STIMSON CHARGED BY JAPANESE

Officers of Four States Seeking Desperate Jail Birds

BREAK OUT OF OTTAWA BASTILE

All Termed Desperate Men; Jailer Bound By Prisoners

MIAMI, Okla., Nov. 28. (AP)—Officers of four states tonight sought nine men who escaped from the Ottawa county jail after seizing and binding G. A. Guffey, jailer.

The nine, all accused of felonies, and considered the most desperate men in the jail, made their escape after taking Guffey's keys. He was caught and held, later being bound by the prisoners when he stood too near the cell block.

STANTON SCORES 92-0 WIN TO PUT AWAY DIST. TITLE

Stanton's superior football club further proved its right to be called a great scoring machine when it crushed Crane, 92-0, to win the championship of District 8, Class B. Rufus Hyde's rampling Buffaloes scored at will, from almost any play. Stanton scored its first touchdown on the third play of the game and from that time forward moved relentlessly up and down the field. Its quarter calling first one back and then another to score.

The Buffaloes used every man available, but the scoring continued. Stanton meets Snider Friday or Saturday in the bi-district playoff. Snider is favored to win. The eleven is much heavier than Stanton's club and boasts more reserves. It recently defeated Stamford 52-0, and has lost only to Lubbock and Sweetwater. It ran up a large score on Roscoe, a team Stanton downed, 25-0.

Members of the committee predicted a new inquiry into the operations of the board, which resulted in a paper loss of \$185,000,000. Chairman McNary said he had "disclosed some errors in the administration."

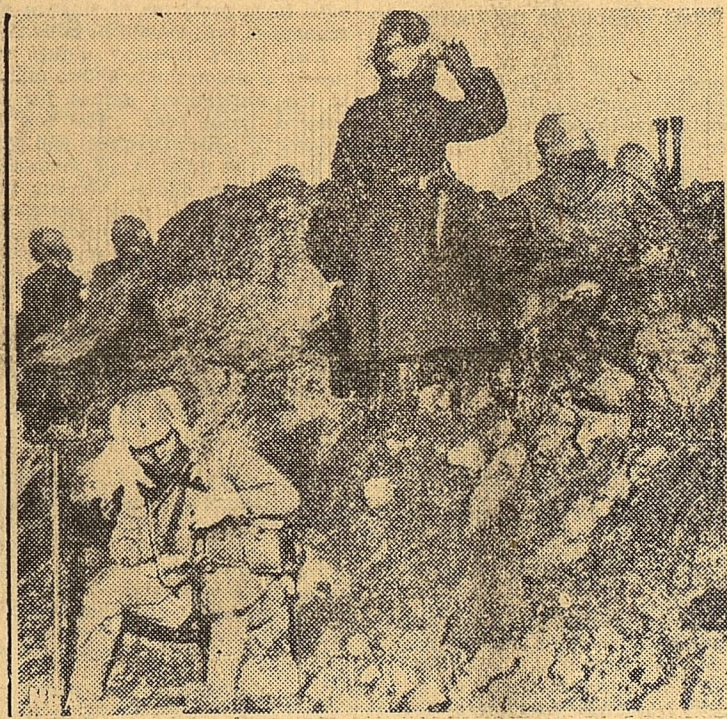

Pressing forward relentlessly along the Nonni River front in northern Manchuria, victorious Japanese troops are shown in this Reporter-Telegram-NEA picture as they crossed the smoldering ruins of a battlefield near Tshing. It was from Tshing that Japanese infantry and cavalry, supported by bombing planes and field artillery, moved onward to capture the walled city of Tsitsihar, key point of the Manchurian war zone.

INSULT IS POINTED TO BY EMBASSY

Tahusan Bombarded By Ruthless Jap Artillery

TOKYO, Nov. 28. (AP)—Secretary of State Stimson was accused today by the Japanese foreign office on the basis of statements attributed to him of "losing his head" and "flying into fulminations."

On assumption certain statements had been correctly attributed to Colonel Stimson, government officials declared they were of intimidating nature carrying suggestion of insult.

PEIPING, Nov. 28. (UP)—Japanese troops were massed for an attack on Tahusan, midway between Mukden and Chinchow, today. The city was bombed by planes and the artillery, infantry and cavalry were concentrated.

General Shogri Honjo agreed to withdraw forces from around Chinchow, yesterday's objective. Troops were also being rushed to Tientsin, within China proper, where rioting Chinese irregulars were clashing with Japanese.

The Tientsin situation was regarded as separate from the Manchurian clash and was treated accordingly by the Japanese. The bombing of Tahusan was reported to Peiping.

Japanese troops reached a point a few miles east of Tahusan early in the day, apparently preparing to attack the town.

Foreign press dispatches from Tientsin said the native city was in the grip of a reign of terror. Japanese forces there have been strengthened by 150 sailors landed from three destroyers.

League Appealed To Again

NANKING, Nov. 28. (UP)—The Nanking government again today called on the League of Nations for effective measures to bring peace in Manchuria.

Meanwhile, Chinese students increased their agitation against Japan and their condemnation of "weak-kneed policies" of China.

The new appeal to the League was in reply to a telegram from Aristide Briand warning both China and Japan to refrain from initiative which might again cause a conflict.

America Hopeful And Waiting

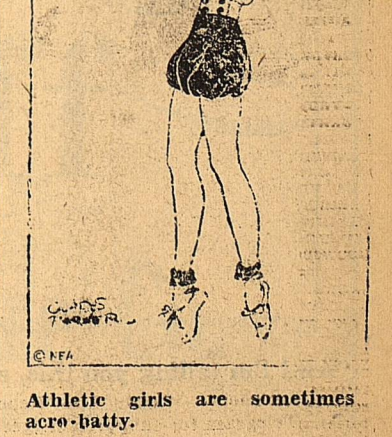
WASHINGTON, Nov. 28. (AP)—After a short interlude of confusion and false alarms, the American venture for peace in Manchuria was reverted tonight to a state of hopeful waiting.

As Japanese troops halted midway their advance on Chinchow, Secretary of State Stimson reiterated yesterday's statement of incredulity that further hostilities were in prospect. He received Japan's reassurance of good intentions.

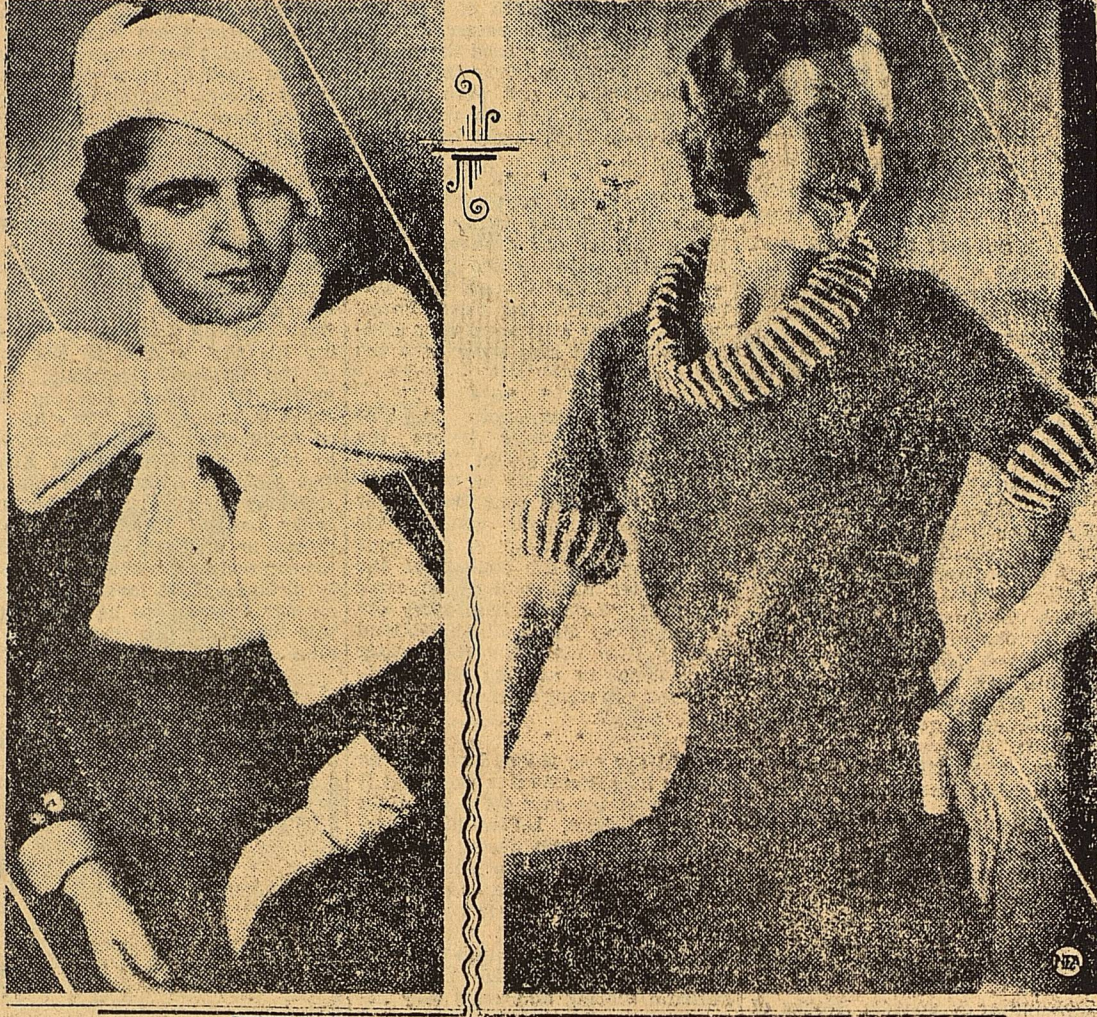

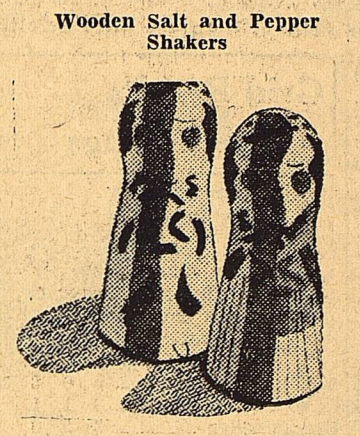

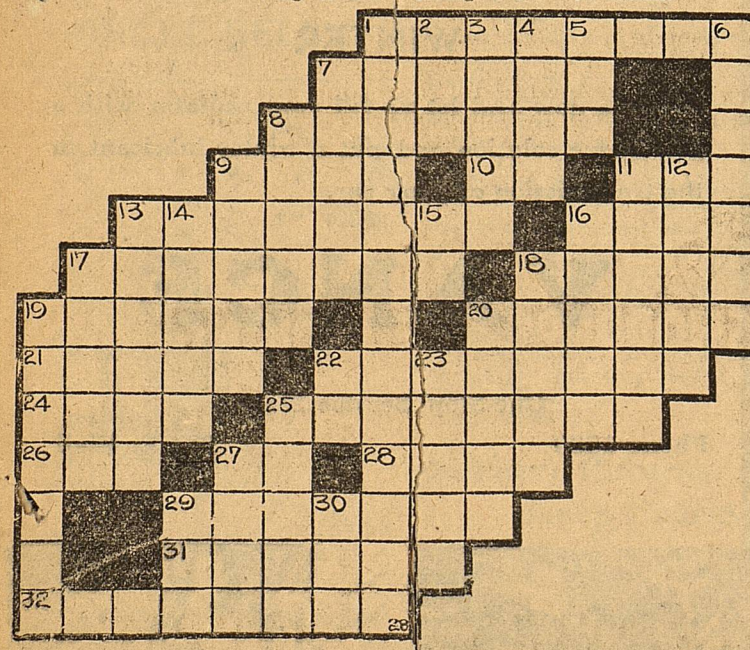
