Distress Signals in Mid-ocean Met By 'naughts

WASHINGTON, June 15. (UP)—The battleship Wyo-ming today radioed the navy department that it had taken in tow the disabled submarine, Nautilus, in mid-Atlantic and was proceeding to Queens-

town, Ireland.
Engine trouble caused the craft bearing Sir Hubert Wilkins' polar expedition, to call for relief. It wallowed for several hours with both motors disabled. The men were in

WASHINGTON, June 15. (AP)-Sir Hubert Wilkins' submarine, Nautilus, bound for the North Pole, was diasbled and tossing in heavy seas 1000 miles west of France today with two American battleships standing by to take her in tow when the sea

This word was flashed to the naval communications station at the Navy Department by Rear Admiral Claude C. Bloch, commanding the battleships Arkansas and Wyoming, which had raced at top speed MORE THAN 500 through the turbulent seas to the

"Arkansas and Wyoming are standing by the Nautilus," said his radiogram received at 1:26 p. m Eastern Standard time. "Latitude 46:40, longitude 30:30. Nautilus' starboard engine and port motor disabled. Batteries dead.



WOULD THE HOWSLEY BILL HELP?

If available information on the Howsley bill to control the oil industry is correct, this bill would be dangerous to such sections as West Texas if passed. To begin with, it is doubtful if the bill would afford even temporary relief, but surely it would lead to trouble in the future.

The bill would give a commission the power to regulate every phase of production in the oil business, providing that "the production of oil in this state in excess of the current reasonable market demand for current use and consumption shall constitute waste and is hereby

This means that three men would have the power to say when there was too much oil-and when there wasn't enough oil. Competition would be entirely withdrawn from the business and the exploration for oil would be entirely stopped The millions of acres of land in West Texas that have

been leased for oil would be cancelled—for there would

be no danger of any scramble for oil. No doubt the authors of this bill feel it would help to hold up the price of oil today. Granted that this is true—though the experience of actual proration by agreement in West Texas has proven to the contrary—the bill creates a condition that is worse than the one it sets out to


