Howe Receives President Hoover's Commission Today

POSTMASTER OFFICIALLY NOTIFIED

Transfer of Duties Is Expected at an Early Date

President Herbert Hoover's official commission was received this morning by John P. Howe, naming him postmaster at Midland for a term of four years ending July 13, 1936.

A communication accompanying the commission advised Howe that he was to assume the duties of postmaster as soon as was practicable.

STERLING CAMPAIGN SPEAKERS, W. R. ELY AND BOB STUART, TO ADDRESS MIDLANDERS SATURDAY

Two prominent Texans active in the campaign for re-election of Ross Sterling as governor, will speak in Midland Saturday night.

W. R. Ely, chairman of the state highway commission, and Bob Stuart, art of Fort Worth, Sterling campaign manager for Fort Worth and west, informed Leon Goodman, local Sterling chairman, late Thursday.

The speaking has been arranged for 8:30 o'clock, at the south side of the court house. Citizens of Midland county and the surrounding territory are urged to be present, Goodman said.

Ely is well known in Midland, having been instrumental in securing the concrete highway strip through the city. He had much to do with securing the order for construction of the Ranger cut-off, contract for which was let early this week.

Stuart also comes here recommended as a speaker of excellent ability. He has been a strong leader for Sterling in the campaign thus far, local supporters said.

Gold Project Gives Jobs to Sixty Men

Operation of a new flotation mill on the gold and silver mining properties leased by Ira L. and W. S. Wright at Mogollon, N. M., is giving work for 60 men. The mines are taking about 100 tons daily. The work is at the Fanny mine, owned by the Lehigh Metals company.

Pecos Man Perfects New Drilling Bit

Wells can be drilled in one-tenth the usual time and at one-tenth the average cost with a new bit recently patented by W. M. Haynie of Pecos, he claims. The bit is made on a completely new principle from the regular rotary drill. The bit is said to cut and bore simultaneously, and experiments show it goes through rock, dirt, shale and ore with equal facility. Haynie believes his bit will revolutionize oil well drilling.

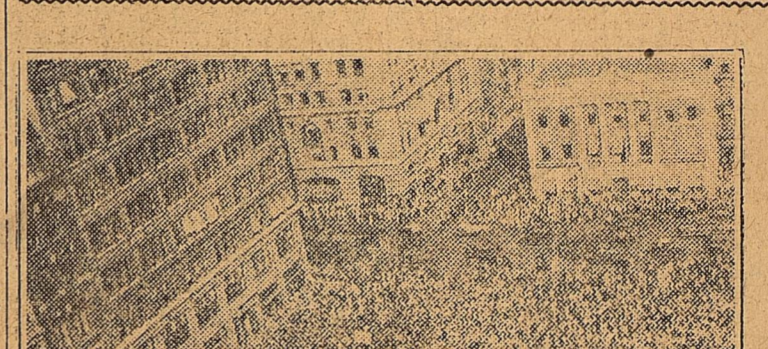

INDICTED IN MURDER OF HUSBAND

Her Father Fighting Daughter's Arrest Or Capture

WINSTON SALEM, Aug. 5. (UP) Libby Holman Reynolds, fugitive from justice since yesterday when she was indicted on a charge of murdering her husband, Smith Reynolds, may fight extradition from her hiding place.

This plan is now under consideration by her father, Alfred Holman, en route here this afternoon from Cincinnati to arrange release and bond for his daughter if she is arrested or surrenders.

Aboard his train, Holman said he would use every resource to keep his daughter from jail and refused to say where she is hiding.

Meanwhile the unexpected indictments of Libby and A. B. Walker, 19, Reynolds' friend, caused great excitement. Walker surrendered last night and was in jail today.

When asked if Libby were pregnant, Holman repeated the evidence she gave before the coroner's jury in Winston Salem several weeks ago. Libby said then she thought herself pregnant.

He refused by denying to a county officer information of her whereabouts.

"I will give out no information based on a frame up," he firmly declared.

Only a few hours before he had used that term—"frame up"—in referring to the "true bills" returned by a grand jury at Winston Salem, N. C., accusing his daughter and Albert Walker, life long friend of Smith Reynolds, of his death.

May Be in West Holman, the lawyer-father who consistently has pointed to himself as Libby's only counsel, previously had disputed the contention of Hamilton county officials that a telegraphed request for Libby's arrest constituted a warrant.

Mrs. Myron Kahn, the sister to whose home Mrs. Reynolds came after the inquest into her husband's death, "confided Libby could be produced, "almost immediately."

Reports were current she either was in Delaware or California.

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C., Aug. 5.—Libby Holman Reynolds, Broadway torch singer, and Albert Walker, Winston-Salem youth, were indicted Thursday for the murder of Libby's husband, Smith Reynolds, heir to an estimated \$15,000,000 tobacco fortune.

CHICAGO FIRE LOSS REACHES SIXTEEN MILLION

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—Fire swept through more than two blocks of buildings on the near Southwest Side of Chicago's industrial area late Thursday, causing damage estimated at more than \$16,000,000.

Two firemen and a spectator were injured while more than half the city's fire fighting equipment battled to keep the flames from getting out of control.

The plant of the Omaha Packing company virtually was destroyed with a loss estimated at approximately \$5,000,000.

Fire officials said the conflagration was started by a dust explosion in the 10-story elevator of the Quincy Elevator company, at 22nd and Sangamon streets, adjoining the south branch of the Chicago river.

Damage to the elevator and its contents was placed at \$800,000 by H. S. Obermayer, an official of the Stratton Grain company, which owned the building.

The flames also spread to the lumber yard of the W. B. Crane company and the coal yards of the Consumers company.

At the packing plant, 3,000 hogs, 800 cattle and 700 sheep were burned to death in the livestock pens. Only a few minor buildings belonging to the slaughter house were saved.

AUSTIN, Aug. 5. (UP)—The railroad commission entered an order today, providing for twenty acre spacing of wells in the Rabbs acre field of Fort Bend county. An additional field hearing was set for August 16 at Houston.

Ziegfeld Will Is Filed for Probate

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Aug. 5. (UP)—The Ziegfeld will, filed for probate this morning, left his estate to his widow, Billie Burke, and his daughter, Patricia. There was no indication of the size of the state. Provisions for Ziegfeld's mother, Mrs. Rosalie Ziegfeld, were left to the discretion of his widow and daughter.

Chief Started Practice Blazes

BERLIN, (UP)—Of all chiefs of local fire departments in Germany, Wilhelm Schwadtko was the proudest. Ever since he abandoned the plow for the fire hose, ex-farmer Wilhelm was the first member of the scene whenever an alarm came in.

Bent on speed, he even was known to rush to the blaze in slippers. To Wilhelm's satisfaction, the number of fires increased rapidly since his designation as chief, and so he found ample occasion to display his heroism to admiring citizens.

The frequency of fires aroused police suspects. After a barn had burned, detectives discovered footprints in the vicinity and made wax models of them.

Arrested and brought to trial, Wilhelm's slippers were found to tally with the footprints. Finding him guilty of arson, the Selchow court sentenced Fire Chief Schwadtko to 18 months in jail.

GENE TUNNEY—STUMP SPEAKER

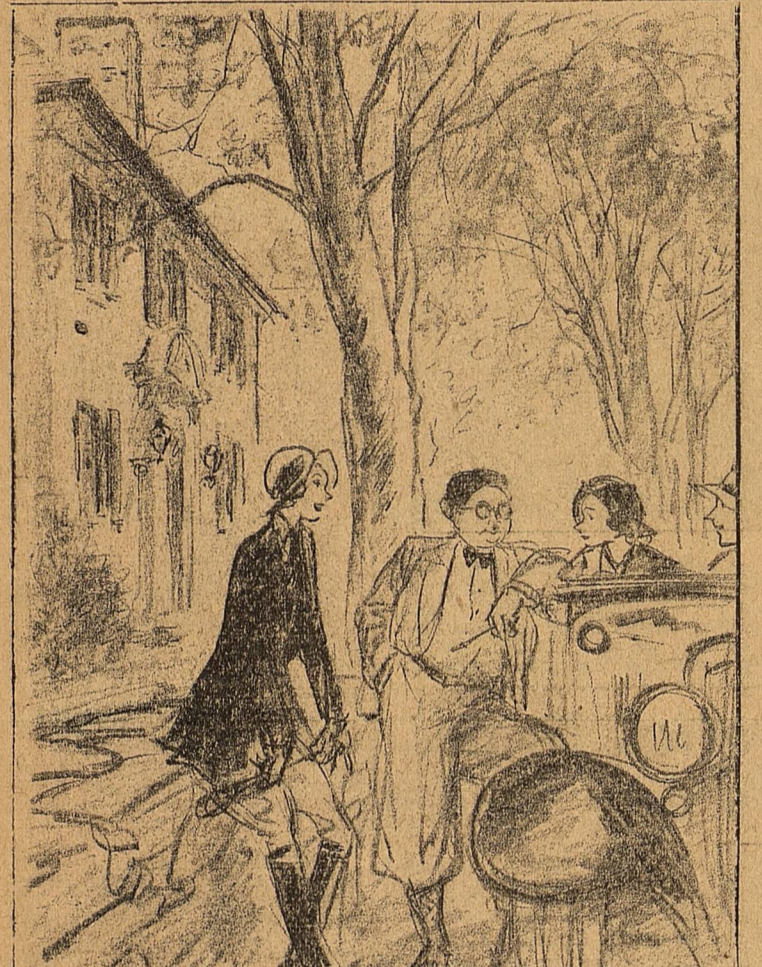
Gene Tunney probably will never be seen in the prize ring again; but you might just keep your eye on the young man and see if he doesn't get into politics in a wholesome way before so very long.

H. J. R. No. 1 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to-wit: First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

Section 2. That Section 33 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall not be allowed to pay warrants upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution."

Section 3. That Section 40 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster."

Section 4. That Section 11 of Article 11 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 11. In order to enable the Legislature to perform the duties set forth in the foregoing Section, it is hereby declared all lands and other property heretofore set apart and

Doug Fairbanks at The Grand Sunday

In a world in which speed has become a matter of supreme importance, nothing has been more intriguing than the efforts of men to set new records for encircling the earth.

Jules Verne staggered the human imagination when he wrote his "Around the World in Eighty Days," a feat which at the time was thought incredible.

Post and Gatty made the Verne prediction look foolish by flying around the world in a little more than eight days.

Now comes Douglas Fairbanks inviting the public to accompany him "Around the World in 80 Minutes," his latest United Artists picture that comes to the Grand theatre Sunday and Monday.

The style of the telling in this film however, recalls Mark Twain's "Innocents Abroad." The humorous side of everything is stressed, and there is a running fire explanation of each scene by Doug Fairbanks which brings shouts of laughter.

Music is employed at various places in the film, but it is chiefly for the purpose of amusement. A string of camels crossing the desert, and a singer breaks out with the "Carolina Moon" theme song of a well-known radio broadcast—as soon as the audience recognizes the subtlety a long loud laugh results. The Taj Mahal, flashes on the screen and the song changes to "Little Gray Home in the West." Another amusing musical note is the singing lesson in a Japanese home.

Crime Club on Riviera Suspected

NICE, Aug. 5. (UP)—Criminologists on the Riviera are beginning to suspect the existence of a crime club, modelled after the famous suicide organizations which stirred the continent years ago.

Authorities have been led to this theory because of the number of recent crimes committed more or less like clockwork all along the Riviera for apparently no reason, but a desire to do evil.

Pecuniary gain, revenge, jealousy, or any one of a dozen motives usually inspiring criminal acts, have not played any part in these exploits.

One criminologist who also is not deterred for detective work said: "Somewhere down here is a sinister coalition of crime amateurs meeting regularly perhaps with ritualistic splendor. They all may be 'respectable' people, leading Jekyll and Hyde lives, or just youngsters contaminated by too much reading of modern detective fiction."

A case in point is that of a young Egyptian aristocrat who now is in the Nouvelle Prisons here. A member of a prominent Cairo family, he came to the Riviera last March well supplied with money. When he departed he went straight to a de luxe hotel on the Promenade des Anglais. Less than a week later he was jailed on a hold-up charge, caught in the act.

"In the meantime he had tried to murder a garage owner. That, too, was proved. Despite the overwhelming evidence, he denies everything. 'Third degree' methods have failed. He tried to hang himself in his cell."

Then there was the case of "Tom Clark," the American whose body was found floating off Cannes last January.

Clark, a tourist, had no money and no enemies. Yet, as far as police know, he was murdered. His body was buried in a pauper's grave because police had no clue to his identity other than a hastily scribbled name on the register in a tawdry hotel.

Also, there was the case of young Martin, 20-year-old son of a Cannes merchant. Martin had no enemies. He had no money. His body was found floating in the water, just as Clark's was, off Antibes.

These are just a few of the cases that could be quoted in support of the theory that there are people on this coast who commit crime for the love of it.

"This is a terrible injustice to an innocent young woman," her father said.

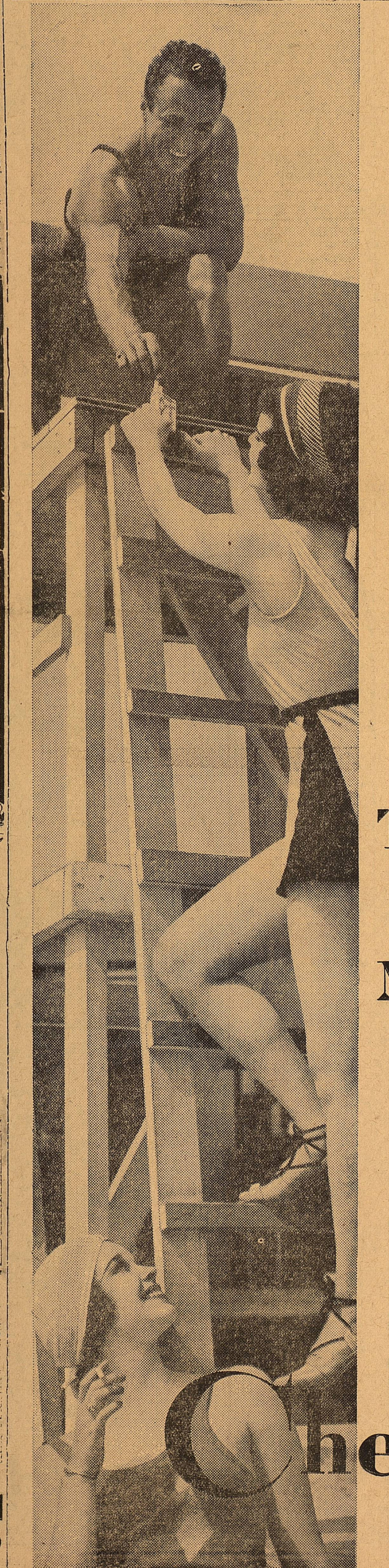
