

PUTTING PEOPLE TO WORK

Local officials of the Midland Community Welfare association, county officials and chamber of commerce executives have received from Dallas a set of blanks, with detailed information, used there in registering the unem-

In some localities this work is done by federal employment bureau offices. Midlana has no such office but the workers of the organizations mentioned above have agreed to conduct the registration, provided the people of Midland will respond to the occasion, helping in every way to relieve the unemployment situation as it is ana-

It is believed that the registrations here will not run into a large number. Yet there are enough people out of work to warrant every effort possible to have jobs for all within the county lines. There are carpenters among them, although some of these have found employment on jobs starting within the past week or two. There are painters, brick layers, plasterers and mechanics of various trades. There are bookkeepers, stenographers, manual laborers and domestic servants—farm hands and cowpunchers.

Even though the list of registered unemployed may not be long, it is important to the community that these people find work to do if possible. Many are home owners, others have interests here, children in school, investments made-good reasons for not leaving Midland if work

can be found. The responsibility of the whole job, after Midland's unemployed are registered, rests upon the general public Do those odd jobs around your home, repairing, carpentering, yard work, sidewalk building! Put on that extra clerk for the holiday business, then go out yourself and work harder to bring in customers. If you are doing all of your office work and losing that contact which is valuable to the extension of your business, hire that badly needed bookkeeper, stenographer or office girl:

A VIRTUE IN LAZINESS

A glance at the fall lists of the chief publishing houses indicates that there is no let-up in the great flood of books. Wherever they may come from, and whatever may be the vision that leads them on, the authors of the land are advancing in full battalions, and the average reader is likely to do so in any event. getting ready to take his punishment like a man.

Lazy people read books. It would not quite be accurate to say that only lazy people read books; but they do most of it, and no man who has not at least a broad streak of laziness will read a book if he can possibly avoid it.

Consider the matter for a moment. Reading a book is a thing that can be done only in relaxation. The reader must find a comfortable chair, preferably with a place where he can hoist his feet. To be sure, there are books that, in the current phrase, "make demands on the reader." These books are often called powerful, or stimulating, or provocative—or, occasionally, gripping. Those words hardly sound like enticements for the lazy.

But this sounds worse than it is. Even a lazy man can be willing to have his intellect jogged providing that he can stretch out and put his feet up while it is going on. Besides, even in the worst cases, the author does most of the work. The reader is only a passive participant.


So it is that human laziness plays into the hands of the novelist and the publisher. The novelist and the publisher, accordingly, would consider laziness a virtue instead of a vice; and very probably they are right. Think what the energetic, ambitious chap misses-long hours of quiet meditation and self-communion, peaceful interludes in which he can let some more earnest soul help him figure out what his place is in the universe and why he is there. That is the sort of thing that comes out of much reading. Only the truly lazy can get it.

That estimate was based on a 40,000,000 barrel gasoline stock. A report of the institute places the gasoline stocks at the end of last week at 36,532,000

Alvin Richards, newly elected president of the Kansas-Oklahoma division of the Midcontinent Oil and Gas association, saw in the revised proration program "a hastening of stabzlization" for the Pe troleum industry.

"The curtailment program is spreading fast," he said, "and it appears that the producers and purchasers are to be permitted to harmonize their figures and to make current supply meet current

The new Texas plan, effective Thursday, November 27, calls for holding that state's daily average output to approximately 680,000 barrels, or about 70,000 barrels less l than the permitted production for the last 90 days. That reduction, if affected, would be more than sufficient to bring the country's production to conformity with the recommendation of the petroleum institute's committee.

The committee's report was endorsed by the directors of the institute and submitted to the industry as a guide for operations between now and April 1. It emphasized that gasoline stocks must not exceed 40,000,000 barrels next spring if the industry is to expect improvement during the year.

While Oklahoma's present allowed production is 545,000 barrels daily, the actual output has been running considerably below that figure.


