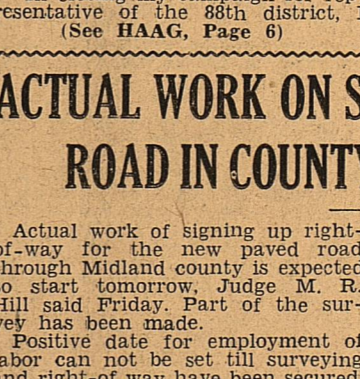
Washing Post Tells Bankers The Major Crisis Has Passed

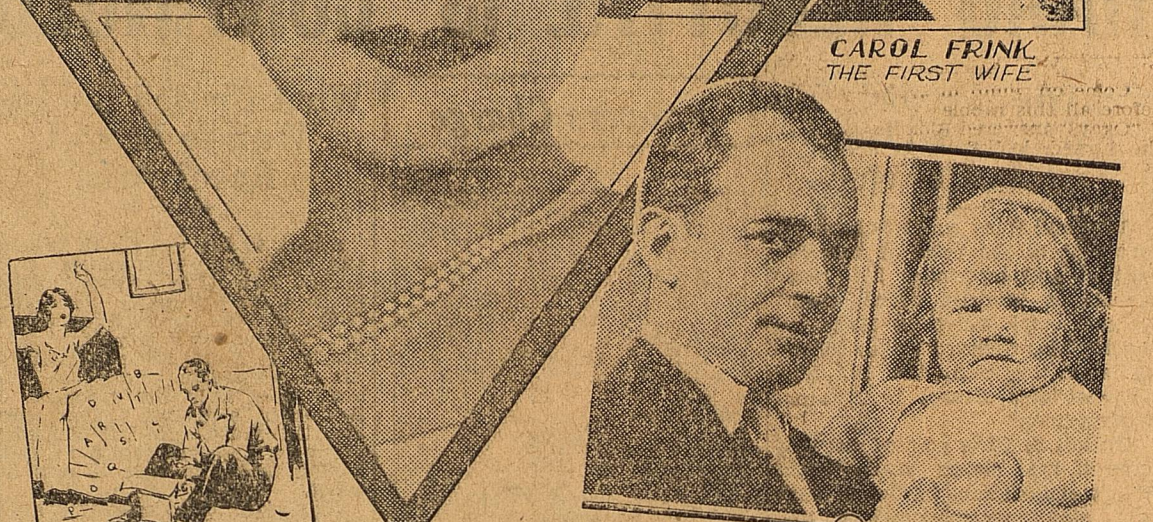
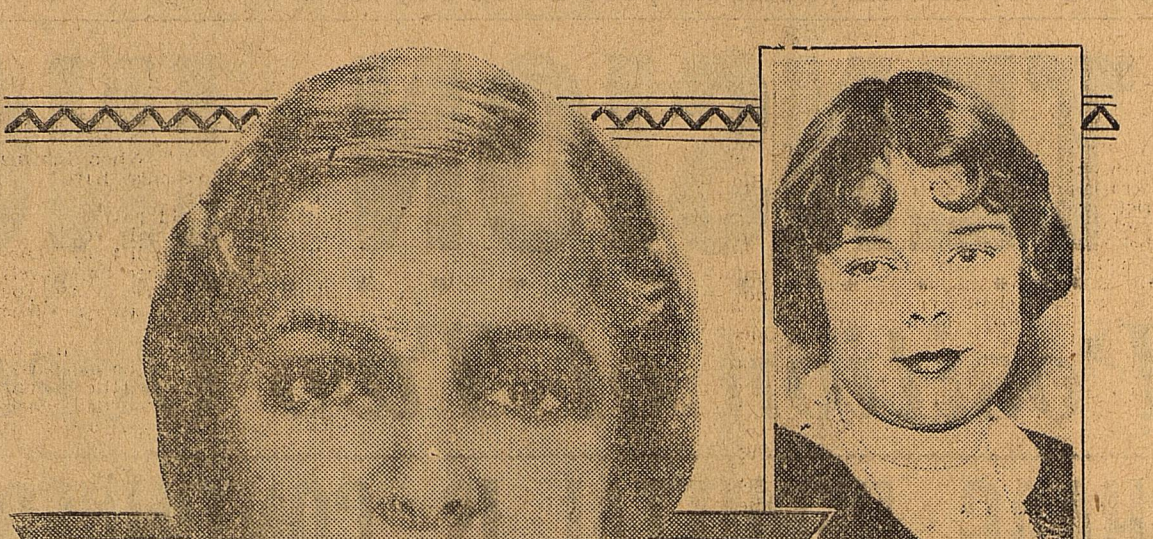

Colleges Charge Less This Year

FORT WORTH (UP)—The cost of a college education in Texas has been cut approximately \$200. Reports from major institutions in the state revealed that room rents, tuition, and fees of private colleges have been reduced, in keeping with a general reduction of 10 per cent in the cost of books and supplies. State-supported colleges have made minor reductions in fees. A student can live comfortably, see an occasional football game or basket ball contest, and perhaps make a shore week-end excursion during his academic year for \$500, according to estimates made by deans and registrars. A student who once spent about \$700 at Texas Christian University may continue his college education at 16 per cent less cost. Board, room, and tuition for dormitory students there has been cut nearly \$100. Most of the economies were effected in rentals and cafeteria prices. A student may attend Texas Woman's college here two semesters for as low as \$373. This plan, however, is open only to students working four hours weekly. They formerly paid \$495 a year for education.

At Baylor university dormitory rates for men have been cut from \$72 to \$180 to a scale ranging from \$27 to \$113. Former rates of 96 to \$192 in the Memorial dormitory for women have been cut to \$54 to \$132. Board has been reduced from \$288 to \$208, with only minor changes made in the \$288 tuition fees. Southern Methodist university has reduced room and board for men from \$400 to \$287; for women, from \$495 to \$375.

CHEMICAL WARNING

AUSTIN—"We worry about yellow and black gold, but we neglect our real gold—out water—until we are caught in a jam," declared Dr. E. P. Schoch, professor of physical chemistry and director of the Bureau of Industrial Chemistry at the University of Texas, in a recent talk before a civic club here. A simple method of controlling evaporation of surface water was explained by Dr. Schoch, who pointed out that evaporation during the hot months of summer takes place at the rate of seven inches in two feet each four weeks. Corn cobs soaked in crude oil and thrown onto surface water stores will retard evaporation sharply, Dr. Schoch declared.
