## Howe Receives President Hoover's Commission Today

Transfer of Duties Is Expected at an Early Date

President Herbert Hoover's official commission was received this morning by John P. Howe, naming him postmaster at Midland for a term of four years ending July 13, 1936. The president signed the document August 2, the signature of Postmaster General Walter F. Brown being affixed also. A communication accompanying

e commission advised Howe that was to assume the duties of he was to assume the duties of postmaster as soon as was "practicable," it being the belief of local authorities that the transfer of duties would accompany the visit of a postal inspector at an early date.

Howe succeeds Mrs. Mary S. Ray, who has held that position for several administrations. She was not an applicant for respectively.

ral administrations. She was not an applicant for reappointment.

The new postmaster was chosen from a list of more than 30 applicants, 21 of them returning their papers in an examination held here October 13, 1931.

Upon examination of the papers, the list was reduced to eleven, and references were asked from business men and civic leaders, the number then being reduced to three.


#### GENE TUNNEY—STUMP SPEAKER



PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to-wit:
First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

Second: Idiots and lunatics.
