Picking out books for a boy to read is one of the most fascinating and enjoyable jobs there is. There is such a wealth of good books to choose from, for one thing; and merely reading off the titles will generally arouse such a keen reminiscent thrill that one's boyhood, for the moment, is victoriously recaptured.

The taste of adult society changes, from generation to generation. But boyhood is more conservative. It sticks to the favorites of its fathers, as a general thing. A new book has a hard gauntlet to run. It takes a generhood's most favored books is one of the most exclusive circles in the world. It is hard to break into, but once a


Buying books for a boy may be fun, but it is not a task to undertake lightly. An adult can accept a poor book and forget it; boyhood needs something that will stay by it. It needs something with a spark of genius in it: something that will tiskle the imagination, and start the spinning of dreams and the weaving of visions, out of which a secure background for a whole lifetime can be built.

A fearful amount of tripe is published in the way of boys' books. There seems to be a notion abroad that a boy's book need not be as well written as one that is in tended for his more critical father. But children have a greater capacity than we give them credit for, and the man who intends to write for them might consider the fact that most of the books that boyhood gives immortality to were written, originally, for grown-ups. Scott, Dickens, Coper, Dumas, Mark Twain—they wrote for adults.

Of course, there are exceptions. There are "The Jungle Books" and "Captains Courageous," for instance; and "The Wizard of Oz," and "Uncle Remus," and a few others. But they are not many. Even "Alice in Wonderland" holds as much for adults as for children, if not more.

In fact, that is true of most really good "boys' books." We who are older can read them with as much enjoyment as our sons. In a few cases, our changing tastes may have played us false; Scott and Cooper, in particular, are a little bit off the track for most of us in 1930. But is there a grown man anywhere who could not re-read "Huck Finn," or "Two Years Before the Mast" at least once a



The Stock Market Crash, the Drought and the Tariff Have Caused Hoover Plenty of Woe and Many Observers Say President Needs More Political Courage



during the past three years. Word was received here Thursday from J. M. Del Curto, state etomologist, to the effect that the regulations would be lifted from Howard, Borden Martin Glasscock and Dawson counties, and a portion of Midland county. This release will become effective Monday November 17. After that date on cotton in these West Texas counties will be required to be fumigated and neither will be j farmers be compelled to sterilize the seed as has been done under the quarantine regulations. The removal of this quarantine, according to I. B. Cauble, farmer and ranchman of Howard county, will enable the farmers to go into open market with their seed, a privilege which has been denied under the quarantine many farmers in this section.

## Hawks Lands After Record Flight



Here's the end of another record-breaking flight for Captain Frank Hawks, shown in his low-winged racer as he landed at Roosevelt Field, Long Island, 8 hours and 44 minutes after he had left Havana. About 10,000 persons greeted him at the field and heard him tell how he had "just cruised along" at an average speed of 190 miles an hour in a plane which is capable of a sustained speed of 245 miles. In addition to the records to and from Havana, Captain Hawks holds numerous other inter-city marks, including the two-way continental speed records.
