The year 1930 has shown a decided decrease in building permits over the entire country, and in some communities building material trade has consisted chiefly of supplies for repair jobs.

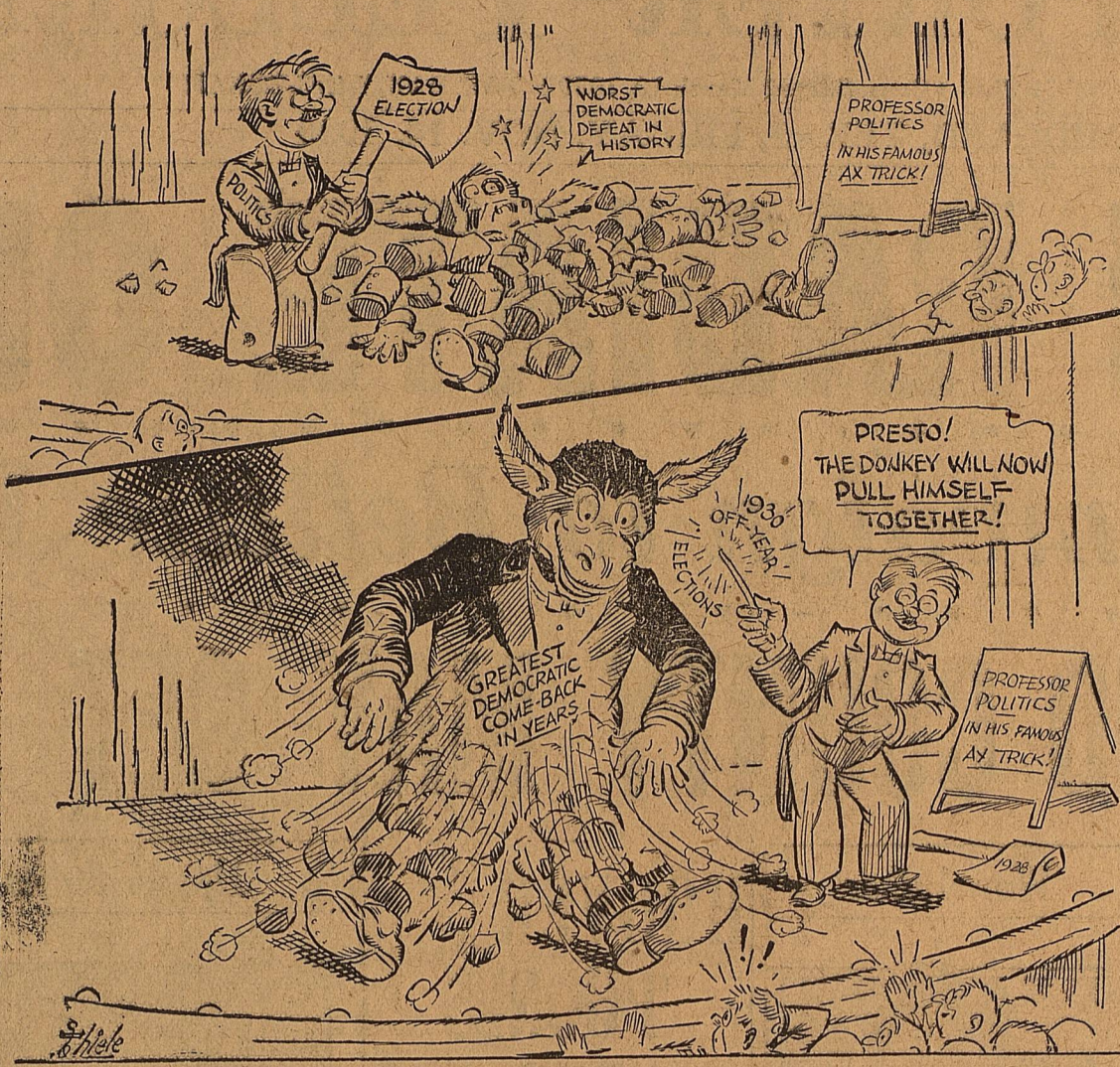

The taste of adult society changes, from generation to generation. But boyhood is more conservative. It sticks to the favorites of its fathers, as a general thing.

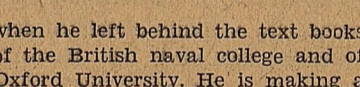

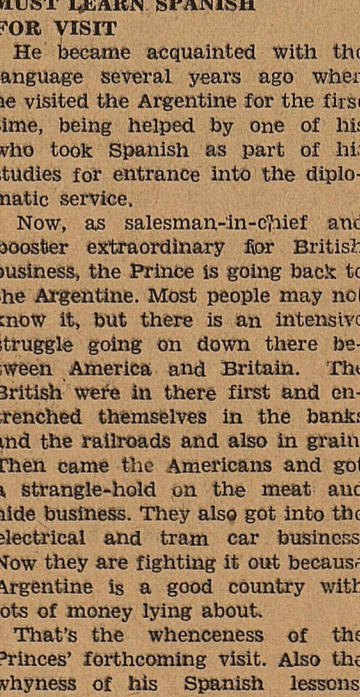
LONDON, Nov. 14.—At the ripe age of 36 the Prince of Wales has become a school-boy again.

LOYD GEORGE TAUGHT HIM TO SPEAK WELSH.

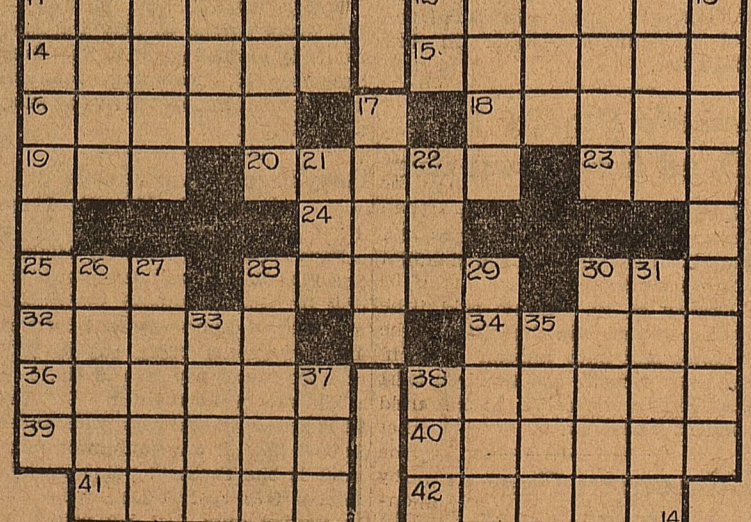

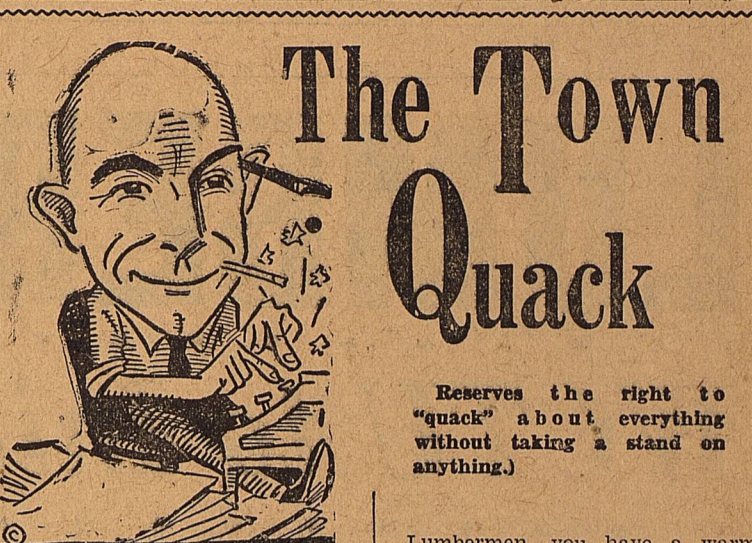

Daily Washington Letter By Rodney Dutcher

The Stock Market Crash, the Drought and the Tariff Have Caused Hoover Plenty of Woe and Many Ob-servers Say President Needs More Political Courage

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—One of the hardest things to find these days is a Republican who does not admit privately that Herbert Hoover is not a popular president.
There are plenty of Republicans to explain that Hoover's unpopularity is not his own fault. Or to say that, despite his previous hard luck, he will yet rank among the greatest American presidents. Or that he would rank much higher in public esteem had he not been the target of bitter partisan attack.



I had the surprise of my life this morning. Just as the lumbermen's convention was opening I opened a circular letter, or folder, from a lumber company and there wasn't a joke in it. I always read them for the jokes but this time the joke was on me.
I'll have to admit that the lumber business always appealed to me. Even as a kid I used to wish I had a lumber yard so I could climb around the second floors of the warehouses. Nothing appealed to me more than to walk through a lumber yard and smell the pine.

Any sensible person at once thinks of the business depression and points out that Hoover wasn't to blame for that. And the fact is that if we were still having prosperity instead of hard times the Hoover stock would still rate high with most folks. A return of prosperity is Hoover's one best bet for being re-elected.

Promised Prosperity
An objective evaluation of Hoover's presidency can also afford to ignore the fact that Hoover promised the country a continuance of prosperity in his campaign speeches of 1928. Any other Republican candidate would have done the same thing. All other Republican speakers did. It probably never occurred to Hoover that he might be wrong. At that time the only other persons predicting severe depression were those who had been predicting it for years and had invariably been mistaken.

Blamed for Tariff
If passage of the Hawley-Smoot tariff bill with Hoover's signature had been followed by a business pickup, both the president and his party would have been given a great deal of credit for putting the measure through.

Needs Political Courage
It's almost startling, when you come to think of it, that Hoover has no large and influential group arrayed behind him. Big business is unenthusiastic because business conditions are bad. Many regular Republicans dislike him because he doesn't play their brand of politics and hasn't given them leadership.

Then you come to the fact that Hoover has been a poor politician tongue. In these cases his tutor has been no less a person than former Prime Minister David Lloyd-George. And here is one for the United States:
As everybody knows, he has made several visits to America and each time was tremendously intrigued and amused by the salt and savor of American slang. So much so that he said to one of his English pals:
"If I had time, I would like very much to learn to speak American."
Even as it is, he sometimes springs Americanisms on his friends.

Now I'll bet somebody says they never knew before that I was a democrat. Well, maybe I'm not. I could be anything from an independent to a socialist or communist.

It seems that there is going to be little affray over at Stanton Saturday afternoon at which Wink football boys will have the urge to put up a little more fight on account of having been forced to go that distance. I have all the admiration in the world for the Wink football team but it would be a shame for them to eliminate Stanton and knock the Bulldogs out of that return engagement. And too, the Stanton boys should have an opportunity to place on Lackey Field. It's educational to say the least.

Most observers believe Hoover could have done something, much or little, to offset his handicaps if he had taken a spirited stand now and then, demonstrating a willingness to fight and to speak right out in meeting.
They believe that nothing short of a display of political courage can re-establish him and deplore the fact that his most spirited declaration to date has been a vehement attack on Ralph S. Kelley, an Interior Department subordinate who charged maladministration of the oil shale reserves.

New York Victory Places Franklin Roosevelt in Chief Line

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt of New York, and Senator-elect Dwight W. Morrow, of New Jersey, are now two of the foremost presidential possibilities for 1932. One a Democrat, the other a Republican, and both wet, each boasts a remarkable vote-getting record along with an extraordinary career in public service and an attractive personality.

As surely as anything political can be predicted eighteen months in advance, Roosevelt, who stepped back into public life two years ago at serious risk of his health, in order to serve his party and his friend Al Smith, will be nominated for president by the Democrats in 1932. The unexpectedly enormous majority by which he was re-elected virtually assures it.

MORROW MAY BE REPUBLICAN CHOICE

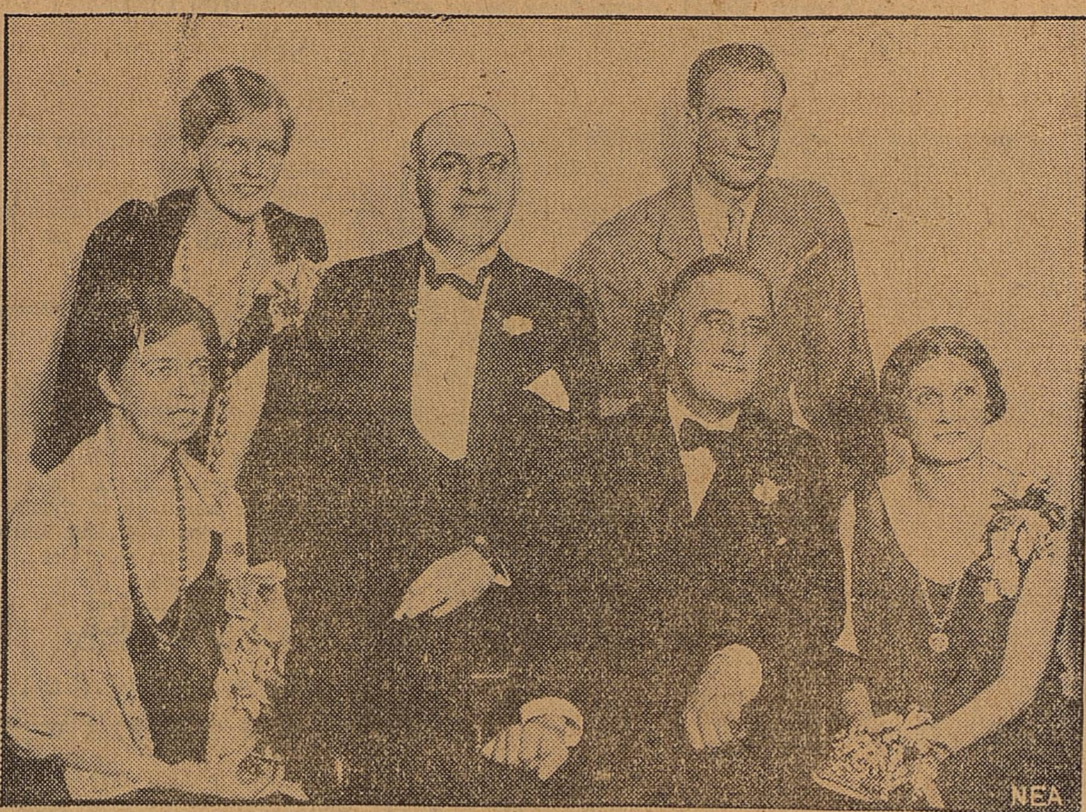
Morrow, the former Morgan partner, who went as Ambassador to Mexico and restored amicable relations with that country, who won a senatorial nomination by an overwhelming plurality and then rolled up a great election majority while other Republicans were losing over the country, finds himself widely

hailed as the next Republican nominee because of the administration's serious losses. The minority party's victory has increased its belief that Roosevelt may be elected if nominated, and strengthened the idea that Morrow may be the Republican choice if party politicians deem it unadvisable to renominate President Hoover. The various wet victories also have strengthened the political position of the two men.

Although Roosevelt has no seemingly strong rival for nomination Morrow's chances are more probable. Parties normally renominate their presidents and Morrow himself repudiated suggestions of his candidacy during the campaign by declaring for Hoover's re-election.

BOTH MEN BATTLED AGAINST ODDS

Both men reached their present political prestige in the face of handicaps which seemed insurmountable. In 1921 at the age of 39 Roosevelt was stricken by infantile paralysis and he had spent seven years in a period of laborious and exacting sure to regain use of his legs when he accepted Governor Al Smith's plea that he strengthen the party in New York by running for Governor. It was said that he would break down on the job in Albany, but he has been able to work

and to campaign, and his condition is no longer regarded as a strong factor against his progress to higher political honors.

Morrow's handicap was his connection with the Morgan banking firm. Until he appeared on the scene the idea of a Morgan partner ever being mentioned as a possible president was considered simply inconceivable. But the senate which confirmed Morrow's appointment to Mexico City and the New Jersey voters who nominated and elected him failed to raise the issue against him. Even if neither man ever received his party's nomination, both will be in the limelight's full glare for at least the next couple of years.

Roosevelt will be in a position similar to Al Smith's after 1926. His every major movement and policy will receive national attention. The country has heard most of him in connection with his firmness toward public utilities, his announced wet stand and what he has done or left undone about recent scandals in ammaney Hall. Tammany will be used as an issue against Roosevelt, but could hardly be used to prevent his nomination. As a youth in the New York legislature he often fought Tammany. But lately even the Democratic New York World has attacked him for taking no firmer measures to clean up that organization after revelations of graft. On

the public utilities issue, Roosevelt is lined up with such other election winners as Senator Norris of Nebraska, Senator Walsh of Montana and Governor-elect Pinchot of Pennsylvania. What he does about public utilities during his second term will be considered indicative of how he would use the issue in a presidential campaign. Hardly any one doubts that the next Democratic nominee will be wet. There are those who believe both candidates will be wet and that both parties will declare for repeal. Roosevelt has not been such a belligerent wet thus far as to draw the special antagonism of the dries.

ROOSEVELT ALWAYS A GOOD FIGHTER

Roosevelt has always been a good fighter—in politics as against his personal affliction. As a reporter on the Harvard Crimson 27 years ago he organized an attack on the University corporation for not providing proper fire escapes for the dormitories. He won a seat in the State senate which had been held by Republicans for twenty-eight years. He was one of the first Wilson for president men and was only 31 when Wilson made him an assistant Secretary of the Navy. After his collapse he battled paralysis and finally marked his return to active public life with his famous speech for Smith years ago, entitled the Happy

Warrior.

Diminutive in size, Morrow will yet tower over most of his fellow Senators. He will be among half a dozen of the most distinguished among them and will stand out as the able leader of the increasingly strong wet wing of the Republican party. He has been a financier, a lawyer, a close adviser of President Coolidge, head of the commission which planned our military naval aviation policy. He will be obvious presidential timber whether anything can be done about that or not and it is hardly conceivable that his Senate career will not be on a par with his previous achievements.

COLOMBIA POPULATION UP

BOGOTA, Colombia, (UP).—Latest census figures give Colombia a population of 7,851,000 compared to 5,855,077 in 1918 when the last count was made. Fifty one per cent of all Colombians over 10 years of age know how to read and write, the census revealed. Immigration since 1918 has been negligible, with a total of 35,251 foreigners entering the country during the period.

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JAP PREMIER WOUNDED BY A REVOLUTIONIST

TOKYO, Nov. 14. (AP).—Comeo Sagoya, 23, stepped from a crowd lining the Tokyo central station platform today and fired a single shot seriously wounding Premier Yuko Hamoguchi.

Sagoya was identified as a member of the Recationary Patriotic organization. The premier was en route to Okayama to attend the annual army maneuvers.

A bulletin issued tonight said that the premier was "in no immediate danger." Because the premier's condition was favorable, the cabinet decided it unnecessary to appoint a temporary premier today.

Howard to Save \$40,000 on Decision

BIG SPRING, Texas, Nov. 14.—Approximately 1100 Howard county farmers will share in the saving of \$40,000 annually as a result of the raising of the Federal and State Pink Boll Worm quarantine regulations that has been imposed on a group of counties in this vicinity during the past three years.

Word was received here Thursday from J. M. Del Curto, state entomologist, to the effect that the regulations would be lifted from Howard, Borden, Martin, Glasscock and Dawson counties, and a portion of Midland county. This release will become effective Monday November 17. After that date on cotton in these West Texas counties will be required to be fumigated and neither will be farmers be compelled to sterilize the seed as has been done under the quarantine regulations. The removal of this quarantine, according to I. B. Couble, farmer and ranchman of Howard county, will enable the farmers to go into open market with their seed, a privilege which has been denied under the quarantine regulations. Certain mills had been designated to which seed could be shipped, which has resulted in a discrimination in price according to many farmers in this section.

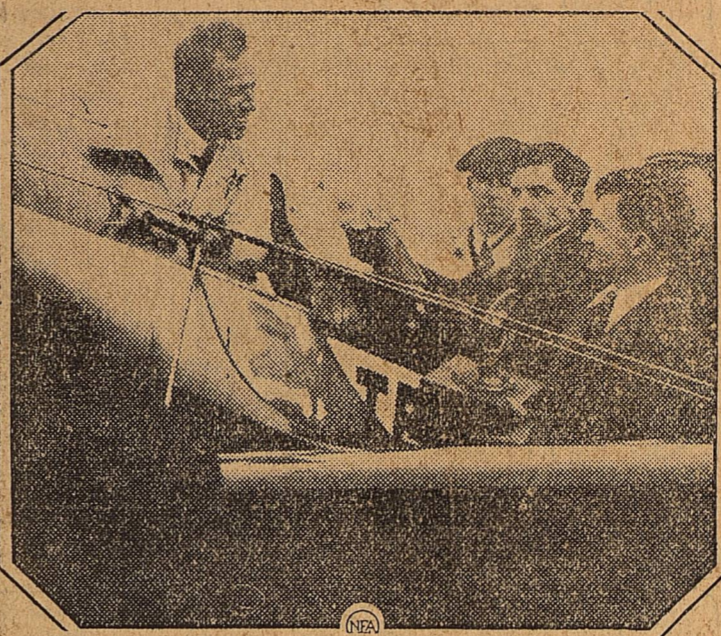
"A short meeting of the lodge was held early and at 8 o'clock, refreshments were served to some seventy members and visitors.

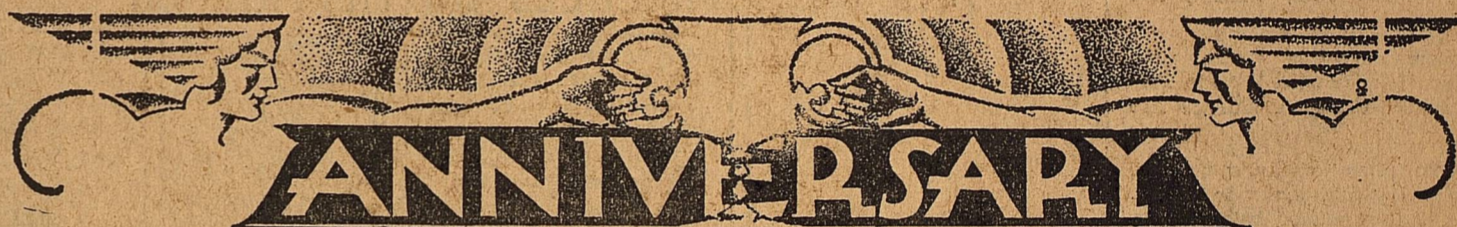

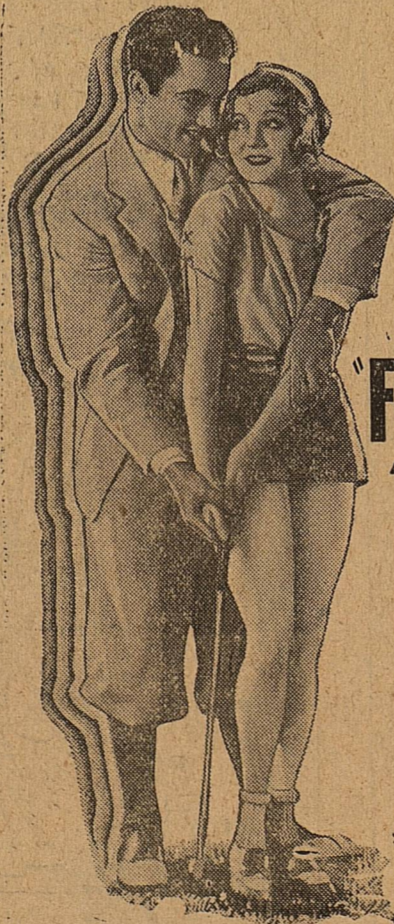
