

Millions of dollars were spent to enforce the prohibition law. The Coast Guard tried vainly to prevent the smuggling of a constant supply of imported liquors through "Rum Row." Meanwhile, bootlegging poured a golden harvest into the pockets of racketeers and crooks. Booze czars bought off politicians and grew arrogant in their "family" quarrels. Their defiance and bribery of police became a scandal in all parts of the country.



Late in 1932, the Crusaders estimated that prohibition had cost 2600 lives, the financial burden of enforcement grew ever greater, and hostility to the law increased. The Democrats promised absolute repeal and Franklin D. Roosevelt took prompt action.

Secretary of the Navy Swanson has asked an increase of 5300 in the strength of the enlisted personnel of the navy, urging that the present strength is not adequate even for peace-time operations.

His request serves as a reminder that maintaining a navy is not simply a matter of having the proper number of ships. You also must have the men to operate them.
