clubs and pistols. In their fight to reach the bailiffs through the crowd, the policemen were attacked with clubs and knives. Ernest suffered a fractured skull. McFadden and Graham were severely cut on their faces but returned to duty after receiving medical attention.

The arrival of a squad car caused the crowd to transfer its attention from the patrol wagon crew to the new arrivals. One negro drew Sergeant Henry Lion's pistol from his holster and pressed the muzzle

against the officer's stomach. Negro Shot in Head

Policeman William Jordan reached over the menaced officer's shoulder and shot the negro through the head. He fell dead. Then the crowd became widely excited, striking at the officers with knives and clubs The police fired several bullets into the crowd and several negroes fell, (See THREE KILLED page 6)

THE CORNWALLIS AFFAIR

These people who insist that Cornwallis' surrender be left out of the "birth of the nation" pageant at Yorktown, out of respect for tender British sensibilities, seem to be inspired by noble motives. The only trouble is that they don't go quite far enough.

If we are to fix things up so that all reminders of the misfortunes of the British lion in North America are obliterated, there are a good many other things that will have to be done.

There is, for instance, the matter of the U.S.S. Constitution, recently reconditioned at great expense. Hasn't anyone remembered that almost all of Old Ironsides' victories were won against the British? Obviously, the only decent thing to do is tow the ignoble vessel out beyond the tip of Cape Cod and sink it, quietly and without a fuss.

Then there is the Declaration of Independence; surely that could be toned down in some way so as to leave British feelings unruffled. With this action, of course, there must be some legislation to compel us to celebrate Independence Day without referring to King George or the redcoats.

Only a few days ago a monument to Commodore Perry was dedicated in Lake Erie's island of Put-in-Bay. This bit of poor taste might be atoned for by destroying the monument at once, and the battle of Lake Erie must be forgotten as soon as possible.

On the battlefield of Saratoga there is quite a monument, too. We ought to amend its inscriptions so that no mention is made of the fact that an English general named Burgoyne surrendered there.

About the only revolutionary monument that can remain standing, in fact, is the one at Bunker Hill. The British, you see, won that battle. Our Anglophile patriots probably will agree that that monument is all right. But the rest, evidently, must go.

All of this may sound a bit dizzy. But it is, really, any dizzier than this proposal to emasculate the Yorktown ceremonies so that a few doddering worshippers of the mother country can forget their chagrin at being Americans?

OATS AND THE BARBER

A farmer living near Tiffin wanted a shave and a haircut. A barber in the town happened to want some oats for his chickens. So he agreed to barber the farmer and take his pay in oats.

When the price of grain is down so low that it takes four/bushels to get a farmer through a barber shop, it is rather obvious that the farmer is in a tough spot.

horse" it was Man o' War. Man o' War was a big horse, looked like a champion, acted like one, paraded like one and ran like one Probably no horse that ever ran so

impressed 'the public as did the son of Fair Play. To see him was to cheer for him, and the way in which Man o' War ran his races left no doubt in the minds of those who watched him as to his unbeatable ability.

The victor in 20 out of 21 races, away with such good horses as John P. Grier, Donnaconna, and Upset Measurements showed that he covered the unbelievable distance of 25 feet at every stride, and none of his opponents was able to match strides with him for even a few furlongs. Perhaps Man o' War's supremacy was never better demonstrated than Samuel D. Riddle, owner of "Old Red," as he was called by those who knew him best, had announced that his colt would be retired at the conclusion of his regular three-yearold engagements. 


