Stock exchange prices climbed one to three points today, reaching the highest levels in two months as bulls waged a successful battle to keep up the boom in security and commodity

Heavy buying in government issues was sent to the new year's high. Do-mestic corporation bonds rose to new highs. 


## **Government Emerging as Financial Giant From the Slough of Past Ventures**

EDITOR'S NOTE: Up until 1916 the United States had followed an unswerving policy of keeping its government out of business. Then the shipping board was established. Soon after came the farm loan policy, and now the years of "the depression." Vast sums of money have been thrown into business to fight away

Vast sums of money have been thrown into business to fight away the spectre of bankruptcy and collapse. The Reconstruction Fin-ance Corporation has made loan after loan. With amazing rapidity the government has sailed far away from anything that was con-templated when the time-honored policy was abandoned in 1916. Today it is a three-billion dollar partner in business, with inter-ests comparable only to those of Soviet Russia. The United Press has made a survey of this dramatic entry of the United States into business. It presents the startling findings in a series of articles of which the following is the first.



There is in this the chance for a good deal of injustice. Vote to sock your congressman, if you feel like it, by all means; but first check up on his record and see what he has done in the past session.


