Little disappointments have a way of seeming blacker, in childhood, than adults generally realize. Most of us, as we go bumping along from one disappointment and disillusionment to another, acquire a sort of case-harden-have lost much of their old-time ed philosophy, and learn to discount the value of the tolerance toward one another in prizes we fail to get. But a child hasn't any philosophy of that kind to sustain him.

Instead, he has to grin and bear it and sometimes ahead. the grin doesn't come easily. Even an adult gets the notion, now and then, that he faces a world which is in conspiracy to cheat him. How much more terribly does not such an idea bear down on a child's mind?

For children, in general, are rather lonely. 
