Gordon, unscrupulous opportunist, not only helped to kill the goose that laid his golden eggs, but was uplucky enough to be sent to prison and fined \$80,000 for his thoughtlessness

thoughtlessness.

Paid for Tax Evasion

The charge was income tax evasion, a technical expedient which had proven gratifyingly effective against Al Capone before federal agents turned their attention to New York's Public Enemy No. 1.

Waxey was cannier than Capone had been, but after two and a half years investigators finally turned up enough evidence for conviction.

Before bootlegging made him rich and powerful, Waxey was frequently caught and punished for his crimes. Born Irving Wexler, in an east side tenement district, he was a hoodlum and a pickpocket almost from the time he was old enough to stand on street corners. A member of "Dopey Benn" Fein's gang, he was caught and sent to prison several times, but his first serious brush with the law came when he and ten other young thugs were indicted for the murder of an aged city clerk. ### 'White Plague' Term Started in a Novel During Civil War

Very few people know where the term "white plague" started. The famous poet and physican

Oliver Wendell Holmes first used it; to mean tuberculosis in 1861, the year the Civil war began. In his novel "Elsie Venner" he describes the travels of a country doctor and his experiences in the course of his trips through the country districts with pony and "sulky."

In one of these passages he speaks of "the dead winter when the white plague of the north has caged its wasted victims, shuddering as they think of the frozen soil which musiquarried like a rock to receive

them."
The word "consumption" was used for many years to mean tuberculosis. After Dr. Koch, the famous German physician found a little over 50 years ago that this disease was caused by tiny rod-shaped germs known as tubercle hacilli, the scientific name of "tuberculosis" was adopted by the medical profession. In the days of both Dr. Holmes and Dr. Koch, people thought of having tuberculosis as being doomand Dr. Koch. Beople thought of having tuberculosis as being doom-ed to die. Since then, due largely to the efforts of the tuberculosis as scalations the medical profession sanatoria, and the work done with Christmas Seal money, thousands of people with tuberculosis have been restored to health and tuberculosis has been prevented in hundreds of thousands of cases.
