No Charges in Slaying of Midland Woman; Man in Jail

CIRCUMSTANCES OF DALLAS SHOOTING MYSTIFY POLICE

THOUGHT

Bodies Found a Half Mile Apart and Hidden

DALLAS, June 29, (UP)-Circumstances surrounding the killing of Pauline Corman, 17, and her escort, Schreiber, 19, of Galveston Sunday today occupied the attention of city and county officers.

The bullet-torn bodies of the two were found concealed in weed more than a mile apart eight hours after they left the girl's home for a

The rented automobile was found parked on a city street. The back seat was bloodstained.

Robbery seemed to be motive for the murder as Schreiber's pockets were empty. Friends said he had \$25 when he left the hotel to visit the girl.

The girl was shot twice in the right breast and Schreiber once in the left side of the chest.

FALL SESSION LEGISLATURE **DEEMED LIKELY**

BY GORDON K. SHEARER United Press Staff Correspondent AUSTIN, June 29. (UP). - Provided the situation of the oil industry does not force earlier action, a special session of the Texas legislature is generally looked for this fall-probably in September or

Gov. Ross Sterling is too welladvised by those politically wise to defer a session until next year if he determines one is necessary at all. A session next year would be necessarily political. Members planning to run for offices in the summer primaries would be on the alert for publicity and other advantages for their prospective races. Also the anti - administration forces would most surely use it to embarrass the adminstration and the gov ernor, if he seeks re-election.

A fall session is sufficiently ahead of the next political campaign to prevent these inconveniences. The prospect that the governor will direct the legislature to attempt congressional redistricting will give any session plenty of politics.

The belief that there will be a fall session is based on a number

Here is the solution to the mystery of the death of Starr Faithfull, according to authorities who have become convinced that the New York beauty committed suicide. Reproduced above are parts of a letter dated June 4, the day before she disappeared, and received by Dr. G. Jameson-Carr, a ship's surgeon with whom she was acquainted. Following mention of different methods of suicide, the excerpt shown above reads: "I don't want to be maimed. I want oblivion. If there is an after-life it would be a dirty trick-but I'm sure fifty million priests ARE wrong. That is one of those things one KNOWS. Nothing makes any difference now . . ." The conclusion, reproduced below, reads: "There is nothing I can do but what I am going to do. I shall never see you again. That is extraordinary. Although I can't comprehend it any more than I can comprehend the words-'always'or 'time.' They produce a very merciful numbness,-Starr."



More Than 200 Have Died: Harvest At Night

CHICAGO, June 28, (UP)— The nation's hottest June set the mercury sizzling in thermometers again today, adding hourly to the toll of more than 200 deaths, thousands of doiars of crop damage and count

Forecasters promised no relief. Heat deaths in the Chicago area lone totaled more than 60. Indiana eported 22, and other states showed proportionate number of victims. Oats and other grain crops shriveled under the sum with farmers harvesting by moonlight to escap:

Another phase of the law, however, provides that one-third of the sentence must be served, hence the maximum sentence set by the jury is the guide by which the pardon board must act in giving such credits.

To which State Press comments: The indeterminate sentence is wise. It gives the prisoner hope. Hopelessness s productive of desperation, and desperation of violence. Good behavior is, as has been said of virtue in woman, a olessing to have and a tragedy to lose. When good benavior is paid for in terms of amelioration it is worth the orisoner's best efforts to continue it. It is doubtful if a man over thirty should ever be imprisoned for more than wenty years, or one over twenty go up for more than thirty years. Probably no man should be allowed in prison after his fiftieth year. A crime that justifies life imprisonment should justify capital punishment. Many jurors are reluctant, in the last instance, to order execution, so they compromise with their duty by voting for life imprisonment. This is costly to the state and of doubtful value announced today great crowds saw to the criminal. And as a deterrent it has small weight. Creamed Bacon and Mushrooms

2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons lour, 1 cup chicken broth, 1 cup evaporated milk, 1 cup canned mushrooms. 1 cup crisp, cooked bacon, salt and pepper, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley.

Melt butter, add flour and stir until well blended. Add boiling broth and evaporated milk. Cook directly over flame about 5 minutes. Add the mushrooms and bacon chips. Mix with sauce lightly to prevent crushing. Season with salt and pepper and serve immediately on hot, buttered toast. Garnish with a little chopped parsley.

Raspberry Mousse 1 No. 2 can red raspberries, 6 tablespoons raspberry juice, 3-4 cup evaporated milk 2 tablespoons lemon juice.

Drain juice from raspberries. There should be about one cur-Press the drained fruit through a fine sieve. There should be at least 11-8 cups pulp. Add 6 tablespoons juice drained from berries to the pulp. Let stand in refrigerator about 20 minutes. Scald evaporated milk in top of double boiler. Cool then chill in a bowl surrounded by chipped ice and salf. Whip unfil stiff. Add lemon juice and berry mixture, folding in carefully. Freeze in tray of automatic refrigerator.
