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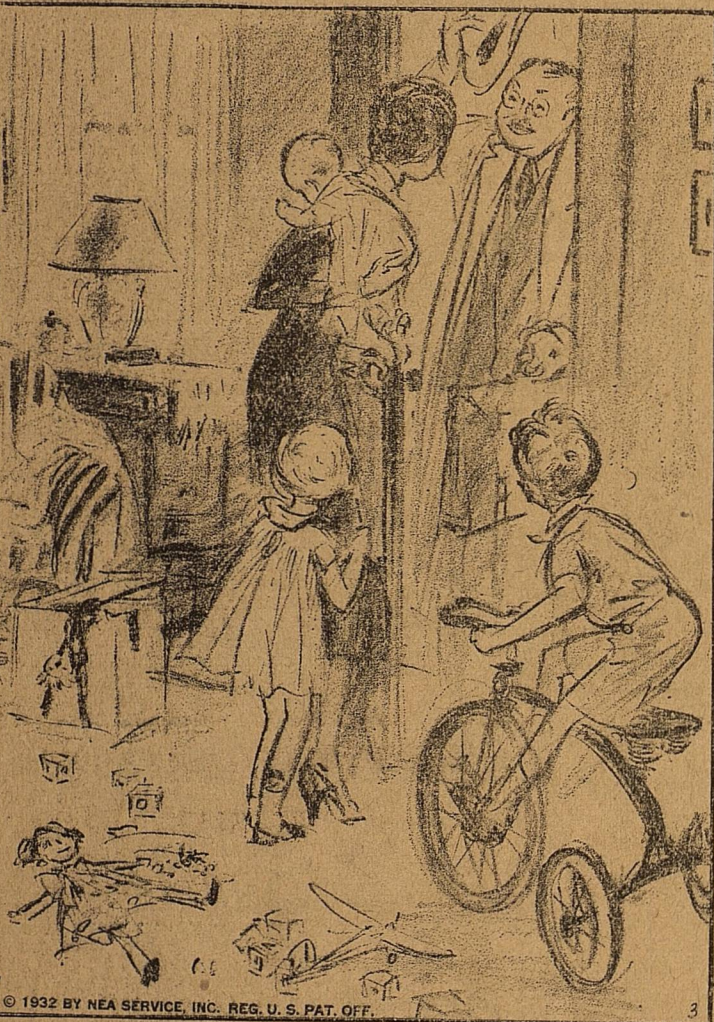
LOGIC—AND BOMBS!

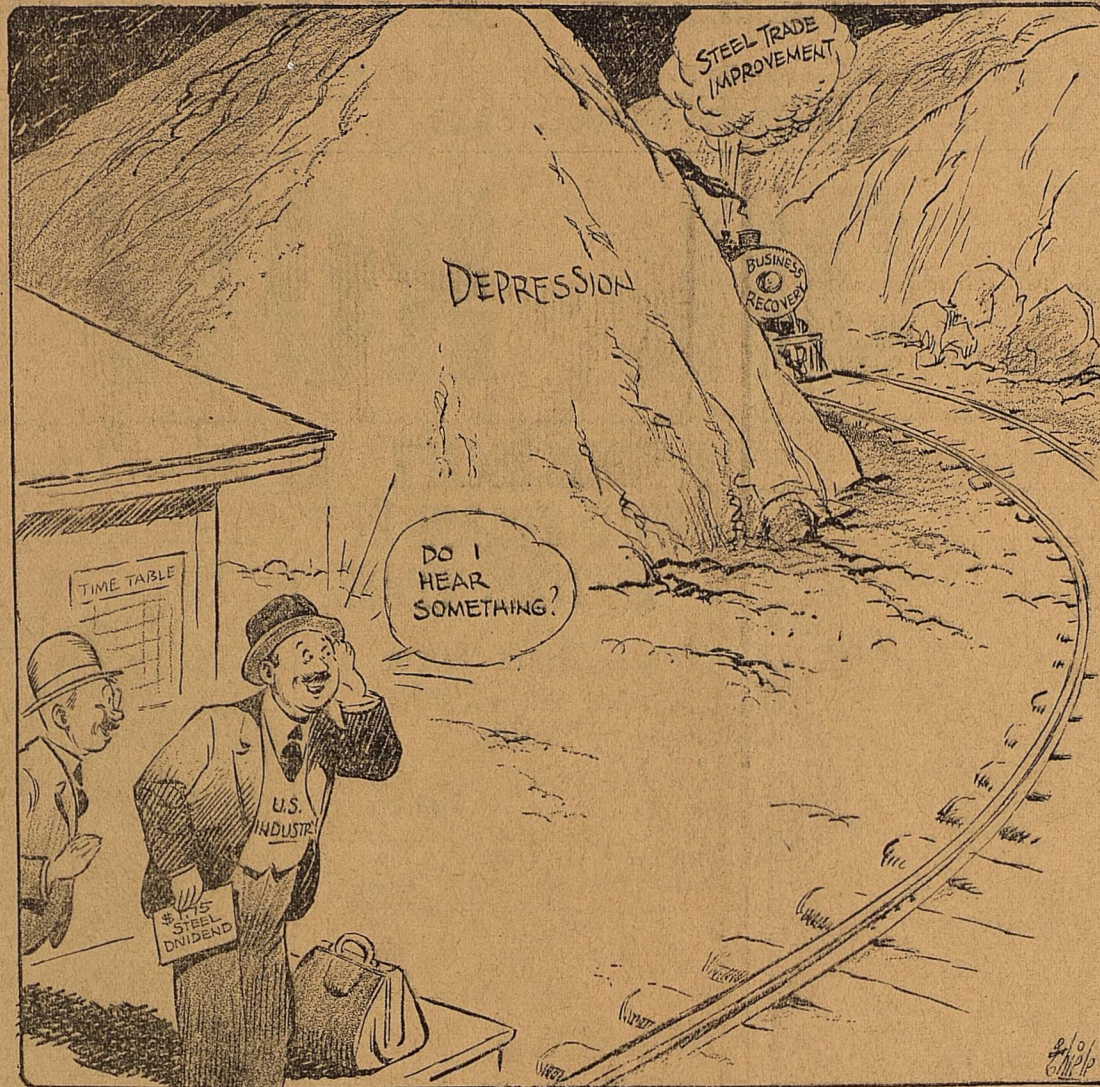

Princes in India Own Paper Stock

LONDON (UP).—No less than nine ruling princes of India shortly will be among the shareholders of the "Pioneer," published at Allahabad, one of the best known Indian newspapers. The "Pioneer," thus qualified as the most royal of all royal newspapers.
A syndicate, headed by J. P. Srivastava, Minister of Education in the United Provinces, has purchased the newspaper. The Maharajahs of Kashmir, Baroda, Gwalior, Travancore, Bikaner, Patiala, Jaipur and Bhavnagar and the Nawab of Bhopal all have promised to buy shares in the paper, according to information reaching London.
Three of them, the Maharajahs of Kashmir, Baroda and Gwalior, are each entitled to salutes of twenty-one guns on ceremonial occasions. King George V is entitled to no more.
Saluting guns will have to boom 176 times if all the royal shareholders pay state visits to their property at the same time.
The Maharajah of Gwalior is only 16 years old. The Maharajah of Travancore only 20.
Needless to say, the policy of the newspaper will be anti-Gandhi and anti-Indian National Congress.

An extract from the stockholders' list will probably read like this:
His Highness Saramad-i-Rajaha-i-Hindustan Bahadur Sri Maharajahdhiraj Sawai Man Singh Bahadur, Maharajah of Jaipur.
Lieutenant General His Highness Feroz-i-Khas-i-Daula-i-Inglishan Mansur-i-Zaman, Amur-ul-Umara, Maharajah Dhiraj Raj Raieshwar Shree, Maharaja-i-Rajman Mahara-i-Bhurindra Singh, Mohinder Bahadur, Maharaj Dhiraj of Patiala. And so forth.

Editor, The Reporter-Telegram:
This is a time when every honest man and woman is looking and hoping for some kind of a change and for the better of course; and I believe most of us are in a mood to receive the true principles of democracy for your careful study.

Therefore I will present to you the principles of the Liberty party for your careful study.
We stand for justice to all and special privileges to none, a money system coined by act of congress and circulated by the government for the whole people without interest and through government-owned banks; all public utilities run under civil service system at cost of operation, political jobs, all governmental machinery operated without taxes, an insurance system operated and guaranteed by the government with no loss of premiums when policy holder is unable to pay and with no interest charges in case a loan is wanted by the policy holder, a system of government that functions where it should but does not enter into business in competition with its citizenry, a system that operates through such necessary bureaus, commissions, departments, etc. that must be had for services to the people and under cabinet officers, without graft or political influence; private rights, private ownership of all personal property strictly protected by the government, a system of employment under public contract and employer, insured and assured by the government, no dole and no unemployment except that which naturally follows human weakness; a reasonable limitation of the accumulation of wealth affecting less than 80 per cent of the people, thus destroying the thirst for greed; government control of all natural resources that they may be conserved, used by and for all the people, paying running expenses of the government, thus discarding tax assessors and collectors, the abolition of all unnecessary bureaus, commissions, etc. and useless offices and a strictly scientific method of government administration; a city-county manager system of county government, with a council selected for ability and not for wealth, with all clerical functions operated under a civil service system; the abolition of a money standard, as the gold standard; such a standard as the gold standard makes the dollar necessarily unstable and fluctuating, and rendering it easy for a few money changers to control the circulation of money.

The principles of liberty are based on the teachings of Jesus, the only philosophy that can give justice.
From time to time we shall preach as best we can the doctrine of the sermon on the mount, and expect to win on that platform or go down in defeat to rise again as Jesus did.
Read and re-read this and read your Bible, and if you will drop all prejudice against names that do not start with a D or R, I believe you will like it, and if you like it you should help to get it.

With these principles put into practice, there would be no more headlines in the papers like this: "Hunger March at Chicago Is Alarming City", when the country is running over with food. Try it and see.

Vegetable Juice Cocktails Make Good Appetizer

Many housekeepers overlook the possibilities in vegetable juice cocktails. Tomato juice is used quite generally now, but many other vegetables make excellent first course appetizers for luncheon and dinner and are most practicable.

As in any appetizer, careful seasoning is essential. Lemon juice or vinegar, sugar, salt, sometimes a trace of onion juice, just a hint of pepper—any or all of these seasonings can be added to almost any vegetable flavor with appetizing effect.

Thorough chilling and attractive serving are also imperative. While the cocktail must be perfectly smooth and "drinkable," it need not be of watery consistency. For example, strained orange juice has a bit more substance than clear water and is pleasantly smooth with a consistency ideal in a cocktail.

Tomato juice and sauerkraut juice are commonly used, but other vegetables can be successfully manipulated, too. Canned vegetables or fresh ones are equally good and there is no waste or loss of vitamin content and mineral constituents when the juice is used as the solid vegetables is made use of.

Vegetables which are wanted quite dry for dressing for the table or less difficult for the cook, she need not cook away every drop of liquid. When the vegetable stock is drained off and used in another meal as a cocktail, nothing is wasted and the cook can relax her cat-like vigilance of the last few minutes of the cooking period.

Of course the same vegetable should not appear twice in the same meal, but the vegetable stock can be kept on ice for twenty-four hours and used to provide contrast in flavor for the next meal.

The water in which celery is cooked, cauliflower, brussels sprouts, broccoli, carrots, mushrooms or the juice from canned vegetables is piquant and stimulating by proper seasoning.

Combinations are good, too. Tomato and sauerkraut, beet and tomato, beet and cauliflower, carrot and mushroom are truly delicious combinations.

A tiny sprig of parsley, two or three of the very tiny pearl onions, a slice of stuffed olive, a caper or two—these make attractive garnishes besides adding a bit of distinctive flavor to all vegetable juice cocktails.

When the vegetable has been removed for serving, the vegetable stock can be seasoned and cooked a few minutes. This insures a delicately blended flavor for the finished cocktail. A slice of onion, two or three whole cloves, a few peppercorns and a stick of cinnamon simmered in the water in which beets were cooked makes a delightful flavor impossible to attain in any other way. Add lemon juice just before serving.

Broadcast Will Aid Friendship

BERLIN (UP)—The coming Armistice day, Nov. 11, will be signalized by a demonstration of German-American friendship when, if present plans materialize, a former United States army officer will broadcast a message of international amity from Berlin on a nationwide American hookup.

Ex-Lieutenant John Page Jones, 38, of Lynchburg, Va., once of the 116th Field Artillery, will step before the microphone on Armistice night (Berlin time) and tell American radio fans what the average German thinks about the United States.

Jones was wounded by a German shell on the Western front during the World war. He arrived here in May, bent on spending a year in Germany under the Oberlander Trust Foundation of Philadelphia. There he has been studying German social and economic conditions.

Country Has One War Vet

BERLIN (UP)—Although war veterans' legions in all European countries greatly increased their membership after the last war—and some even now are gaining new members due to growing nationalistic spirit—the war veterans' legion in Liechtenstein literally is dying out.

At present, the entire Liechtenstein "Militar Veteranverein," as the veterans' legion is called in that small country, boasts exactly one member. He is an octogenarian.

There is no chance that any new member will join the Liechtenstein Veteranverein. Liechtenstein fought its last war in 1866. This actually was Liechtenstein's war to end wars, for when the Liechtenstein troops returned Aug. 27, 1866, without losses, from their war against Garibaldi's insurgents at the Stillfer Joch in Tyrol, the entire army of 100 men was disbanded for good.

A few years ago the Liechtenstein veterans' legion turned out for the last time on parade. That was when the present Prince of Liechtenstein, Franz I, ascended the throne of his fathers. Then the Liechtenstein veterans greeted their new monarch in full force, with three members.

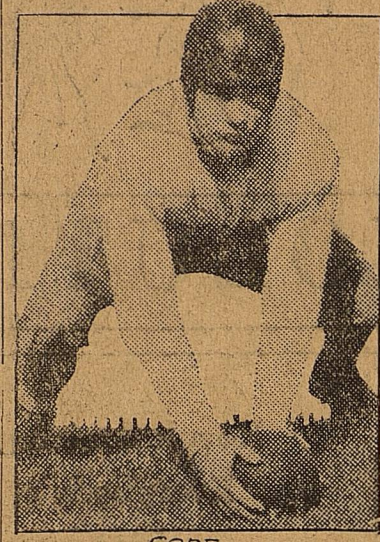

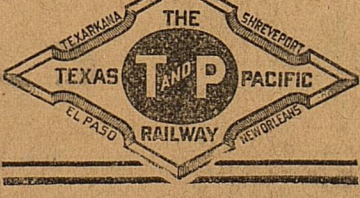

BUSINESS STILL FLUCTUATES SAYS GENERAL SURVEY

Business developments this month have continued to present the same type of irregularity noted in September, with further expansion in business activity on the one hand and persistent weakness in commodity and security prices on the other, says the Guaranty Trust company of New York in the current issue of The Guaranty Survey, its monthly review of business and financial conditions in the United States and abroad, which has just been published.

"The effect of these tendencies has been to strengthen two generally accepted beliefs concerning the economic outlook; first, that the most acute phase of the depression is past and second, that progress toward recovery will be slow and hesitant." The Survey continues.

Conservative Optimism Continues "It is almost universally assumed that the industrial and financial prostration of last summer has been definitely overcome and that the general tendency will continue to be toward improvement. At the same time, there is perhaps less disposition than a month ago to believe that the road toward recovery is unobstructed and that the immediate future, that the coming winter will be a very difficult period, with widespread unemployment and distress among the masses of the public agencies extended to the utmost to meet the demands upon them is taken for granted.

"Among the favorable business events of the last few weeks the most impressive were a small but genuine increase in industrial employment, some improvement in retail trade, substantial gains in steel output and pig iron production, further increases in textile output, a strong upward trend in the production of coal, continued expansion in the output of railway equipment with a resulting recovery in earnings, a considerable increase in foreign trade, and further improvement in the financial situation. On the other hand, the price level has been the reactionary tendency in prices, which has been particularly marked in farm products and has carried grain quotations to the lowest level in many years.

"Notwithstanding these and other important exceptions, the general trend in business has been unquestionably toward recovery, but the conditions, which are discussed in some detail elsewhere in this issue, show equally clear signs of improvement. Further large gold imports bear witness to the growing confidence in the stability of the dollar, both at home and abroad. Bank failures have remained at comparatively low levels, and the amount of money in circulation has declined. Banks have continued to reduce their loans and to increase their investments, indicating a scarcity of opportunities for advantageous credit expansion but also a reviving faith in the future of security prices.

"Undoubtedly, political uncertainties have retarded recovery and replaced some measure of confidence with caution in both business and market circles. How much of this may be justified economically only the future can tell. A more definite adverse influence is the growing tendency among business men that the present cost of government will continue to represent a major economic obstacle until it is drastically reduced and that an adequate tendency toward correction of the situation has yet appeared.

"Some encouragement is to be found in the treasury report for the first quarter of the current fiscal year which shows a reduction in expenditures of \$140,000,000 from the total for the corresponding period a year earlier. Two factors, however, tend to modify the favorable construction that might be placed on the report. One is that expenditures under present conditions are affected to an unusual extent by large

items of an exceptional nature, such as outlays for emergency relief, so that a saving in one period is very likely to be more than offset by a large increase in expenditures later on. The other, is that receipts during the quarter, despite some improvement, continued to run considerably below treasury estimates, resulting in a large deficit and indicating that the fiscal year will bring another huge excess of expenditures over revenues, unless new sources of income are found in the meantime.

The Financial Outlook "Obviously, then, in comparison with the very difficult period that the country's financial system has experienced, the current banking situation shows a vast improvement. With hoarding on the decrease, a continuation of the process of liquidating frozen assets, lower bank suspensions and growing confidence in the country's banks, and a strengthening of reserve balances by member banks, the financial outlook in this country bearing unexpected adverse credit developments abroad, is exceptionally promising. Of course, the financial readjustment process is far from completed, and in some sections of the country the situation is not quite so favorable, particularly in rural and agricultural communities. Notwithstanding this, a review of the banking structure as a whole finds strong support for the opinion that any failure of the recent upturn in general business to establish a definite groundwork for revival, based on other explanations than an inability of our banking system as a whole to finance a sound expansion of industry and trade.

Problems of Readjustment "The misgivings on the part of business men that have been reflected in the price recessions of the last few weeks appear to have been due not so much to adverse developments in the current situation as to a growing realization of the formidable nature of some of the impediments that lie in the path of economic recovery. Of all these obstacles, perhaps the most important is the network of trade barriers that has come into existence as a result of the wave of economic nationalism that has swept over the world since the beginning of the depression. The paralyzing effect of these tariffs, quotas, exchange regulations, and other trade restrictions has been only imperfectly recognized, but as the movement has spread from one country to another, business men have gradually come to realize that the situation threatens the very existence of the international scale of business organization that has been gradually built up in the past.

"The seriousness of the problem lies in the fact that such trade restrictions are, by their very nature, extremely difficult to remove, since each specific duty or quota allotment is vigorously defended by special interests that believe they are benefited by it. Unlike most of the effects of the depression, these trade barriers represent an artificial growth that will not disappear as long as public authorities fail to realize that such a system is not compatible with the conditions of modern economic life."

Teacher Wins Fight Against Smoking Ban

THE DALLES, Ore. (UP)—Rather than give up Lady Nicotine, whom he wedded 50 years ago, C. H. "Pop" Endo, supervisor of instrumental music in The Dalles schools, told the school board he would resign.

The board reconsidered its edict that no teachers, men or women, might use tobacco in any form. The rule was modified to permit smoking in the home and the popular instructor was retained—with an advance in salary.

Peak to Have Pyrotechnics COLORADO SPRINGS, Co. (UP) In Indian summer, prepare for a New Year's Eve celebration. That's the motto of the Ad-a-Man club of Colorado Springs. The Ad-a-Man club is collecting high-proof, guaranteed "dynamite" for its New Year's Eve party. The collection is explosive—but not liquid. The Ad-a-Man club is composed of mountain climbers, and the club members each New Year's Eve, make the long climb to the top of Pike's Peak, more than 14,000 feet above sea level. Then, as the New Year dawns, in the bitter, sub-zero temperatures on the top of the peak, they set off a gorgeous fireworks display. The fireworks can be seen for 100 miles or more on a clear night. The grand finale is a great white flare, fired into the air and then carried, aflame, on a parachute. The flare is fired into the North as the club's salutation to the member of its honorary member, Roald Amundsen, the famous explorer, who disappeared in the frozen Arctic while on a rescue mission. And because it would be impossible for the members to lug the fireworks to the top of the peak when it is almost impossible to light their own way through the deep drifts, the club buys its fireworks early, stores them in the summit house atop the peak, and then waits for New Year's Eve to come. They are buying the fireworks now, and will have them up on top of the peak by the end of the month. Coolies Carry Ruler's Auto LONDON, (UP)—The \$20,000 automobile now under construction at Bromley, Kent, for His Majesty, the King of Hedjas, will be added to a fleet which already is the costliest in the world. The King has limousines, sedans, cabriolets, roadsters, and every other kind, all of luxurious and sometimes fantastic design. The latest addition is to be a 250-horsepower supersters, capable of 100 miles an hour over the desert. The handsome body has a bullet-proof steel lining, two huge searchlights, and four extra-large horns.
