HOUSE AND SENATE DEADLOCKED

STATE IS VICTOR IN 1ST CLASH

Juvenile Trial Plea Overruled for Negress

Taking of testimony in the Doris Dixon murder trial was started shortly after two o'clock this afternoon. Selection of the jury was completed at noon, including G. N. Donovan, W. H. Sloan, John H. Edwards, W. M. Blevins, J. T. Baker, A. C. Caswell, J. R. Choate, George Nixon, J. V. Hobbs, W. H. Lochaby, A. B. Montgomery and W. L. Jimerson.

Verdict for the week who were not selected for the case were instructed by District Judge Charles L. Klapproth to appear in court again Wednesday morning.

First clash in the trial of Doris Dixon, negress, charged with murder in connection with the fatal shooting on July 26 last of Dewey Edwards, negro, was won by the prosecution when the case was called for trial in district court this morning.

Sam K. Wasaff, defense attorney, prior to selection of a jury to try the case, made a motion to have the case transferred to the county court, offering testimony to show that the defendant was only seventeen years old. He placed on the stand Lois Stewart, negress, sister of Doris, who testified that she was present at the birth of the defendant and that the date was June 3, 1915, or seventeen years ago.

A. C. Francis, sheriff who made the arrest on the night of the shooting of Edwards, testified that Doris told him at the time of the arrest that she was eighteen years of age. Richard Brown, negro janitor at the First National bank, testified that he was with the sheriff when the arrest was made, and corroborated the testimony.

A note of humor came into the preliminaries of the trial when Prosecutor Bob Smith took the stand and testified that Doris had told him she was eighteen years of age. Wasaff, for the defense, asked if Smith's information were not hearsay evidence, to which Smith replied that he had the information direct from the defendant.

"But you were not present when she was born?" asked Wasaff.

"No," Smith replied. "Were you there?"

Wasaff's motion, claiming that the age of eighteen was based on hearsay evidence, and asking that the case be tried as a juvenile trial, was overruled by Judge Klapproth, and the veniremen were immediately sworn preparatory to selecting the jury.

Doris Dixon was indicted by the grand jury in the present court term for the murder of Edwards, said offense being alleged to have occurred on the night of July 26, 1932. She pleaded "not guilty" to the charge.

Lions Pay Church Organizations \$360

A total of \$361.50 has been paid by the Midland Lions club to the women's organizations of the Christian, Methodist, Catholic and Presbyterian churches of Midland, for serving meals each week for the regular weekly luncheon. The organization had received an average of \$80 for the five-month period.

The plan adopted by the club to pay luncheon fees to the various church organizations came as a suggestion from Lion Earl Horst, while Marion M. Seymour was president. It has been so successful that the club membership has steadily grown and the local club benefited greatly, at the same time contributing in a substantial financial way to the church organizations.

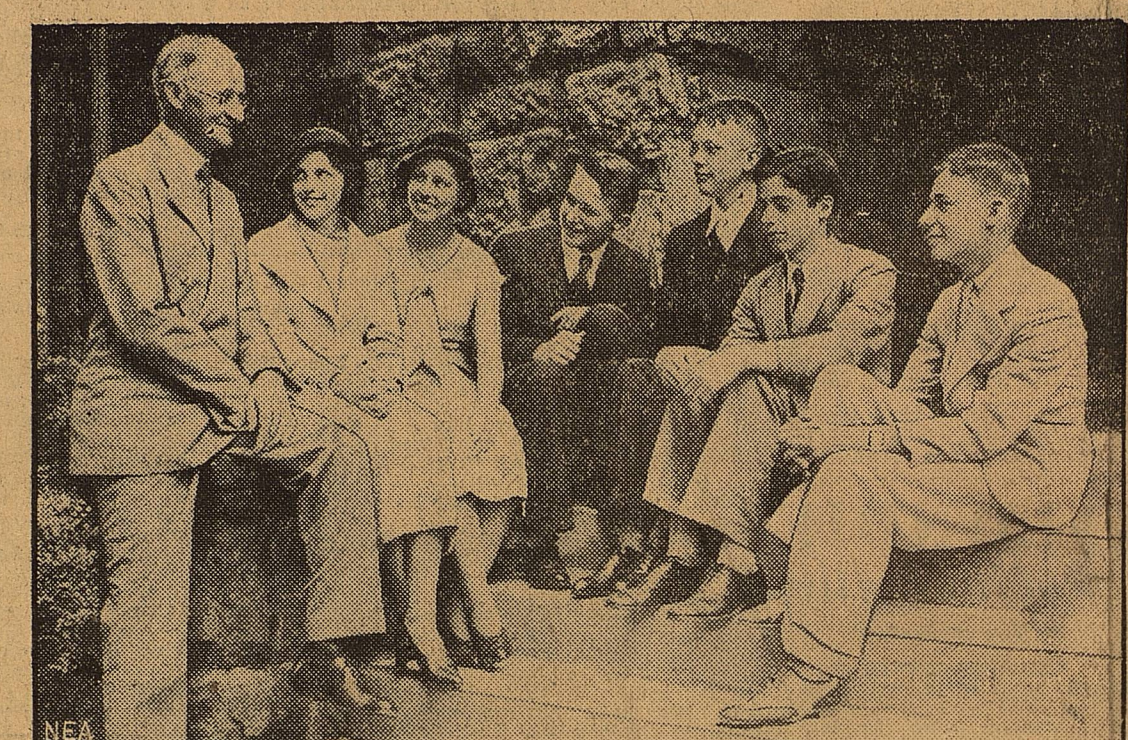

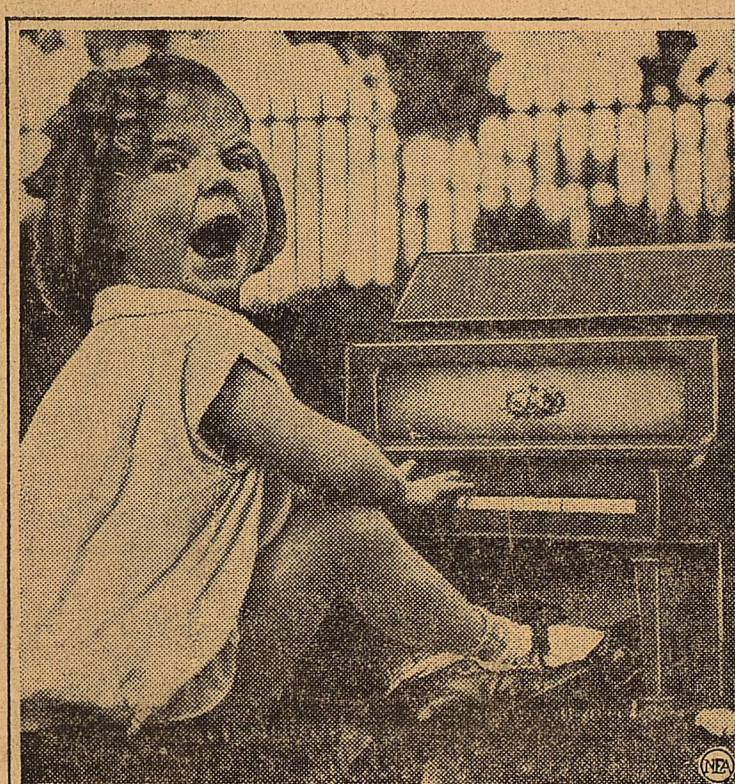

REMISSION BILL CAUSE FOR DEBATE

Early Tax Bill Must Be Law in Case of No Agreement

AUSTIN, Sept. 19. (UP)—The house and senate were deadlocked on a new ad valorem tax penalty remission bill today. Before noon the house voted by a majority of ten not to recede from the declaration that the penalty remission shall apply to city and town taxes as well as county, district and state taxes.

If no agreement is reached before adjournment, the early tax penalty bill, including the law that permits corporations to escape franchise tax penalties amounting to more than \$90,000, and delinquents under all special taxes, to escape collection penalties, will be a law.

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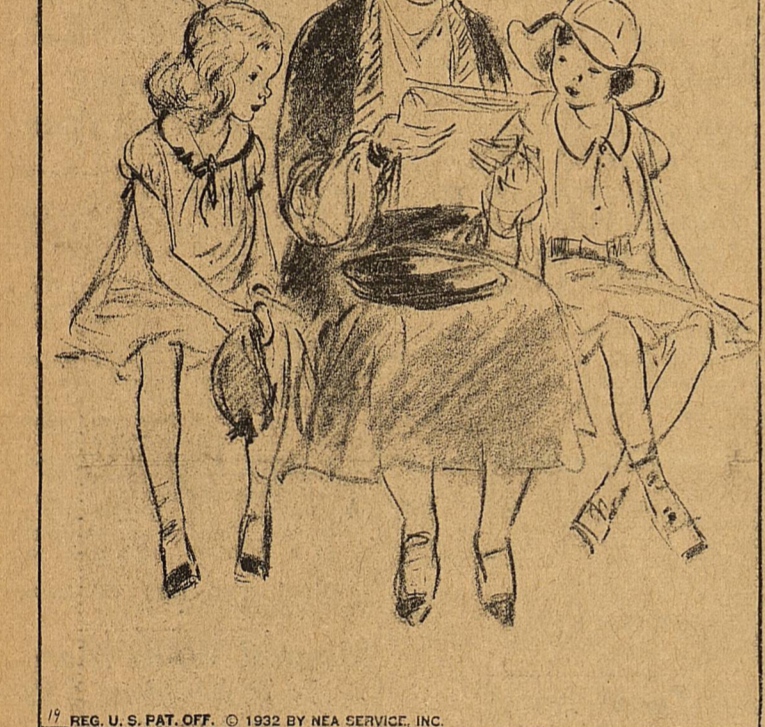
SOCIETY'S RESPONSIBILITY One of the most tragic stories of the depression has to do with Frank Howard, 72-year-old Boston man, who seems likely to spend the remainder of his life in prison for the theft of a pair of shoes, a bottle of perfume and a handbag, all worth \$7.

Howard was sentenced to life imprisonment for armed robbery back in 1897, but in 1914 he was given a parole.

For 14 years he worked as a painter and went straight. He married and became a respectable citizen. Then came the depression and Howard was out of work.

Then, desperate, he committed the theft, was caught and automatically committed to prison.

The logical supposition is that Howard would have gone "straight" if society had been prepared to give him work. Cases of this kind emphasize more and more the fact that society must take a large share of the blame for many of our criminal acts.

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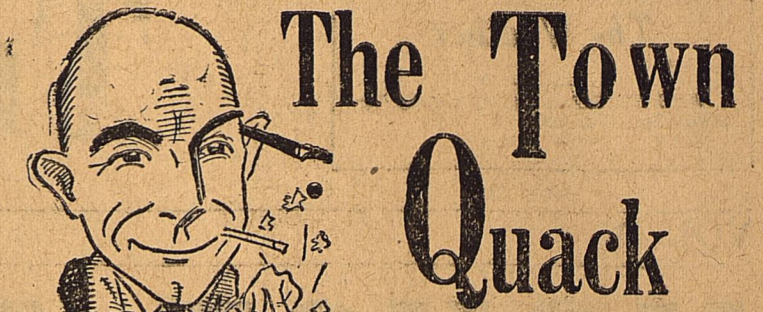

Cotton picking jobs are now open for single hands and for families. Two jobs are available near the city limits for people who wish to remain in town and go daily to the fields.

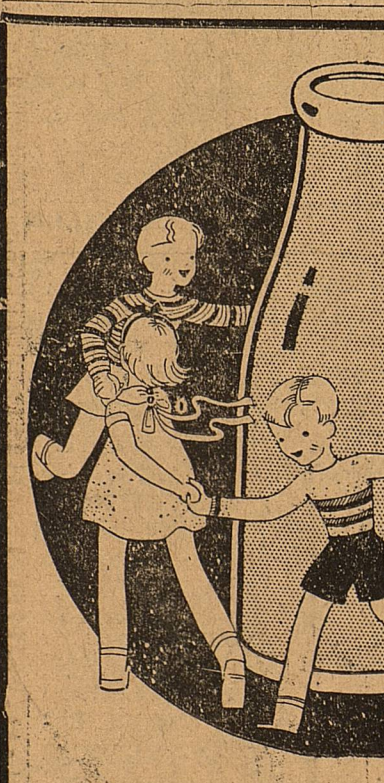

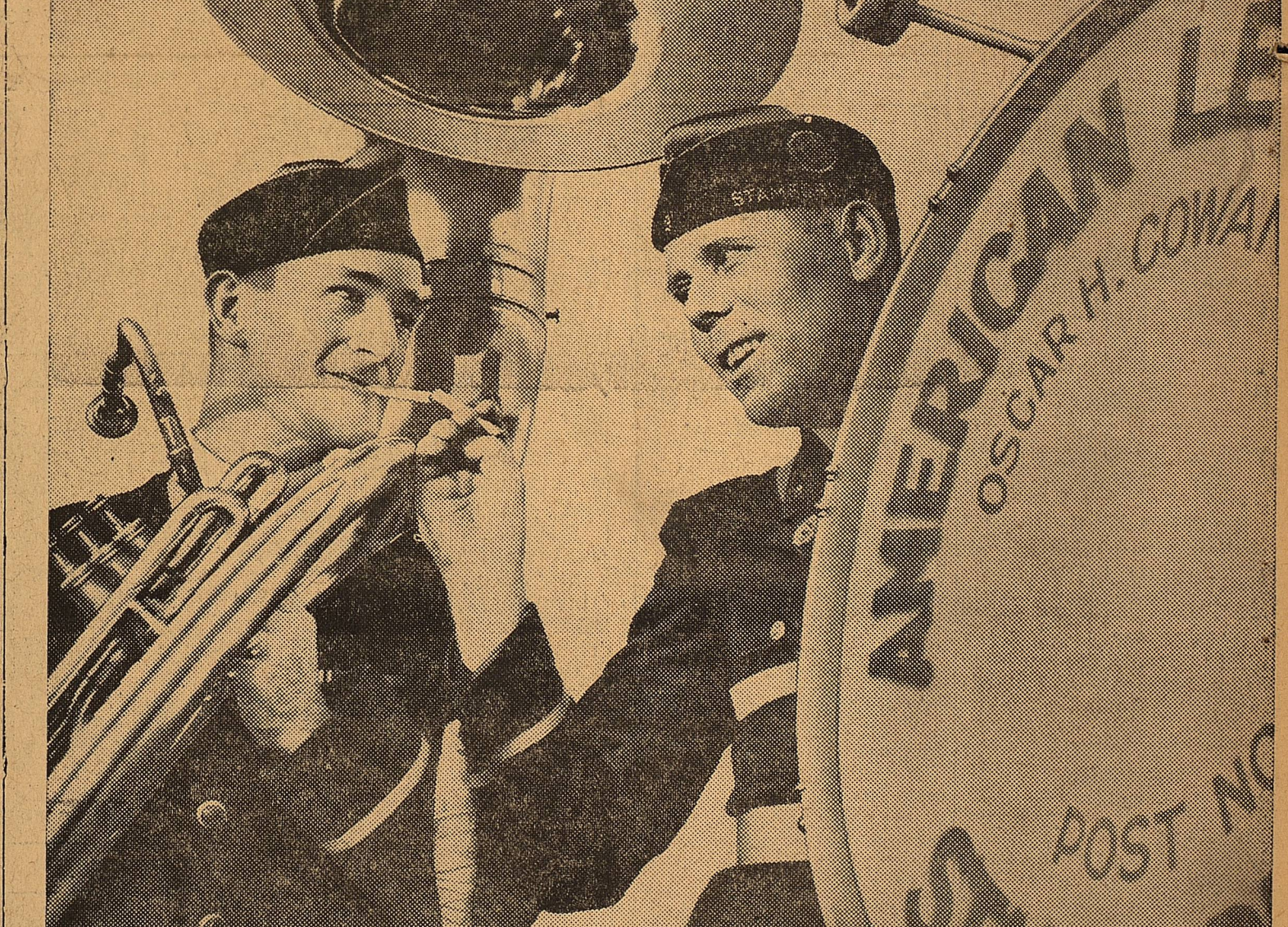
