State Rebuttal Witness Says Woolley Was Not Grieved

CONFLICT IS NOTED THOUGH IN TESTIMONY

Witness Also Quoted As Saying Defendant Was Sorry

DALLAS, Dec. 12, (U.P.)—Dr. J. H. Marshall, state rebuttal witness, struck a blow at the defense in the murder trial of Toy G. Woolley today when he testified conflictlingly that he "partially metad."

Dr. Marshall was called an hour after the shooting and gave Mrs. Esta Joynes medicine "while Woolley looked on without appearing nervous or especially grieved."

Defense Rested
DALLAS, Dec. 12.—The defense
rested late last night in the murder
trial of Toy G. Woolley, 28-year-old
auditor accused of slaying his wife,
without the defendant called to testify. The defense had indicated previously that Woolley would relate
his version of the shooting of his
young wife.

Each of the jurors trying Toy G. Woolley for murder in connection with the shooting of his wife, Dorothy Marie, held the shotgun which killed her and snapped the trigger to see how much of a pull was needed to discharge it.

The jurors also heard two gunsmiths testify that the shotgun was in perfect working order. One of the gunsmiths tested the trigger pulled in the courtroom, showing more than four pounds pressure was needed to discharge the gun.

Currie McCutcheon, defense attorney, suggested that Paul Offexperienced gunsmith, fire the shotgun in the courtroom but District Judge Williams refused to permit it.

CRIME CAN BE HALTED BY BEING EXPOSED

The crime problem, like the poor, is one of those things that always are with us. A great many citizens have expended much honest labor in recent years trying to find out just why and how the underworld manages to get its steady stream of youthful recruits; and often enough some investigator reports that one big reason is the fact that newspapers give so much space to crime

This is isn't a new charge, to be sure; but it is heard fairly frequently, and it has bothered a number of highminded and conscientious folk. An excellent answer is to be found in testimony given not long ago before the Senate sub-committee on racketeering by Dr. Carleton Simon of New York, associated with the New York police force for the last 35 years, as criminologist.

The task of uncovering the elements that create crime, says Dr. Simon, "is made greater and more difficult by the cast confusion of public thought" which arises from this effort to hold newspaper crime stories culpable.

Some people, remarks Dr. Simon, demand that every medium of intelligence, education, and entertainment be made completely harmless to the subnormal mind of the delinquent child. And it does not take the doctor long to earry this thesis to its logical—and absurd—conclusion.

Details of a train wreck, vividly presented, would be too harrowing for a sensitive adolescent mind. Therefore -let the press keep silent about all wrecks on land or

Murder stories affect those with strong homicidal tendencies. Therefore—let no newspaper ever mention any murder case.

Congressional debates, with their mud-slinging and partisan criticism, can give a child a dangerous contempt for political institutions. Hence we must have no more reports of the activities of Congress, no more exposures of malfeasance in office or of derelictions of duty by public

And Dr. Simon remarks:

"A truly comprehensive research of the causes of crime requires a study of every influence, good or bad. brought to bear on our youth. Heredity, parental guidance and home life, physical influence, association, school and church influences must all play their part.

'We cannot hope to solve the problem of crime in relation to youth by drawing the curtain down upon crime.'

A REACTIONARY BOOMERANG


Washington correspondents are beginning to report that the recent assault on President Roosevelt's monetary and recovery policies has had one entirely unexpected effect. It has solidified Congressional sentiment in his support and has made it probable that he can get his program through Congress this winter as smoothly and rapidly as he did last spring.

The reason for this is simple. Right or wrong, it has seemed to congressmen as though all the fire that has hit the White House has come from guns in the camp of the extreme conservatives. In consequence, those solons who had planned to kick over the traces and flood the coming session with all manner of radical proposals have taken a second thought and have decided that their first duty is to repel the attacks of the reactionaries.



In the fact of these figures come other studies which prove the problem is not insurmountable, that, given sufficient funds and sufficient competent medical attention, tuber culosis can be controlled at it cultosis can be controlled at its source, and particularly among children, and that such control must mean for the future a lessening of disability and death among

Now, tuberculosis is primarily disease associated with poverty. Since the time of the ancient Hippocrates, physicians have recog-nized that some people are particuarly of the type likely to get tuber-

About one-eighth of the human acce dies of this disease. Since tractically all human beings sooner or later are exposed to the malady, combination of factors seems to in cities, in dark, close alleys and tenement houses, workers in cellars and ill-ventilated rooms or persons addicted to drink, are much more prone to the disease than are those tenement houses, workers in cellars and ill-ventilated rooms or persons addicted to drink, are much more prone to the disease than are those who live a normal life under generally healthful conditions.

The problem, then, resolves itself in great part to eradication of these causes of the disease.

Exports of automotive products from the United States during October were valued at \$8,901,846, compared with \$8,610,004 in September and \$5,355,793 in October, 1932. October was the fourth successive month in which the sales abroad of automotive products were larger in value than the preceding month and, with one exception, exceeded in value the shipments abroad for any month since October, 1931.

British Find Way To Evade Law, so Parties Swing On

LONDON. (U.P.)-A new kind o night club is springing up here. It is in the form of "bottle par-ties," and drinking goes on all

night long.

The distinction between "bottle party" and night club is merely a technical evasion of Britain's liquor laws. It has been found that off-license store smay send liquor at any hour of the day or night, although they cannot sell it over the counter except at

stated hours.

Thus, there are nine or ten night clubs in London at the present time, operating as "bottle parties." The procedure is much the same. Guests begin to arrive about midnight and they usually do not depart until 4 and 5 a. m. Admittance to the "party" is usually \$5, paid at the door. Once inside, the guests is presented with a form guests is presented with a form reading: "Please purchase on my behalf and as my agents the fol-lowing goods, storing same pending my instructions." He fills it in with what he wants—a bottle of whisky, a magnum of cham-pagne, and so on—and his order is then telephoned to the nearest store.

There an all-night clerk takes

the order, and within a short time delivers it at the "party."
