire. Hungary was a semi-independent kingdom within the empire and he himself was crowned King of Hungary.

Always he told her about the weather and the thermometer. They drifted apart. This brilliant, unhappy woman was not disturbed when she learned her lord had a lady friend, an Austrian actress. Nothing he did could disturb her any more. Stabbed by an Assassin Her unhappy life came to a sudden tragic end when an Italian anarchist stabbed her to death in 1898 as she was aboard a steamer in Geneva. She had married this man with a curse. So fatally pursued her. It even extended to her family. Her cousin, Leopold of Bavaria, committed suicide. Her sister, Sophie, Duchess of Alençon, was burned to death in a charity bazaar in Paris. If his wife's tragic death disturbed him, Franz Joseph's subjects could not notice it. He went on writing his dry telegrams. He went on hunting chamois. He went on taking tea with his actress friend. Head of wood, hand of iron, heart of steel. Such was the great-great-grandfather of the young Archduke Otto of Austria.

EMPEROR MAXIMILIAN Frank Joseph's brother, whose ill-starred empire that he founded in Mexico came to an end when he was executed by a firing squad. . . . Another victim of the Hapsburg Curse."

Lamb en Casserole Two pounds breast of lamb, 1-4 pound sliced bacon, 2 cups peas, 1 small onion, 2 teaspoons salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper.

Remove skin from meat. Add salt to 4 cups boiling water and simmer meat and bones for 20 minutes. Line casserole with bacon. Remove meat from broth but continue to simmer bones 15 minutes longer.
